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Dear Parents/Guardians: This report card for the 2010-2011 school year contains important information about our school, including the details about our academic performance, teacher qualifications, learning environment, and more. About Our School: Gallatin County Elementary is a child-centered Primary School serving Preschool through 2nd grade. We enjoy fewer than 500 students. We have an energetic staff that continually strives to improve student's learning. We maintain a safe environment, challenging curriculum, and opportunities to learn through play. We use the Literacy First reading instruction program to systematically and explicitly teach reading skills. Frequent assessing that drives our planning, outside monitoring, and continuous intervention have raised our reading on grade level percentage to above 80%. Math instruction uses SNAP assessment to find students ability level in 5 key areas of understanding. Accelerated Math and KCM strategies are part of math instruction. In all areas of instruction we strive to create work habits and an expectation that fosters independent thinking by each student.

How We Ensure Educational Equity: Educational equity is provided by adherence to policies and procedures of the SBDM that are planned to provide a quality education for each child in our school. Gallatin Elementary strives to provide varied learning experiences that embrace cultural diversity. Flexible and multi-level grouping allow students to learn at their own pace and afford the teachers the opportunity to meet the various learning and social needs of students. We have an active and growing PTSO. Parents serve on the SDBM Council and are invited to be on the committees that determine policy and procedure. In addition, frequent communication is shared with each parent regarding their child's educational progress.

How We Are Doing

Kentucky's Interim School Testing and Accountability System has three parts: the Kentucky Core Content Tests (KCCT); readiness tests by grade level; and other measures of a school's performance, including attendance, retention and dropout rates. This interim system will be replaced in the 2011-12 school year by a new testing and accountability system structured as required by statute. The goal is that, by 2014, nearly all students will score proficient or distinguished in every subject area tested.

Norm-Referenced Test: The ITBS scores are not part of state or federal accountability. The assessment is for diagnostic purposes only. The school and district scores are reported publicly using national percentiles (Percentile Rank of Average Standard Score: National Student Norms). Each national percentile shows a student's performance compared to other students who took the assessment at the same grade level and same time period—fall, mid-spring, or spring as compared to the 2005 norming group.

How We Use Technology To Teach:

Technology is integrated into our classroom curriculum. Each teacher has internet access and an LCD projector to show United Streaming videos, book reader passages, or student work on a clipboard. Many lessons are presented in an Easiteach format. For Related Arts each student is in the school's computer lab for 50 minutes of instruction weekly. Student-use video and still cameras are available in our media center to be checked out. School and individual teachers maintain websites that provide much information. Attendance, report cards, and lesson planning are maintained via computer programs.

Extracurricular Activities: The community provides athletic and scouting activities for children throughout each school year and in the summer. Students have the opportunity to play; soccer, t-ball, g-ball, little league baseball, basketball, and football. Cub Scouts and Brownies are offered to boys and girls. The family Resource centers offers enrichment activities throughout the year.

Awards & Recognitions: The Gold Star student program recognizes students every week for extra effort. We have a celebration for all students participating in Scholastic Reading Count Quizzes. Homeroom teachers select Students of the Month. Kindergarteners who achieve essential skill learning goals become members of the 100 club or ABC club. Proficient and Distinguished students on nationally norm referenced tests receive medals the following spring at a school wide assembly.

What We Are Doing To Improve: Grade level teams meet as Professional Learning Communities. They plan Intervention activities. Specialists in reading and math model instruction and guide teachers in using best practices. Teachers have SMART goals that measure student progress in mastering required skills for that grade level that they review and report to parents 8 times during the school year. We work to connect with our parents to make a welcoming school that is a partner in creating success.
