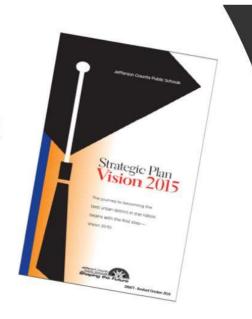

## Strategy 1.3 Early learning and student readiness

Create a coordinated system of early learning interventions that span pre-K through third grade to ensure all Primary students are performing at grade level. **Key Indicator:** Increase in the kindergarten-readiness scores and Primary assessment scores



52% of all JCPS kindergarten students are coming to us *kindergarten ready* per the 2013-14 and 2014-15 BRIGANCE scores

Students from non-JCPS childcare centers, from the home, and from other locations are declining in kindergarten readiness from 2013-14 to 2014-15

2014 KPREP results indicate 46.7% of third graders were proficient or better readers

Pre-K and Head Start students will have spent an incredibly small amount of time in an educational focused setting prior to Kindergarten

Some children come to us with NO prior educational setting experience at all

How do we extend the time we have with these students to "make up the difference" in vocabulary/language development, skill development and social and emotional development?

### Additional Information

Students being served in JCPS Head Start showed a 5.8 % increase in kindergarten readiness from 2013-14 to 2014-15 improving from 47.8% ready to 53.6% ready

### Theory of Action

If we develop a delivery plan to support Early Childhood teachers, staff, students and families that includes the 7 following initiatives and ensure each initiative reaches the desk of every student, then we will increase Kindergarten Readiness levels to 77% Ready by 2020.

- Standards-Based Instruction and Assessment
- Professional Learning Communities (PLCs)
- Communicating a Common Definition of School Readiness
- Family and Community Engagement
- Kindergarten Readiness Strategies Implemented Effectively
- Louisville Metro Cradle to Career/Early Childhood Convening
- Extended Learning Opportunities for Pre-K students and families (NCFL Literacy Partnership, OASIS, Summer Kindergarten College, etc.)

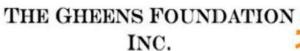


















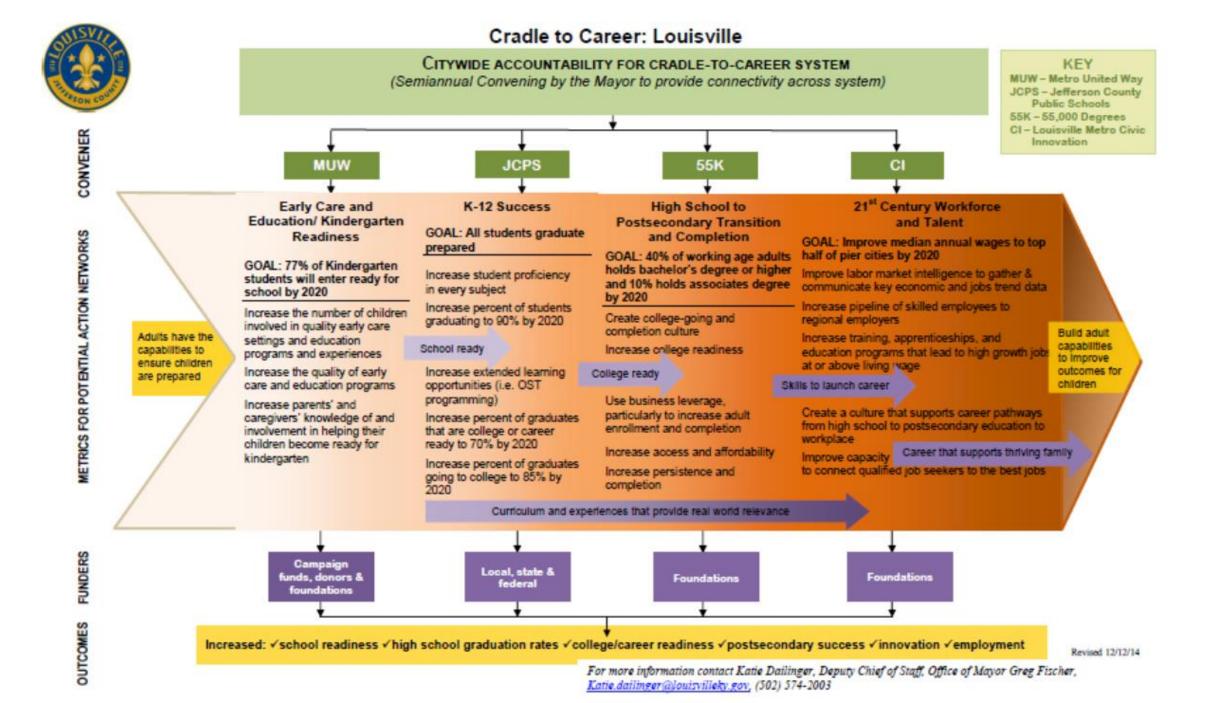


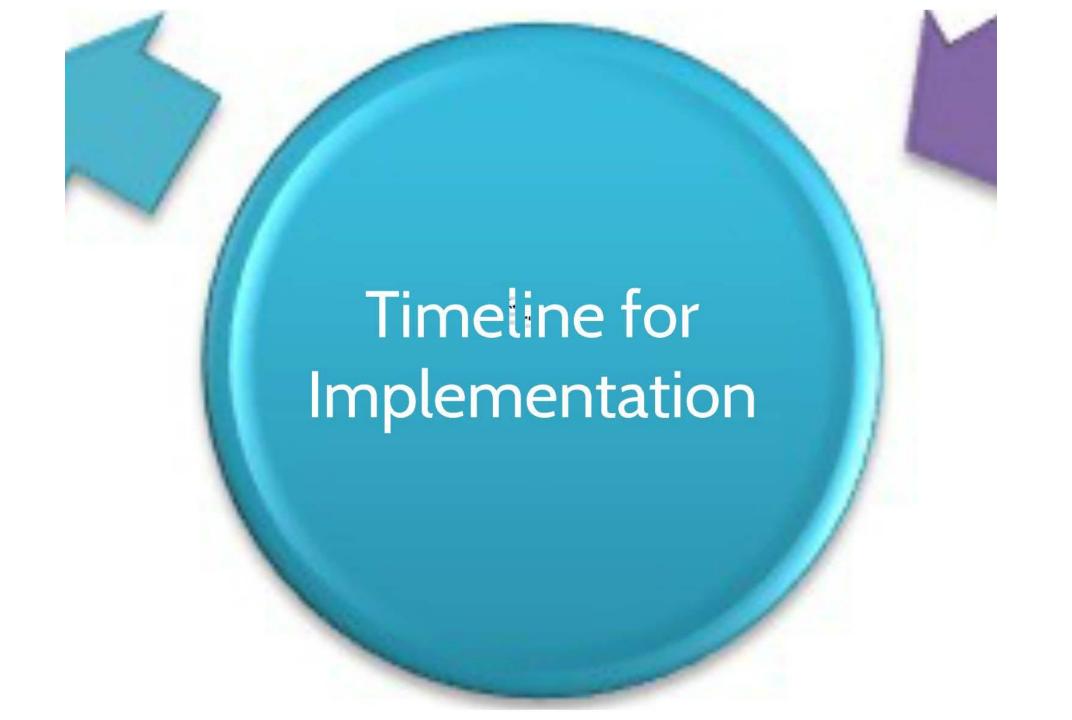

- Pre-School Program Review is underway for 2014-15
- Conducted by KDE and Early Childhood Regional Training Center
- Anticipated Completion is Spring 2016

#### Pre-School Program Review Concerns

- Playgrounds
- Playground equipment and materials
- Instructional time lost due to late busses
- Facility concerns
- State funding vs. number of classrooms
- Support structure for EC instructors

# Considerations for Early Childhood Growth/Expansion

- Quality vs. quantity
- Full day vs. half day services
- Allocation of space/facilities
- Areas of greatest need in the district
- Shortage of applicants/employees
- Transportation
- Wrap around services for families and students

## Moving forward with recruitment

- 7,700 kindergarten students for 2014-15
- 5,591 kindergarten students (72.6%) qualify for F/R lunch
- 3,298 four year olds in JCPS EC in 2013-14
- Difference = 2,293 four year old students

#### Moving forward with recruitment

- BRIGANCE prior setting data tells us that 1,926 incoming K students came straight from home to kindergarten
- 1,598 of those K students were F/R lunch
- Develop an intentional plan to identify, target and recruit these families/similar families in the future with the goal of serving more students in JCPS Early Childhood Program



## Significant Transformation

If we truly want to have a significant impact on Early Childhood, Kindergarten Readiness and Third Grade Reading Proficiency, then we need to have strategies that will bring about major change

#### Kindergarten Readiness Camp

- Five week proactive program targeting areas from our "equity map"
- Use EMBARK data to identify students who are not ready
- Camps would target approximately 2000
  - 3500 incoming kindergarten students
- Work with MUW and Mayor's Office to develop intensive "Kindergarten Countdown"-like recruitment campaign
- Use the "School Readiness Curriculum" already in place
- Resources required:
  - 25 locations/personnel/materials
  - 250 teachers and 200 instructional assistants for 5 weeks-one planning and recruiting - four instructional weeks
  - Total cost estimate: \$3.25 million (excluding transportation)

### Kindergarten Extension

- Add additional six weeks for all K students who are not reading at grade level at the end of kindergarten
- Strategic locations based on the Equity Map
- Resources required for 35 locations:
  - 120 teachers and 75 instructional assistants
  - 35 administrators and 35 office staff
  - Transportation??
  - Total cost estimate: \$2.3 million (excluding transportation)

### Year Round Head Start

- With our new grant, apply to be a year-round Head Start Program in order to extend the learning opportunities for students
- Addresses summer learning loss
- Requires 260-day employees
- Year-round transportation needed
- Increase credentials for staff
- Estimated cost: Additional \$7.6 million above and beyond the \$14.8 million HS grant and \$5.6 million in-kind from the district and other additional indirect costs

## Third Grade Pledge Focused ATTAIn

- Create a structure so all students at kindergarten, first and second grades not "on track" to be reading on grade level by the end of third grade participate in a 6 week Extended Year
- 11,400 students at 90 locations
- 400 teachers and 200 instructional assistants
- Enrichment programs offered-field trips and book rewards
- Community partnerships to encourage attendance
- Media campaign around "Raising the Bar" and the Third Grade Pledge
- Estimated cost: \$6.9 million (excluding transportation)

## Provide Early Childhood Services for all eligible 3 year olds

- Currently we are only funded for and serve 3 year olds with disabilities and some children at 100% poverty
- We do not provide services for 3 year olds between 100% and 160% poverty
- Some 3 year olds at 100% poverty do not get into the program due to space, transportation and other issues
- If we can serve 600 additional 3 year olds, we can have a significant impact on school readiness
- This would require an additional 30 classrooms
- Estimated cost: \$4.3 million
