

Lincoln Elementary School "Home of the Little Devils" Board Report for June 15, 2016

- LES students read a total of 19,890 AR books for the 2015-2016 school year which is an increase of 6,286 books compared to the total of 13,604 books that were read last year. There is great momentum with literacy as our students only read 8,232 books for the entire 2014-2015 school year. Students made a serious effort to read as much as possible this year and were rewarded for their dedication to literacy. The LES library will be open to our students through 6/27 on Mondays and Wednesdays from 10am-1pm. Students are being challenged with a summer reading goal to help maintain the current momentum that we have when it comes to a love for literacy. We have also made a commitment to our students through offering primary activity calendars and grade level assigned reading selections for the summer months.
- ❖ Students in grades 1-6 participated in the Renaissance Learning Program known as Math Facts in a Flash again this year. Each student began at Level 1 and had to master their math facts under a 2:00 time limit before moving on to the next level. Each grade level had a certain level to reach before earning a t-shirt. There were 41 students who earned a t-shirt this year.
- ❖ There are a total of approximately 40 students in grades 4-6 who have been attending summer school sessions that began on 6/6 and conclude on 6/17. Students who failed any of their core content classes were required to attend in order to be promoted to the next grade level. Other students in attendance were recommended by their teachers due to needing extra assistance.
- ❖ Teachers have completed the individual student profile sheets for all their students this past school year. The profile sheets have been placed in their cumulative folders and will be passed along to the students' new teachers for the upcoming school year. They will also be utilized to help establish new RTI groups for reading and math in the fall of 2016. The student profile sheets have been a great resource for us when it comes to validating individual student growth and tracking longitudinal data.



- ❖ The One to One Reading Program at LES was another huge success this school year for the students in grades 1-3 who participated. The LES administrators are proud to share that our students showed gains on their Reading MAP scores and increased their fluency by increasing their words per minute.
- ❖ LES teachers and administrators participated in numerous teacher working sessions during the end of May and first part of June. Teachers participated in sessions that focused on school safety, curriculum alignment, common assessments, and zones of regulation training. We will also have a group of teachers participating in the Junior Great Books PD on 8/8-9 that focuses on a shared inquiry approach being utilized in the classroom.
- ❖ Summer Learning continues to occur at LES as we strive to attack the summer learning slide that typically occurs with our students. Students have been attending the LES library during the summer hours and taking AR tests. The 21<sup>st</sup> Century Summer Program is going well with students participating in numerous enrichment activities and field trips every Thursday. We will also be offering a summer Drama Camp for approximately 50 students on 6/12-18 with a culminating performance being held at the end. There will be incoming kindergarten students signed up for "Me and My School" to help with the transition to kindergarten. We will have numerous students attending the LES Chess Camp on 6/18-22 that is sponsored in its entirety by the Cris Collingsworth Pro Scan group. The Primary Jumpstart will also be offered again for students in grades 1-4 with a primary focus being on the essential grade level skills for reading and math.
