

Louisville Context, 2011-2016



In the past six years:

- □ 2011–Present
 - Unemployment Rate fell from 10.4% to 3.5%
 - 2,500 new businesses
 - 55,000 new jobs
 - 44.7% of people with college degrees
 - \$9 billion of capital investment underway in city
 - 10,000 people (16 and over) lifted out of poverty
 - Selected for Racial Equity Here effort led by Living Cities and Government Alliance on Race Equity



JCPS Context, 2015-16




- 100,600 Students attending 172 schools
- 32 National Merit Scholars
- Earned over \$156,000,000 in scholarships
- 47% White; 36% African American; 9% Hispanic; 4%
 Asian 4% Other
- 64% are eligible for free or reduced lunch
- □ 123 Languages Spoken
- 6,128 Homeless Students

Challenges



- African-American unemployment rates are 2.5x as high as White unemployment rates: 11.8% vs 4.5%.
- More than 50% of children in Louisville start kindergarten already behind.
- In our high poverty schools, 28% of students are proficient in reading versus 66% in low poverty schools.
- There is a 74% gap between the lowest and highest reading proficiency school in Jefferson County.
- Across the district, only two in ten African American students on free and reduced-price meals are proficient in reading.


