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Points to be noted by Dr. Ledford and Jack Baldwin:

- Focus of Cadet Academy is not solely on discipline; However, middle school students do benefit from a well disciplined and orderly environment.
- The Cadet Academy is a magnet program designed to prepare middle school students for responsible leadership roles within the school and community while making them aware of their rights, responsibilities, and privileges as American citizens. (Direct quote from paragraph 4 of the 1-page program proposal summary)
- The cost of the program primarily covers the expense of providing related arts teachers (such as art, technology, PE, etc). This academy is simply providing students another option for their related arts course work. It does provide additional classes from which students may choose. Having various related arts options (Exploratory) is developmentally appropriate for early adolescents.
- Myers currently offers invention programs and opportunities for students who need them. These opportunities will continue and are actually be enhanced this year through Extended Days three times weekly.
- Myers does not see Cadet Academy as a "silver bullet." They are developing as a PLC, driven by student formative and benchmark assessment data to enhance teaching and learning inside each classroom.
- If student choose to pursue ROTC in high school, that will be their decision to make. Hopefully, participation in Cadet Academy will help prepare him or her academically and to think critically in order to make wise choices.
