Another component of the accountability system is looking at districts' sub student groups and how each group performs on the tests.

- Looking at all 90 indicator scores, in each school and content areas by the specific student groups tested, 79% of those indicator scores improved from 2022 to 2023.
- Looking at the same 90 indicator scores, 42% of all subgroup indicator scores performed higher than the state average in 2023.

Glenn O Swing Elementary

- Based on their current overall score of 90.2, Glenn O Swing is at the blue level as one of the highest performing schools in the state. Glenn O Swing is also the 6th highest scoring elementary school in Northern Kentucky and in the top 7% of all elementary schools in the state.

Latonia Elementary

- Based on their current overall score of 74.7, Latonia has moved up into the second highest category of schools reaching the green level for school performance. They need to gain 8.3 pts in 2024 to move to Blue.

John G Carlisle Elementary

- Based on their current overall score of 72.4, John G Carlisle has moved up into the second highest category of schools reaching the green level for school performance in 2023. John G Carlisle needs to gain an additional 10.6 points to move up into the Blue Category for 2024.

Sixth District

- Sixth District had a slight dip in their overall score from 52.7 to 50.7 in 2023. Sixth District needs an increase in their overall score of 4.3 points to move up to the next level in 2024.

Ninth District

- Ninth District moved out of Red into orange because of a 14.2 point improvement in their overall score. They also moved out of CSI. Ninth will need to improve their overall score by 12 points to move into the next category of schools.

Holmes Middle School

- Holmes Middle school showed a 6.5 point gain in their overall score in 2023. Holmes Middle School is still in the orange category. They need to improve in the 2023-24 school year another 8.7 overall points to move up to the next level.
 - The middle school also has two sub-populations (TSI) that they need to focus on in 2023-24:
 - Students with Disabilities – Holmes Middle School showed a 6.6 point growth in Reading and Math and a 19.6 point gain in Science/Social Studies/Combined Writing for this sub population but it was not enough to come out of TSI.
 - English Learners Students – Holmes Middle School showed a 9.1 point growth in Reading and Math in this sub population but it was not enough to come out of TSI status.

Holmes High School

- Holmes High School showed enough growth in their overall score, 6.7 to move out of CSI status in 2023. The high school remained in the red category for overall score. The high school needs a gain of 7 points in their overall score in 2024 to move up to the next level.
 - The high school has two sub-populations (TSI) that they need to focus on in 2023-24:
 - Students with Disabilities – The high school showed an 11.6 gain in Reading and Math, but it was not enough to bring them out of TSI.
 - Hispanic Students – The high school showed an 8.6-point gain in Reading and Math and a 14-point gain in Science/Social Studies/Combined Writing in this sub population but it was not enough to come out of TSI.
