## EARLY HEAD START AND HEAD START 2013-14 COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT UPDATE INTRODUCTION

This document is an addendum to JCPS Head Start's 2012-2013 Community Assessment, reflecting changes in the program for the 2013-2014 school year. It also includes a new version of the previous assessment's Community Partners survey and a new survey of Early Head Start parents.

Page numbers cited refer to the final version of the Community Assessment approved by the JCPS Head Start Policy Council on March 21, 2013.


#### **UPDATES**

- 1. Updating the program enrollment numbers on pp. 11-12, JCPS Head Start serves 1,775 students; Early Head Start serves 161. (Enrollment figures are as of March 4, 2014.)
- 2. Regarding the figures for the Pre-Kindergarten program funded by the Kentucky Department of Educations on p. 27, JCPS now serves 2,636 children in this program. This number represents a 25% decline since the 2010-2011 school year, and a decline of 437, or 14%, since last year. (Enrollment figures are as of March 4, 2014.)
- 3. P. 5 and pp. 32-33 referred to changes to Kentucky's childcare subsidies. The proposed budget Kentucky Governor Steve Beshear submitted to the 2014 General Assembly would restore funding for these subsidies to the previous year's levels, but at this writing the legislature has not yet voted on the bill (Loftus, 2014).
- 4. JCPS Head Start once again conducted a survey of groups in the community involved with the needs of Head Start's clients. Several questions were edited slightly from the 2013 survey to include Early Head Start in several questions which previously only referenced Head Start. It was conducted on the SurveyMonkey website in

February 2014. The survey was sent to 23 community partners representing 21 different agencies; 10 responded, for a 43% response rate.

The survey once again showed high awareness of both programs, with 100% of the respondents saying they were knowledgeable about Early Head Start (and 90% showing awareness of the services provided by EHS). Some 80% said they had referred clients to the two programs. Fewer, however (60%) said they had the information they needed to refer clients to the two programs. Asked to choose from a list of 14 physical and social conditions the three that most greatly affect the children of their clients (or that constitute the greatest needs), 70% chose education, and 40% chose dental care and proper supervision. (The complete survey, with results, can be found in Appendix I.)

### **NEW TO COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT**

1. In Spring 2014, JCPS Head Start conducted a survey of parents with children enrolled in Early Head Start (along with parents whose children were on the. EHS waiting list). The survey was sent to 152 parents; 57 answered, for a response rate of 37%.

The results found that 75% of them work, and 40% attend school; of those attending school, 44% are pursuing a 4-year bachelor's degree and another 44% are working toward a two-year associate's degree. Just over one-fifth (22%) have other children under age 3. Most (68%) are familiar with the Kentucky First Steps program.

Comparatively few have an Individual Family Service Plan (IFSP). A majority (60%) have started transition planning with their Early Head Start child, and an overwhelming majority (89%) understand that this transition will involve the child moving into a larger classroom.

Half of the parents say they chose their child's child care center on the basis of location; nearly as many ((44%) said that the center's educational offerings were the primary reason for their choice. Asked about the ways they support their children's education, a large majority (70%) chose daily literacy; 63% selected educational television and 61% said that other family members play a role; 47% purchase materials to help their children's' learning. (The respondents could choose more than one answer.)




### Q1 Are you knowledgeable of the following Jefferson County Public Schools Head Start programs?




Q3 Are you aware of the federal Head Start program, which provides education, social services and health and nutrition services to impoverished children aged four and below, as well as their families?

## Q4 Do you serve families and children whose incomes are at or below the federal poverty level (\$23,850 for a family of four)?



## Q5 Have you or your agency ever referred clients to Early Head Start or Head Start?




## Q6 Do you have the information you need to refer clients to Early Head Start or Head Start?




## Q7 Which of the following conditions impacts or is the greatest needs for the children of your clients (ages four and under)? (Choose only three.)




## Q8 Which populations do you serve the most? (Choose only two)
