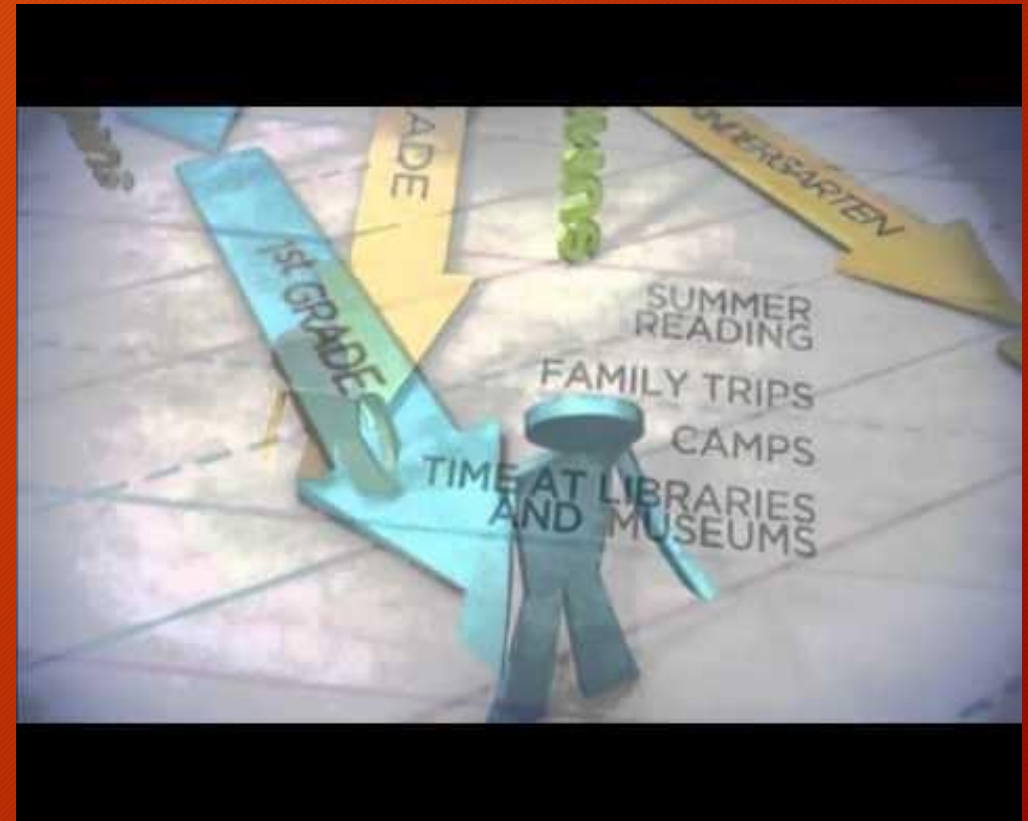
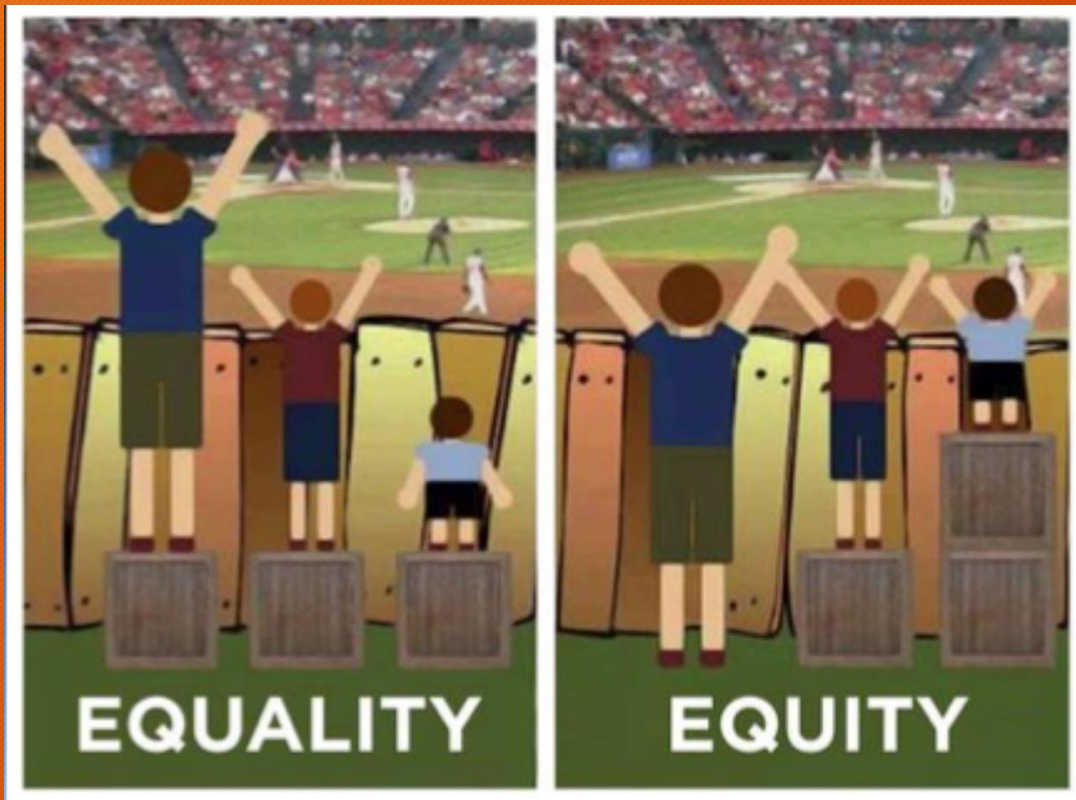
The Importance of Summer Learning



- Summer learning loss accounts for about two-thirds of ninth-grade achievement gap in reading. (Alexander, Entwisle, & Olsen, 2007)
- Summer slide can ultimately have an impact on whether a child graduates high school and makes plans beyond high school. (Alexander, Entwisle, & Olsen, 2007)
- The effects of summer learning programs endure for at least two years after participation. (RAND Corporation, 2011)

The Cost of Summer in the Classroom



More than 500 teachers from 16 different districts across the country were surveyed:

- 66% said they spend 3-4 weeks re-teaching skills lost over the summer. Some took 5 weeks
- 77% strongly agreed that summer program participants were more prepared for the beginning of school
- 88% strongly agreed that summer learning is important to their overall plan to support student success in school

Summer Programs Align with Vision 2015

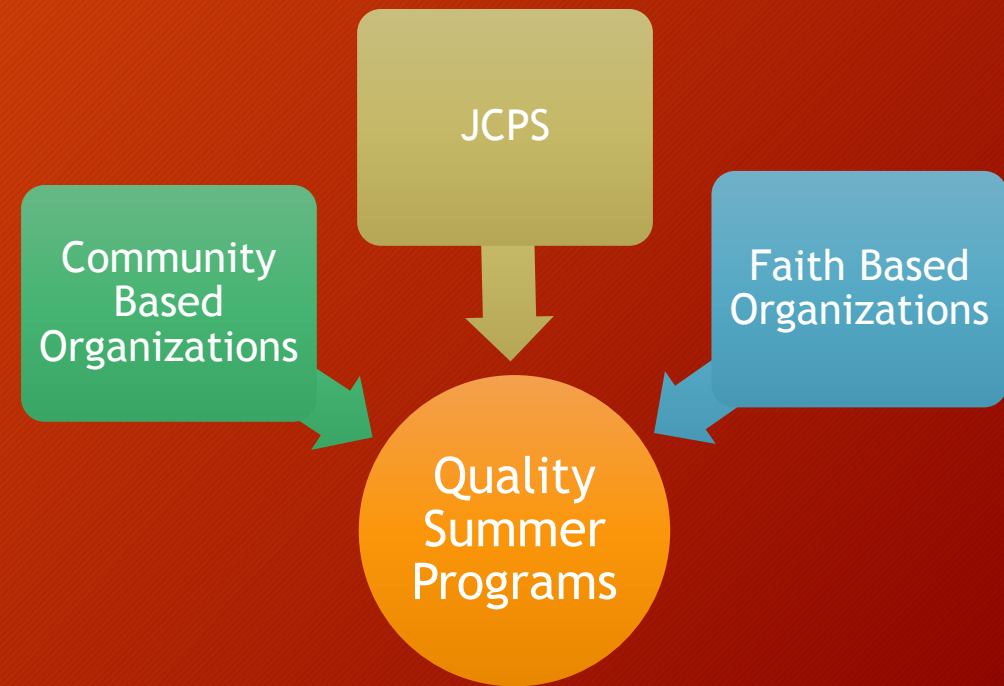

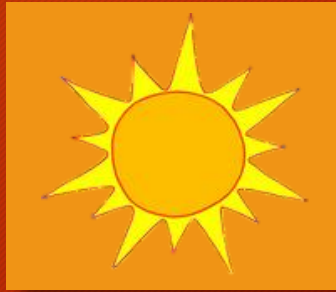
The Power of Partnerships in Summer Learning

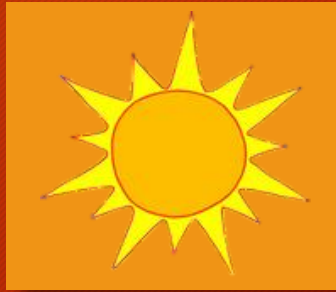


Goals for Summer 2015

Summer Learning in Review



- Summer learning loss is preventable with the support of high- quality, engaging, accessible summer programs.
- The achievement gap widens more during the summer than at any other time of year.
- Summer learning loss adversely affects student achievement, including high school graduation.
- Students from disadvantaged backgrounds are at the highest risk of summer learning loss.
- The effects of summer learning programs endure for at least two years after participation. (RAND Corporation, 2011)
- The cost of summer slide is more than money - it is student success.
