Dear Parent(s),

I am pleased to inform you that Louisville Collegiate School is once again offering merit scholarships for incoming 9th grade students. The scholarships are open to all current Collegiate 8th grade students, as well as outside applicants. Possible scholarship awards include 50% annual tuition, 25% annual tuition and \$1000-\$3000 annual awards. All awards are renewable scholarships for grades 9-12 at Collegiate.

We are also proud to announce that the Patricia Trost Friedler scholarship will be offered again for 2012-2013, school year. The Patricia Trost Friedler Scholarship for Young Women is a scholarship award of 25% annual tuition to a female student entering the 9th grade, who demonstrates exceptional creativity. Applicants must complete the standard merit scholarship application process and submit a creative essay revealing her art form of choice. The award is renewable for grades 9-12 at Collegiate.

Enclosed are the Merit Scholar and Patricia Trost Friedler applications along with instructions for submitting the applications. Please note that a completed file for both awards includes a completed application, essay and scholarship testing. Current Collegiate students DO NOT need a teacher recommendation.

Louisville Collegiate School Merit Scholars – 9th Grade

The Louisville Collegiate School Merit Scholars program is a highly selective, merit based scholarship opportunity that recognizes outstanding students based upon superior academic achievement, standardized test score results, and the potential for making a significant contribution while attending Collegiate Upper School and later in life.

Interested students will be required to complete a formal essay and take a standardized test. If selected as a finalist, interview with a selection committee. Additionally, student applications for Collegiate Merit Scholarships will be evaluated carefully for past academic performance and leadership involvement. The most competitive applicants for the Collegiate Merit Scholarship will display exceptional ability as demonstrated in standardized school tests.

The number of Collegiate Merit Scholarships will depend upon the size and composition of the applicant pool, available space within the upper school, and available resources. Scholarship amounts are as follows: 50% upper school tuition, 25% upper school tuition and \$1,000-3,000 annual awards. Scholarships are renewable for all four years of Upper School, assuming academic performance at levels commensurate with ability and past performance, as well as continued involvement in the extracurricular life of the upper school.

In order to be eligible for a Collegiate Merit Scholarship, applicants must be entering the ninth grade. Merit Applications must be submitted to the Admission Office by Friday, January 20, 2012. All applicants must test on Saturday, January 7 or Saturday, January 28, 2012 and submit an essay based on the topic described on page 3. Eighth-grade grades will also be evaluated. *All non-Collegiate students must comply with the normal application process for the school*.

Based upon test scores, grades and an initial review of applicant files, an Admission Committee will determine a group of finalists who will be invited to campus for a formal interview process with the Collegiate Scholar Selection Committee. Finalists will be announced the week of February 13, 2012 and interviews will take place on Thursday, February 23, 2012. Collegiate Scholar recipients will be announced on Monday, March 5, 2012 and will have to submit a contract and deposit by Friday, March 9, 2012.

The deadline for Collegiate Merit Scholar applications is Friday, January 20, 2012. Please return the application to the Admission Office.

History:

- Adopted by the Collegiate Board of Trustees in 2006
- Intended to recognize academic excellence; intended to attract and retain exceptional academic ability.
- Initially funded by an anonymous donor, merit scholarships covered 50% of annual tuition.
- Currently, funded by donors and school operations.
- Currently, merit awards range from \$1,000 up to 50% of tuition
- Currently, 5 merit scholars are receiving an award greater than 25% of annual tuition.

Process:

- Public appeal for applicants; all materials available on school webpage
- Required application, essay, standardized test and finalist interview
- Standardized Test Dates for 2012-2013 scholarships are January 7 and January 28
- Standardized Test: ERB-CTP IV (also Collegiate's admission test) and Otis-Lennon School Ability Test (OLSAT)
- Selection Committee: Comprised of community leaders who are not Collegiate parents, faculty, staff or administrators
- Historically, merit scholars have SAI scores above 130 and standardized test scores above the 90%tile
- Historically, 4-5 merit scholarships are awarded per entering grade level –
 depending ultimately upon the candidate pool and the operating budget
 approved by the Board of Trustees.

2011-2012 Budget:

 Collegiate uses School and Student Services (SSS) by the National Association of Independent Schools (NAIS) in order to determine a family's ability to contribute to the cost of education when considering need-based financial assistance requests.

Need Based Financial Aid: \$1,027,975 (Grades 9-12)
 Merit Scholarships: \$ 100,025 (Grades 9-12)
 Tuition: \$ 19,700 (Grades 9-12)
