June 7, 2016 Clark County Board of Education District Facilities Plan Hearing Report

A public hearing was held at the George Rogers Clark High School on June 7, 2016 at 6:00pm. The purpose of the public hearing was to propose a new District Facility Plan developed by the Clark County Public School District Local Planning Committee. The Local Planning Committee (LPC) voted 15-1 in favor of the proposed new plan and the Board voted 3-2 to approve the new plan.

There were 7 people at the hearing exclusive of the hearing officer. Don Martin Served as the locally appointed hearing officer. Those in attendance were: Donald Stump, Paul Christy, Davies Nichols, Mike Rogers, Scott Loscheider, Whitney Leggett, Mike Napier.

Comments:

The hearing officer called the public hearing to order. The hearing officer outlined the purpose of the hearing and the hearing procedures in accordance with 702 KAR 1:001. It was explained that those persons wishing to speak would be given the opportunity and that written statements would be accepted. All considerations will be made available to the Kentucky Board of Education via the hearing officer's report. The hearing officer read the proposed new District Facility Plan with includes: Priority One project of completing Phase 2 of the George Rogers Clark High School project: Priority Two projects consisting of renovation projects at Campbell, McClure, Strode Station, Phoenix, Shearer, and Baker; Priority 4 projects consisting of improvements at the Central Office, bus garage, maintenance building and area tech center; Discretionary projects included additions/renovations/improvements at Conkwright, Campbell Field House, Phoenix, and Justice.

No one chose to speak at the public hearing. The floor was open for comments at 6:00pm and was left open until 6:20 pm.

Recommendations:

It is recommended that the new District Facility Plan as developed by the Clark County Local Planning Committee and adopted by the Clark County Board of Education be approved as the District Facility Plan for the Clark County School District. A copy of the new plan is attached.

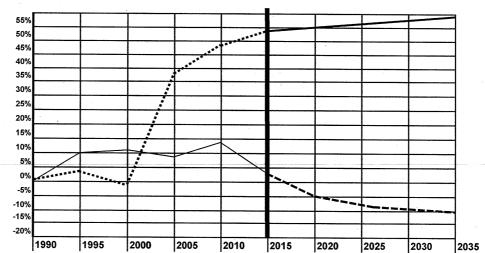

RUSSELL COUNTY SCHOOLS DISTRICT* DISTRICT FACILITIES PLAN HEARING REPORT

A public hearing was held at the Jamestown Elementary School on May 16, 2016, at 5:31 PM (local time). The purpose of the public hearing was to propose a new District Facility Plan developed by the Russell County Local Planning Committee. The Local Planning Committee (LPC) voted 12-0 in favor of the proposed new plan and the Board voted 4-1 to approve the new plan.

There were eight persons at the hearing, exclusive of the hearing officer; Michael Ford; Russell County Schools Superintendent, Chris Bell; Russell County Schools, Carol Delk, Russell County Schools, David Scot Weston; Russell County Schools, Gerald Murray; Russell County School Board Member, Tonya Adams; Russell County Schools, Diane S. Blankenship; Jamestown Elementary School Principal, and Richard Kazak; Russell County School Board Member. Hearing officer Tim Lucas, Lucas P-12 Educational Planning, served as the locally-appointed hearing officer.

COMMENTS

Mr. Lucas called the public hearing to order. The hearing officer outlined the purpose of the hearing and the hearing procedures in accordance with 702 KAR 1:001. It was explained that those persons wishing to speak would be given the opportunity and that written statements would be accepted. All considerations will be made available to the Kentucky Board of Education via the hearing officer's report and the recorded testimony.

The hearing officer read the proposed new District Facility Plan which includes; no change in the district organization is noted. The following buildings will receive renovations and additions; Russell County High, Russell County Middle, Russell County Auditorium/Natatorium Building, Jamestown Elementary, Russell Springs Elementary and Salem Elementary. New buildings will include; a new Alternative School and a new Area Technology Center. Management Support projects include; Major renovation and additions to the Central Office, Bus Garage and Maintenance Building. Discretionary projects will include the construction of athletic fields to include football stadium, track, tennis, press boxes and toilets for all sports, 8 lane track with field events.

The floor was opened to those who wished to make a statement. Mr. Murray spoke and expressed the following; he noted that the costs proposed on the Plan were expensive and that the work would not be able to be undertaken overnight. He expressed

concern that the costs would continue to increase as time passed. He also expressed concerns over changes to the school district that may be mandated by the Government and how it may affect future enrollment if parents in the district chose to move to private schools. He suggested that the Plan should reflect costs that the district can afford and noted that it is hard to explain to the taxpayers how this plan could be afforded.

Mr. Lucas thanked the Russell County Schools Board of Education and Local Planning Committee for their efforts in developing a great District Facility Plan.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that the new District Facility Plan developed by the **Russell County** Local Planning Committee and adopted by the **Russell County** Board of Education be approved as the District Facility Plan for the **Russell County** School District. A copy of the new plan is attached.

TRIMIBLE COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT DISTRCT FACILITIES PLAN HEARING REPORT*

A public hearing was held at the <u>Bedford Elementary School</u> on <u>June 16, 2016</u>, at <u>7:00 p.m.</u> (local time). The purpose of the public hearing was to propose a new District Facility Plan developed by the <u>Trimble County</u> Local Planning Committee. The Local Planning Committee (LPC) voted <u>0</u> opposed and <u>14</u> in favor of the proposed new plan and the Board voted <u>0</u> opposed and <u>5</u> to approve the new plan.

There was/were (26) number of persons at the hearing exclusive of the hearing officer individual(s) in attendance. Tony Walker, Trimble County Board Chairman, served as the locally-appointed hearing officer. Steve Miracle, Superintendent, Jodi Ginn, Board Vicechair, Kerry Callis, Board Member, Kim Temple, Board Member, Jessica Wilcoxson, Assistant Superintendent, Danny Black, Head Maintenance, Terra Lynn March Teacher, Debbie Beeles, Principal, Dave Taylor, Editor of Trimble Banner, Betsy Liston, Rotary, Jenna Stevens, Speech Pathologist, Angela Wieczireck, TCMS employee, Michael Slider, Principal, Frederica Congleton, parent, Connie Sutherland, teacher, Brenda Poe, instructional assistant, Chris Abbott, parent, Lisa O'Neal, community member, Tara Isley, Librarian, Melissa West, Parent, Walter Logan, Farmer, Deana Arnold, community member, Phyllis McLaughlin, Madison Courier, Mary Jane Sibley, TCPS employee, Shelly Ginn, teacher, Carolee Kunkel, teacher, and Tracy Poe, assistant principal, was/were present.

COMMENTS

Mr. Tony Walker called the public hearing to order. The hearing officer outlined the purpose of the hearing and the hearing procedures in accordance with 702 KAR 1:001. It was explained that those persons wishing to speak would be given the opportunity and that written statements would be accepted. All considerations will be made available to the Kentucky Board of Education via the hearing officer's report. The hearing officer read the proposed new District Facility Plan which includes; The Trimble County Local Planning Committee approved District Facility Plan that changes the school organization from the current p-k-5, 6-8, 9-12 configuration to p-k-6, 7-8, 9-12. The school centers in the proposed plan would combine the current high school facility into a 7-8 center and a 9-12 center with an estimated population of 403 students. The current middle school would become and educational center housing an alternative program, administrative offices, and other educational programs as needed. Bedford Elementary would become a P-6 center with an estimated population of 378 students. Milton Elementary would become a P-6 center with an estimated population of 319 students. Trimble County Middle/High School is listed as the first priority for renovation/addition of educational facilities calling for new construction to replace the 29,000 sf built in 1962, the 34,850 sf (less the gymnasium) built in 1968, and part (5,358 sf) of the section built in 1994. It proposes major renovation of the gymnasium and auxiliary spaces (16,150 sf) of all building systems. It provides for renovation of two classrooms at the current middle school for an alternative program as well as major renovation of the

current middle school. This is listed because that building is still in operation and owned by the district so regulation requires it to be a part of the plan. It also must be listed in order accurately estimate the total unmet need for funding for the district. The above priorities are scheduled within the 2018-2020 biennium. Capital construction priorities scheduled after the 2018-2020 biennium are technology and security upgrades at Bedford Elementary and Milton Elementary schools and new construction of a 3 bay bus garage. The total cost estimate (District Need) for this plan is \$33,662,969.

The floor was opened to those who wished to make a statement. Mr. Walter Logan was the only person to sign up to speak. His statement follows:

I am pro education because I spent 30 years up here. My wife and whole family spent a whole lot of time at the middle school, and high school, and footballs games, basketball games and whatever. So I am pro education. My question is, the county does not have the money to run because they closed down the landfill. They had to put on a tax on our insurance, so everybody in the county got taxed on their insurance. Now if the county if the county doesn't have enough money to run on how we going to pay 33 or 34 million dollars for a new school? How much are you going to raise my taxes? I'm for education now, I'm not against it.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that the new District Facility Plan developed by the Trimble County Local Planning Committee and adopted by the Trimble County Board of Education be approved as the District Facility Plan for the Trimble County School District. A copy of the new plan is attached.
