JCPS Legislative Agenda

- Provide the JCPS Superintendent Greater Authority to Select Principals
- Develop and Implement Sustainable Solution to KTRS & CERS Unfunded Liability
- Develop and Implement Innovative Assessment & Accountability Models
- Provide Increased Funding for Elementary & Secondary Education

Provide JCPS Superintendent Greater Authority to Select Principals

HB184, AN ACT relating to schools, passed

Sponsored by Rep. Jeff Donohue, support in Senate led by Senator Dan Seum

- Provides an alternative principal selection process for JCPS when a vacancy occurs:
 - Permits the Superintendent to recommend a candidate to an SBDM Council in closed session
 - Requires SBDM to keep the candidate's name and discussion confidential
 - Allows council to have the option to interview the recommended candidate
 - If the recommendation is not accepted, the standard principal selection process is used
- Makes a discretionary action taken by an SBDM Council subject to the provisions of employer-employee bargained contracts between a district and employees
- Allow a superintendent's spouse previously employed to be an employee of a school district

Develop and Implement Solution to Unfunded Pension Liability

HB 303 provides significant new funding to Kentucky's pension system

- Total of \$1.284 Billion in new funding was provided across all systems
- \$125 Million to Permanent Pension Fund to begin to address unfunded pension liability
- KTRS received

- Bonding was not used to fund support for retirement systems
- Budget surplus: In 2016-17, 50% to Permanent Pension Fund; in 2017-18, 25% to KTRS Unfunded pension liability

Innovative Assessment & Accountability Models

HB 92, AN ACT relating to districts of innovation.

Sponsored by Rep. Larry Clark

- Allow a waiver or modification of the statewide assessment system for schools participating in a district of innovation plan
- Allow a district of innovation to use student assessments other than those required by the state board, under specific conditions

HB 92 passed House 91-0. No action taken in Senate.

Key Education Legislation Passed

HB 626, AN ACT relating to the development of a highly trained workforce in the Commonwealth and making an appropriation therefor.

Sponsor: Rep. Greg Stumbo, Speaker of the House

Creates Work Ready Kentucky Scholarship Program

- New scholarship program for students in dual-credit programs, and for those students to continue their education at a postsecondary institution.
- Provides funding to make up the gap between other grants and awards and the cost of the tuition.
- Students must maintain a grade point average of 2.5.

Note: The bill also addresses the new performance-based funding for public postsecondary institutions.

Key Education Legislation Considered, Not Passed

SB 1, AN ACT relating to public education and declaring an emergency.

Sponsor: Sen. Mike Wilson Chair of the Senate Education Committee

Significant legislation that would have:

- Restructured state accountability system
- Created a new, comprehensive review of the Kentucky Core Academic Standards
- Altered the teacher evaluation system
- Reduced of state intervention in priority schools and teacher evaluations

SB 1 passed the Senate 25-12. No action taken in the House.

Key Education Legislation Considered, Not Passed

SB 253, AN ACT relating to charter schools and making an appropriation therefor.

Would have created a public charter school pilot program (2017-18 to 2021-22):

- In Jefferson and Fayette County Schools only
- Two authorizers: Local board and state commission
- Same funding as traditional public schools
- School governed by local board with same powers of a local board of education except taxing authority
- Schools required to participate in state assessment and accountability system

SB 253 passed Senate 28-9. No action taken in House.

- Maintains SEEK at current year levels
 - If appropriation is insufficient, up to \$10 million annually is provided as a Necessary Government Expense, reducing likelihood of mid-year cuts
- Most grant programs kept at current levels:
 - FRYSCs
 - Extended School Services
 - Professional Growth
 - Preschools
 - Textbooks, Gifted & Talented

- **Pre-K:** Pilot program establishes preschool enrollment eligibility for families up to 200% of federal poverty level, dependent on availability of funding and enrollment growth.
- **Pre-K:** Provides \$7.5 Million each year to create a grant program to incentivize public-private cooperation in the development of full-day preschool programs for income eligible families.
- Education & Workforce Bonds: Provides \$100 million bond pool for workforce development projects administered by Education & Workforce Development Cabinet.
- Facilities Evaluation: Provides \$2 million in each year for a statewide evaluation and classification of school facilities by condition.

Provisions pertaining to Jefferson County-Specific Grants

- Georgia Chaffee TAPP Program: Funding maintained at current level of \$227,000 per year.
- Every1Reads Program: Funding reduced 50% from \$451,400 to \$227,900 per year.
- Reporting on local grant funds: Adds language to require KDE to report annually on the performance outcomes of the Every1 Reads Program, Georgia Chaffee Teenage Parent Program, Lexington Hearing and Speech Center, Heuser Hearing and Language Academy, Visually Impaired Preschool Services Program, and Teach for America.

Governor has until Wednesday April 27, 2016, to issue line item vetoes to the Executive Branch Budget
