Review Item:

702 KAR 7:065, Designation of Agent to Manage Middle and High School Interscholastic Athletics and Revisions in Kentucky High School Athletic Association Bylaws (First Reading)

Applicable Statute or Regulation:

KRS 156.070 702 KAR 7:065 KHSAA Bylaws

History/Background:

Existing Policy. 702 KAR 7:065 (included as attachment "A") designates the KHSAA as the entity to manage middle and high school interscholastic athletics.

This regulation also requires that the Association conduct a biennial review of its Constitution and Bylaws at both the high school and middle school level, and such was done during the 2013-2014 school years by the KHSAA Board of Control.

The proposed changes to the high school requirements that received the requisite 2/3 vote (included as attachment "B") reflect items that were presented to the membership of the Association at its September 29, 2014, annual meeting of high schools. Items considered at this annual meeting are submitted both by the Board of Control as part of its annual Constitution and Bylaws review, and by the member high schools, and are reviewed by the Board of Control prior to the development of the final agenda. At the 2015 annual meeting of the member high schools, 215 schools were present; therefore, all proposals required 144 affirmative votes for passage. In accordance with the KHSAA Constitution and Policies and Procedures as well as the requirements of 702 KAR 7:065, any amendment receiving the requisite vote of the membership is to be considered by the Board of Control and a recommendation made to the Kentucky Board of Education for further action.

In accordance with these procedures, the following amendments to the KHSAA Bylaws for its high school members were approved by the listed votes. These amendments will be considered by the Local Superintendents Advisory Council at its meeting in January, 2015, and have been considered by the Board of Control (BOC) of the KHSAA for implementation during the 2015-16 school year unless otherwise noted and received the requisite vote of the Board of Control.

However, an unintended consequence of Bylaw 9 is that it has not been modernized to reflect changes in NCAA recruiting rules for male student-athletes. Early fall exposure events held on collegiate campuses are now the only times that Division I men's coaches can observe and evaluate prospective student-athletes off campus, other than the observation of practice and competition on a high school campus. This return of recruiting to the high school campus is welcome, but the Bylaw must be modernized to allow for attendance. As it stands now, Kentucky students may attend these one-day showcases/seminars, but technically have to stop participation prior to any scrimmaging or competitive play. This places the Kentucky students in a distinct disadvantage when being measured against their counterparts from other states. This modernization also would memorialize the exception contained in Board of Control policy that allows for females to attend and be evaluated at certified events on a specific weekend in the fall. 		program would assist in clarifying the		
		mission, values and principals of

		The overall responsibilities of the athletic administrator are wide-ranging; however,		
		there is little or no formal education		
		required of the position; thus, preparation		
		for the job is minimal. With societal

		management and security, Title IX, etc., the		
		need exists for on-going continuing		
		education for the Athletic Administrator in

		The role of the Athletic Administrator is ever

		administrators is at an alarming rate, due in		
		large part to the vast majority of new		
		athletic administrators being ill-prepared to

		more pressure will be put on the athletic administrator to have an increased role in the administration of a high school athletic program. For those athletic administrators deemed as administrators by their district, the requirements for annual informational updates are viewed as fairly minimal as existing requirements for twenty-one hours of updates and development exceed any requirement currently contemplated by this regulation. Impact: Regulatory		

The KHSAA is also designated to manage interscholastic athletics at the middle school level. The Middle School Advisory Committee held its first meeting of the year in September and its second meeting in late January. Further items and requests for amendments from these discussions will be brought forward to the Kentucky Board of Education at a later date.
