Catalpa School

- Create a collaboration of educators and community members to provide an approach to education that blends the Waldorf Tradition with Kentucky Core Academic Standards.
- Use a holistic approach to education to the meet the academic needs of each unique child through a balance of art, music, drama, movement, and experiences in nature.
- Build each child's capacity to think creatively and critically, to understand and manage emotions, and work in a focused and willing manner.
- Meet academic standards in a developmentally appropriate way to foster higher academic achievement in middle and high school and a love of learning throughout life.

<u>CRITERIA</u> for determining a school site for the Catalpa School

- Adequate space to expand to P-8th grades
- Serves high needs population (70% resides, 30% magnet)
- Available **district-wide transportation** for magnet program
- Appropriate spaces, indoor and outdoor, for programmatic needs

<u>PROCESS</u> for determining a school site for the Catalpa School

- Criteria determined
- Potential schools identified
- Review of potential schools against criteria led to selection of Maupin Elementary as the recommended site
- Recommendation bought to the Board on September 8, 2014
- Meetings with school staff and parents September 9–19, 2014
- Responses to board questions brought to the Board on September 22, 2014
- Meeting with Catalpa School Team regarding budget and implementation
 - Recommendation returned to the Board on October 13, 2014

<u>REASONS</u> for recommending Maupin Elementary

- Adequate space to expand to P-8th grades; 675 capacity
- Serves high needs population: 90.5% students eligible for free/reduced price lunch
- Has early childhood classrooms in place
- Existing **district-wide transportation** for magnet program
- Appropriate space, indoor and outdoor, for programmatic needs

Budget Estimates – General Remarks

- Initial team proposal included significant costs for additional teachers and support staff
- Budget estimate provided <u>does not</u> include those additional costs
- Rather, the recommendation is for schools to use existing allocations for personnel in the JCPS budgeting structure in new ways to implement their program
- Funding is provided for the Waldorf professional development required
- Cross-Functional Team, including JCPS, JCTA, and concept teams will determine final proposed funding of components, toward:
 - Cost containment
 - Cost effectiveness
 - Fidelity to concept
 - Sustainability

Louisville Reach Academy

- Create a school where the physical, social, emotional, and academic need of all children are met, removing barriers to learning and improved academic achievement.
- Provide access to a challenging curriculum in a safe and caring environment.
- Expand learning opportunities through extended day and summer programming, extensive use of technology, and offering targeted intervention and enrichment.
- Establish the school as a hub of services for students and families through community partnerships.

Louisville Reach Academy: Reason for Revised Recommendation

Klondike Elementary, implemented in the Myers building, had much to recommend it for implementing the Reach Academy model. However...

- Board members and others expressed concern that there were other schools in the district with lower academic achievement and higher need
- Finding a site that met concept criteria and had a higher need population could mean more effective targeting of limited resources
- Less disruption for students, through the elimination of the move of Klondike Lane Elementary to the Myers building, and the Phoenix School to the Klondike Lane building

<u>CRITERIA</u> for determining a school site for the Louisville Reach Academy

Original criteria:

- Adequate space to expand to K-8th grades
- Serves high needs population within resides area
- Accessible to community partners
- Appropriate spaces for programmatic needs

Additional criteria

- Lower academic achievement
 - Experienced school leadership

<u>PROCESS</u> for determining a school site for the Louisville Reach Academy

Criteria determined

- Potential schools identified Initial list had eleven potential schools, reduced to three
- Review of potential schools against criteria led to selection of Atkinson Elementary as the recommended site
- Recommendation bought to the Board on October 13, 2014
- Meetings with school staff and parents October 13-24, 2014
- Responses to board questions brought to the Board prior to October 27, 2014 meeting

Recommendation brought to the Board for action on October 27, 2014

<u>REASONS</u> for recommending Atkinson Elementary

- Adequate space to expand to P-8th grades 720 capacity/375 enrolled
- Serves high needs population 91.7% students eligible for free/reduced price lunch
- Faces academic achievement challenges 28th percentile; did not make AMO in 2014
- High percentage live in the resides area 74.3% of students are Atkinson resides
- Appropriate space, indoor and outdoor, for programmatic needs
- Related programming in place to build upon and accessible to community partners
 - UofL Signature Partnership & Seven Counties already partnering with Atkinson
 - Neighborhood House a strong potential community partner
 - 2.7 miles from downtown
- Principal an experienced school leader

Would provide an additional middle school option in West Louisville

Budget Estimates – General Remarks

- Initial team proposal included significant costs for additional teachers and support staff
- Budget estimate provided <u>does not</u> include those additional costs
- Rather, the recommendation is for schools to use existing allocations for personnel in the JCPS budgeting structure in new ways to implement their program

Metro Museum Magnet School

- Create an innovative, integrated, project-based approach to education to foster active learning of students
- Establish high expectations for all students and academic rigor to meet content standards, linked to the museum-based learning model to engage students and increase academic achievement.
- Maximize exposure of students to Louisville's extraordinary community cultural assets.
- Cultivate characteristics of life-long learning *interest, joy, flexibility, self-regulation, engagement, and motivation to learn.*
- Offer extensive collaborative professional and curriculum development opportunities for teachers and museum professionals to improve instruction and increase achievement.

Revised proposal for Metro Museum Magnet School

- Board directed JCPS staff to investigate options with Museum partners to implement MMMS without the purchase and rehabilitation of a building downtown
- JPCS staff has investigated a number of possibilities and met on multiple occasions with Museum partners
- The result is a revised proposal, different in terms of scale, structure, and cost
- Proposal creates a time-limited bridge toward fulfillment of the vision of a K-5 JCPS Metro Museum Magnet School with a dedicated central facility

Revised Proposal for Metro Museum Magnet School

Proposal Logistics

- Open in 2015–16 school year with grades 3rd–5th
- Use existing space of museum partners, with three locations on Main Street as grade-level home bases
 - Muhammad Ali Center, Kentucky Museum of Art & Craft, Kentucky Science Center
- Two classes per grade, 30 students per class, with instructional assistant in each class
- Centralized school office in Main Street museum site
- Districtwide magnet school, with geography-based random draw selection, structured to ensure a significant percentage of higher need students.
- Use JCPS site close to downtown as a hub for transportation, reducing downtown traffic issues
- Cultural Partners Council comprised of four museum education professionals to plan and coordinate implementation with JCPS

Revised Proposal for Metro Museum Magnet School

Curriculum & School Day

- Collaboratively designed curriculum, integrating subject areas, projectbased, combining cultural and real-world experiences with academic rigor
- Four nine-week cycles, built around themes, aligned with JCPS curriculum maps for the Common Core Standards
- Block time for core academic pursuits, project-based and integrated learning, with opportunities for individualized instruction
- Community learning expeditions to cultural partners
- Annual Summer Curriculum Design Institute
- Active and engaged cultural partners to ensure a rich and engaging learning environment

Metro Museum School student experience framework:

KY CORE ACADEMIC STANDARDS are

addressed continually through skills-based instruction and through intentionally cross-curricular, themed

Professional learning community of teachers, with Principal oversight, provide continuity and adherence.

Integrated Learning Block is:

Focused learning time (math, language arts,

social studies, science) in an inspirational

classroom setting

Themed and Project-based - driven by student interests and tied to standards

Rich with real-world connections and authentic material provided by cultural collaborators

Community Expedition Block is:

Focused learning time in a cultural or business partner setting

Tied to theme of the unit with pre-and-post activities connected to standards-based instruction

Supports academic instruction by providing motivation, inspiration and excitement

Personal, real-time interactions with experts and authentic material/processes

Teacher Planning and Student Activity Block is:

"Professional learning community" time - individual grades, all together, or w/cultural partners Daily physical activity and engaging arts-related activities on a rotation (singing, drama, etc.)

- Cultural partners believe in the power of this idea, and are working collaboratively with JCPS to move toward implementation.
- Use of existing partner facilities as grade-level bases for the school, however, is not sustainable beyond three years.
- Adoption of this proposal would include a commitment to pursue the means by which the Metro Museum Magnet School could secure a dedicated downtown facility to serve as the home base for the school.
