Raising a Local Scholarship

- Say Yes partners with whole cities and counties that are committed to **raising a scholarship** to support all students in reaching the goal of postsecondary completion
- Say Yes provides the **incentive** for the community to organize, **expert consulting support** for determining the fundraising goals, and long-term **administration of the scholarship**
- This scholarship enables communities to **support all graduates of the public school district with a tuition scholarship** to any public college or university and community colleges
- Say Yes assumes a full “last dollar” tuition scholarship for graduates. Due to a variety of factors specific to Louisville and Kentucky, that would be cost prohibitive, so a number of other scenarios are being investigated.

Local Cross-Sector Facilitation Team

- Facilitation and coordination of **Cross-Sector Collaborative** (including Community Leadership Council, Operating Committee, Task Forces, and Scholarship Board)
 - Coordination of **communication**
 - Regarding outcomes, family access for programs and services, donor relations, family access and donor events, and media
 - Coordination of **local scholarship activities**
 - Including student access, gathering data, college/career planning, and communication with parents/students (customer service)
 - Coordination of **local data functions**
 - Including gathering of data, maintaining and updating the student data platform for postsecondary success, and supporting implementation
 - Coordination of **cross-sector program delivery**
 - Including after school programs, summer programs, legal clinics, mental health services, physical health services, Internships, externships
- **Office of local operation** houses leadership staff, and meeting space
 - Including **hospitality and support** for donor relations/events to raise endowment and meeting support for cross-sector partners

Where Things Stand with Say Yes in Louisville

- It appears that Say Yes IS NOT planning at this time to engage with Louisville as a full Say Yes to Education City (\$15 million for five years, local Say Yes staff).
- Say Yes IS interested in remaining partners with Louisville through a new Center it is creating with America's Promise to disseminate the Say Yes model more broadly.
- Cradle to Career Cabinet has expressed a commitment to:
 - Pursue implementation of the Say Yes Model
 - Serve as the Operating Committee under the model
 - Take steps to formalize the governance structure
 - Establish a local, independent entity to provide coordination and serve as an "honest broker."
 - Find other sources of funding to support implementation
- Cradle to Career Cabinet will have a retreat in early February

Supports in the Syracuse School District: Before & After Say Yes to Education

BEFORE

- 0 legal clinics
- Only offered remedial summer programs, served 1200 students
- Afterschool programing only at 21st century sites at 7 schools
- 0 Family Support Specialists
- 20% of students not in a healthcare program

AFTER

- 6 legal clinics
- Summer and After-school programs are available to all elementary school students
- Family Support Specialists in all 33 school buildings
- Only 5% of students not enrolled in a healthcare program
- Mental health clinics at every elementary school

Syracuse: Early Wins

- 43% reduction in foster care placements
- District enrollment increased by 1,200 students in the first year of Say Yes after 10 years of steadily declining enrollment prior
- 3,002 students have enrolled in a postsecondary program with Say Yes supports

Buffalo: A Fuller Implementation



Buffalo: Early Wins—Infrastructure

- \$25 million raised toward scholarships
- Full governance model is launched with eight task forces launched and three in the pipeline
- The quarterly CLC meeting attract an average of 200 individuals
- 55 school-based mental health clinics launched (55 total buildings)
- 5 operational legal clinics
- Mobile health clinics being launched
- All 33,000 students are enrolled in the Postsecondary Planning System
- 100% of schools are staffed with Family Support Specialists
- Working with the school district to bring the afterschool programming framework to scale
- Summer Camp offered at 35 sites, delivered by 33 community based service providers

Buffalo: Early Wins—Outcomes

- Enrollment increases in BPS in first two years of Say Yes
 - Reversed long-standing decline
 - Enrollment of white students increased for first time in over a decade
- Some significant increases in elementary school test scores
- 13 percentage point increase in graduation rate
- Nine percentage point increase in college matriculation
- 2000+ class of 2013 and 2014 students started college with help from Say Yes

Differentiating the Say Yes Strategic Data Approach

- The Say Yes Strategy recognizes that community transformation is a marathon, not a sprint
- Data is an integral part of the comprehensive, sustainable Say Yes Strategy at scale
- Student, school, and district level data is collected at each step along “the Pathway to Postsecondary Success”
- Data informs the work of school, district, city, and county leaders, and the collaborative governing bodies who are empowered to take responsibility for the outcome goals along the “Pathway”
- Data is utilized on an ongoing basis to ensure that service systems are in place and aligned to meet the needs of students and families
- Say Yes structures and processes build and support a culture that embraces the use of data, and data drives the capacity for continuous improvement through shared responsibility, not finger-pointing

Differentiating Say Yes

- Say Yes uses a **scholarship incentive**, upfront **investment**, and **facilitation capacity** to get whole communities to commit to doing business in a fundamentally different way in the **long term**.
- Say Yes pays attention to the **conditions** necessary for **successful implementation**, and cultivates the **trust** and **local ownership** necessary to **sustain the work**.
- Say Yes ensures **transparent accountability** for outcomes and **transparent fiscal management**, and provides capacity for fiscal and programmatic analytics.
- Say Yes leads with **postsecondary completion goals and a process** for reaching them, not with compliance-based programs.
