## Coming Tuesday: 'Safer Sidelines,' an investigation into sudden death in youth sports

When Buffalo Bills safety <u>Damar Hamlin went into sudden cardiac</u> <u>arrest</u> during a Monday Night Football game in January, viewers nationwide watched as athletic trainers and doctors saved his life.
