### JESSAMINE COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT DISTRICT FACILITIES PLAN HEARING REPORT\*

A public hearing was held at the Herbert P. Royse Administrative Building on April 13, 2017, at 6:00 PM (local time). The purpose of the public hearing was to propose a revision to the District Facility Plan developed by the Jessamine County Local Planning Committee. The Local Planning Committee (LPC) voted 14-0 in favor of the proposed revised plan and the Board voted 4-0 in favor to approve the revised plan.

There were no individual(s) in attendance. Val Gallutia, Jessamine County Assistant Superintendent/Chief Operations Officer, served as the locally-appointed hearing officer. No one, other than the hearing officer, was present.

#### COMMENTS

Val Gallutia called the public hearing to order. The hearing officer outlined the purpose of the hearing and the hearing procedures in accordance with 702 KAR 1:001. It was explained that those persons wishing to speak would be given the opportunity and that written statements would be accepted. All considerations will be made available to the Kentucky Board of Education via the hearing officer's report. The hearing officer read the proposed new District Facility Plan which includes; relocate The Providence School to the Computrex Drive property and make a major renovation/addition of that property, which includes a small engine CTE program addition, major renovation/roof replacement at Rosenwald Dunbar Elementary School, site work to address safety concerns at Wilmore Elementary School, renovation of the Jessamine Career and Technology Center to support classroom core content classrooms, a major renovation of areas not renovated in last 30 years at the Jessamine Early Learning Village to support additional classroom and support spaces, addition or career a technical education spaces at East Jessamine High School, and the renovation/addition of career technical education spaces at West Jessamine High School, along with discretionary projects that include renovation of and installation of synthetic turf and track to East Jessamine High School football filed, renovation of space in the Jessamine Early Learning Village to support Central Office services and Adult Education, and renovation to address masonry deterioration on the building.

The floor was opened to those who wished to make a statement. Since no one was in attendance at the hearing, no statements were entered into record.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that the new District Facility Plan as developed by the Jessamine County Local Planning Committee and adopted by the Jessamine County Board of Education be approved as the revised District Facility Plan for the Jessamine County School District. A copy of the revised plan is attached.



The purpose of the public hearing was to propose an amended District Facility Plan developed by the <u>Shelby County</u> Local Planning Committee. The Local Planning Committee (LPC) voted <u>17-0</u> in favor of the proposed amended plan and the Board voted <u>4-0</u> to approve the amendment.

There was/were (2) number of persons at the hearing exclusive of the hearing officer individual(s) in attendance. Robert Goodwin, Community Leader and LPC Chairperson, served as the locally-appointed hearing officer. Robert Goodwin-Community Leader, Kerry D. Whitehouse-Assistant Superintendent for Facilities (SCPS), David Boien, parent with children at East Middle School were present.

The hearing officer read the proposed amendment to the District Facility Plan which includes;

- Move 8th grade back to middle school centers making both high schools 9-12 centers.
- Construct to accommodate middle school enrollments for grades 6-8 by constructing K-8 center, and/ or enlarging East/ West Middle to 900 student capacities.
- Construct space to accommodate Big Picture Learning Center
- Multiple sites & campus upgrades related to traffic flow, playgrounds, outdoor classrooms and parking lots.
- Construct an Agriculture/ Construction Academy on the Benson Road Farm property.
- Option to build new or renovate support facilities such as the Bus Garage and Snow Hill Maintenance/ Warehouse.
- Major renovation to Shelby County High School facility.
- Major renovation to Shelby County High School campus/ athletics on Rocket Lane.
- Construct support facilities for Martha Layne Collins baseball, softball, cross country program to include locker rooms, indoor practice facilities and restrooms.
- Add facility at Discovery Boulevard bus compound to include restrooms and small meeting spaces.

The floor was opened to those who wished to make a statement.

There were no written letters or email submissions from the public to be read. David Boien, parent of East Middle stated that he feels that regardless if East Middle School's capacity is increased attention needs to be given to a new East Middle gymnasium, and outdoor basketball courts. He also feels that Wright Elementary needs to have an updated and improved playground for children at recess. He feels attention and focus to areas to enhance physical education and physical activities should be a focus in future projects at these two schools.
