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U.S. Charter Schools

- Laws passed in 43 states and DC
 - Tremendous variation in states' laws
- First law passed in MN in 1991
- As of 2016, more than 6,700 public charter schools. Nearly 3 million children attend public charter schools.





What are public charter schools?

- Public schools
 - Publicly funded
 - Do not charge tuition
 - Open to the public
- Organized and governed by private organizations, or state and local public entities
- Provided flexibility in organization and governance
- Held accountable for meeting student performance goals as articulated in their contracts (charters)
- Held accountable for how public dollars are spent





What is a charter?

- Performance-based contract between a public charter school and its authorizer
- Spells out details under which the school is governed and held accountable





What is a charter authorizer?

- Receives applications from charter petitioners
- Enters into a contract with a public charter school
- Ensures charter school compliance with charter contracts
- Renews and revokes charter contracts





Examples of authorizers

- Local boards of education
- State boards of education
- Chief state school officers
- Higher education institutions
- Nonprofit organizations
- Independent charter boards
- Municipal governments
 - Mayor's office
 - City Council





How are charter schools funded?

- Per-pupil basis
- Receive varying percentages of state and local funding across the states
- May be awarded start-up grants
- Eligible for special federal funding for public charter schools
- May receive philanthropic donations (as traditional public schools)
