In addition to addressing Proficiency, Gap, CCR and Graduation Rate, schools and districts also will need to address Novice Reduction. As you work on school and district plans, please use your 2015 School Report Cards and secure data spreadsheets to identify the student groups, by school level, that have more than 10 accountable (100 day) students scoring novice. # 5 ADDITIONAL PROGRAM REVIEW AUDIT TRAININGS



Due to an overwhelming response, the Kentucky Department of Education (KDE) is offering three additional Program Review Audit Trainings. A review of the 2015 data indicates that almost every district in the state has had representation at one of the trainings. However, 42 districts have not yet attended one of the six trainings offered in September. In addition, 22 districts had only one attendee

at the sessions. After a careful analysis of the information, three additional trainings have been scheduled in areas closest to those districts that have not attended. #### NEW GAP AND PROFICIENCY DELIVERY TARGETS



The Gap and Proficiency Delivery Targets for the 2014-15 through the 2018-19 school years have changed. They were re-baselined due to action taken by the Kentucky Board of Education at its December 2014 meeting. The original trajectories for these goals were calculated after the first year of K-PREP testing. Now that there are three years of K-PREP testing data available, a more accurate

baseline has been calculated. This has allowed the Kentucky Department of Education to set more accurate delivery goals for the state, districts and schools. A spreadsheet with the new Gap and Proficiency Delivery Targets for the 2014-15 through the 2018-19 school years can be found <a href="here">here</a>. Proficiency Delivery Targets are indicated for all students and various student groups. The Gap Delivery Target is shown in the same file as the Gap Group (non-duplicated). **Please note that this spreadsheet is very large and contains information for all districts.** Because of that, please take care to print only your district's information, if needed.

The new baselines were set by taking an average of the proficiency rates for the 2011-12, 2012-13, and 2013-14 school years. The delivery goals were calculated by taking the average of the proficiency rates of the 2011-12, 2012-13, and 2013-14 school years and subtracting it from 100, then dividing by two and adding it back to the baseline. The difference between the school's/district's baseline and five-year goal is then divided by five to give the incremental gains needed to meet the five-year delivery goal. These new baselines and delivery targets will be included in the online School Report Card when it is released to schools and districts later this month, along with data showing progress toward those targets. Schools and districts will need to use these new targets when revising their consolidated plans. After the release of the school report card, schools and districts have 90 days to submit new plans.

## 7 SEEK TENATIVE CALCULATION 2015-16

What's new?

The 2015-2016 SEEK Tentative Calculation is now available at the <u>KDE SEEK</u> website. As with past Tentative SEEK runs, this calculation includes actual data inputs for prior year AADA, At Risk, Home & Hospital, LEP and property assessments certified by the Department of Revenue. This calculation

determines your district's payments for October 2015 through March 2016. By March 1, 2016, KDE will post the 2015-2016 SEEK Final calculation, which will include Fall Growth and Transportation. ## 8 Early Childhood Focus: What Can We Do as a Region?



Educators have always known that children arrive at kindergarten with varying skills and abilities. And those children who arrive without the expected development are often challenged to catch up with their classmates. The Brigance kindergarten screen, now required in all 173 districts across Kentucky,

indicates that nearly half of all students (more than 24,500 in 2014) enter school less than fully prepared to do kindergarten work. And yet school districts are obligated to meet the needs of all their students. This lack of readiness for kindergarten poses a challenge for your district to the long term academic success of students. The task of getting more students ready for kindergarten has traditionally seemed beyond the scope of work for superintendents and school districts, but we now know that the challenge of universal kindergarten readiness is one that must be owned by the entire community.

START NOW: This work to create a common language for Early Childhood literacy development began in Pendleton County Schools and is beginning to spread to Boone County Schools. The idea is simple: What if our educators, leaders, Sunday school teachers, businesses and families united in 5 common strategies to close the 30,000,000 word gap for our youngest citizens? 9 COMBATTING CHRONIC ABESENTEEISM A growing and compelling body of research demonstrates



that chronic absence from school—typically defined as missing at least 10 percent of school days in a year for any reason, excused or unexcused – is a primary cause of low academic achievement and a powerful predictor of which students will eventually drop out of school. The U.S. Departments of Education (USED) is calling upon states & local education, health, housing, and justice agencies and

organizations, in partnership with community stakeholders, to join forces and commit to creating or enhancing coordinated, cross-sector systems for identifying and supporting students who are, or are at risk of becoming, chronically absent, with the goal of reducing chronic absenteeism by at least 10 percent each year, beginning in the 2015-16 school year. To assist with this effort, a resource has been released called *Every Student, Every Day:* A Community Toolkit to Address and Eliminate Chronic Absenteeism. It can be accessed <a href="here">here</a>.

In spring 2016, the USED will release the 2013-14 Civil Rights Data Collection (CRDC), including the first-ever school-level data on all students across the nation who missed at least 15 days of school for any reason. Take a proactive approach and have an effective plan in place to address chronic absenteeism in your district. You may access the full <a href="Dear Colleague letter">Dear Colleague letter</a>, which goes into greater detail.

School Academic Liaison Grant Award: Great news for closing gaps in 4 NKY middle schools!



KDE has awarded funding that will make it possible for NKCES to hire a School Academic Liaison for the rest of this year and, if things go as planned, for next year. This educator will work with staff at identified schools to improve and integrate RTI processes.

The four Northern Kentucky focus middle schools that currently have the <u>highest gaps between all students and students with disabilities</u> will receive direct benefits of these funds, and we expect all schools to benefit as trainings and experiences are shared online and in person through the co-op. Expected outcomes include reducing gap and reducing the percentage of students with novice scores in reading and mathematics. The schools directly involved are: RA Jones Middle School (Boone County), Tichenor Middle School (Erlanger-Elsmere Independent), Ludlow High School middle school grades 7 and 8 (Ludlow Independent), and Sharp Middle School (Pendleton County).

Linda Alford and her team (Kim Weber, Kimberly Snowball, Michele Augsback, Cindy Waden, Vanessa Groneck, and Kristina Fuller) worked hard with district representatives from these schools, many of whom put in extra time over fall break, when this grant had to be written. Vicki Dansberry provided guidance for their work and this team dug in deep with less than a 3 week turn-around on the application. With Vicki's writing ability and the team's knowledge, they created a quality application that shined! Thanks to you all for once again going the extra mile on behalf of our schools and students. Congrats to each district & thanks for your support of the NKCES Grants Consortium--we are excited about this opportunity to provide additional support to students!!!
