KRS 157.360 bases SEEK funding upon average daily attendance. KRS 158.030, 158.100, and 159.030 establish the age for compulsory school attendance. KRS 158.070 defines the school term. KRS 158.240 and 159.035 define attendance credit for moral instruction and 4-H activities. KRS 161.200 requires attendance records to be kept by teachers. This administrative regulation establishes a uniform method of recording pupil attendance.
- (c) How this administrative regulation conforms to the content of the authorizing statute: This administrative regulation establishes a uniform method of recording pupil attendance.
