8		(b)	"First responders" means local fire, police, and emergency medical personnel.
9	(2)	(a)	Each local board of education shall require the school council or, if none
10			exists, the principal in each school building in its jurisdiction to adopt an

10		accessible, well-marked location in every middle and high school building
11		and, as funds become available, at school-sanctioned middle and high
12		school athletic practices and competitions and:
13		1. Adopt procedures for the use of the portable automated external
14		defibrillator during an emergency;
15		2. Adopt policies for compliance with KRS 311.665 to 311.669 on
16		training, maintenance, notification, and communication with the local
17		emergency medical services system;
18		3. Ensure that a minimum of three (3) employees in the school and all
19		interscholastic athletic coaches be trained on the use of a portable
20		automated external defibrillator in accordance with KRS 311.667; and
21		<u>4. Ensure that all interscholastic athletic coaches maintain a</u>

23		accrediting body on heart health; and
24	<u>(f)</u>	Require development of an event-specific emergency action plan for each

2		methods of communication, any assigned emergency equipment

2	(2)	Every public high school shall provide cardiopulmonary resuscitation training to
3		students as part of the health course or the physical education course that is required
4		for high school graduation or the Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps course
5		that meets the physical education requirement. The training shall:
6		(a) Be based on the [American Heart Association's guidelines for CPR and
7		Emergency Cardiovascular Care or other]nationally recognized, evidenced-
8		based guidelines for cardiopulmonary resuscitation certification published
9		by a national accrediting body on heart health;
10		(b) Incorporate psychomotor skills training to support cognitive learning; and
11		(c) Make students aware of the purpose of an automated external defibrillator and
12		its ease and safety of use.

2			coaching principles.

19			qualifying score for successful course completion established by the

21			2. All coaches shall be required to take the end-of-course examination and					
22			shall obtain at least the minimum qualifying score.					
23		(f)	[Beginning with the 2009-2010 school year, and each year thereafter,]At least					
24			one (1) person who has completed the course shall be at every interscholastic					
25			athletic practice and competition.					
26	(2)	(a)	[Beginning with the 2012-2013 school year, and each year thereafter,]The

- (c) Upon request, the board or its agency shall make available to the public any
 training materials developed by the board or agency used to satisfy the
 requirements of paragraph (a) of this subsection. The board or its agency shall
 not be held liable for the use of any training materials so disseminated.
- 17 A student athlete suspected by an interscholastic coach, school athletic (3) (a) 18 personnel, or contest official of sustaining a concussion during an athletic 19 practice or competition shall be removed from play at that time and shall not 20 return to play prior to the ending of the practice or competition until the 21 athlete is evaluated to determine if a concussion has occurred. The evaluation 22 shall be completed by a physician or a licensed health care provider whose 23 scope of practice and training includes the evaluation and management of 24 concussions and other brain injuries. A student athlete shall not return to play 25 on the date of a suspected concussion absent the required evaluation.
