

History in Kentucky

- •In the spring of 2010, the KY General Assembly amended KRS 161.048 which created the 8th option to an alternative certificate in KY.
- •Shortly thereafter, the EPSB promulgated rules to put into place Option 8 and began issuing temporary, provisional certificates to TFA candidates in June of 2011.
- •Currently, Option 8 is a pilot program linked directly to the federal Race to the Top program; however, the EPSB has the authority under KRS Chapter 13A to make Option 8 a permanent option.

Key Program Statistics

- Partnerships with 21 districts (up from 4 in 2011)
- •52 corps members
 - •70% in secondary STEM and foreign language
 - •Remaining 30% spread among all other subjects

- •130 TFA alumni across Kentucky
- •66% of alumni continue to work in education

Annual Principal Survey

- 93% of principals rated corp members as good, very good or excellent in terms of knowledge of their subject matter.
- 100% of principals agree/strongly agree that they are satisfied with their TFA corp members.
- 100% of principals agree/strongly agree that TFA corp members make a positive difference in their school.
- 85% of principals agree/strongly agree that TFA teachers have a greater impact on student achievement than other beginning teachers.

State Funding

- •Legislature included funding for TFA in the FY15/16 budget bill during the spring session of 2014
- •In exchange for \$500,000 in the biennium, TFA promised to:
 - •Bring in a total of 60 additional teachers for the 2014-2015 and 2015-2016 school years
 - Expand to at least 5 new counties
 - Match the public funding 3:1 with private funding
- Funding specifically supported:
 - Recruitment of teachers within KY and across the country to Appalachia (including regional recruitment)
 - Initial training of new teachers before they begin teaching—including coursework, room and board, transportation, etc.
 - On-going support, training and coaching of teachers during their two-year commitment (and beyond, if they choose to stay)

Our future in Kentucky

- •TFA Appalachia currently the highest performing rural region within TFA
- Demand for teachers during 2015-2016 school year was double our supply
- Legislature asked to renew \$500,000 appropriation for FYs 2017 and 2018
