## Newport High School Behavior Plan:

The Tier II Interventions listed below are provided in a small group atmosphere. Ms. Gearding works with these groups to assist students with their behavioral, emotional, and/or social needs.

- Mentoring Program-Counselors utilize the Persistence to Graduation report provided in Infinite Campus, which identifies students who may be off track to be promoted to the next grade level or graduate on time, to identify high risk students. These students were then paired with upperclassmen to mentor them and help guide them throughout the school year.
  - Total amount receiving assistance- 76/642 (Total number of students in Newport High School)- 11.8%- This is provided for our 7-12 population
- Green Dot- Implementation of Green Dot in Kentucky high schools significantly decreased not only sexual violence perpetration but also other forms of interpersonal violence perpetration and victimization. The CDC-funded study evaluated Green Dot bystander intervention in 26 high schools over 5 years and confirms that Green Dot for High Schools reduces rates of sexual abuse, dating violence, stalking, and other interpersonal violence by statistically significant percentage. Newport High School has implemented this program for the past 3 years. Twenty-five students are trained after being identified in the beginning of the year by peers. Selection is based on students who will have a positive and strong influence throughout the school. Trained students remain in the program throughout their entire school career and new students are added each year to replace graduating members. Boosters trainings are provided throughout the school year.
  - Total amount receiving assistance- 201/642- 31.3%- This is provided for our 9-12 population
- Big Brothers Big Sisters-Eight students participate in the Big Brothers Big Sisters
  of America program. Mentoring relationships are formed and "Bigs" are utilized
  in the school and community settings. The Big Brothers and Big Sisters of
  America programs provide guidance and inspire each "little" to reach their
  potential.
  - Total amount receiving assistance- 8/642- 1.2%- This is provided for our 7-12 population
- Mentoring Plus- Online referrals are made by counselors to Mentoring Plus identifying students who exhibit bullying behaviors or at risk for being bullied. Mentors provide extra support with family, education, emotional needs and employability. Students meet outside the school setting to participate in the weekly program, however, mentors collaborate with the school counselors to discuss issues and concerns within the school setting.
  - Total amount receiving assistance- 10/642- 1.5%- This is provided for our 7-12 population
- Harlow HRK- A relationship-building business partnership with Harlow HRK
  provides students with a mentor that meets with them weekly, as well as field
  trips to the business. Some topics covered include mock interviews, resume
  building, job training and placement, work ethic, behavior in the work place, job

skills, and "not getting caught up in the drama" of the situation, whether that be at school, home, or work.

- Total amount receiving assistance- 31/642- 4.8%- This is provided for our 7-12 population
- New Student Breakfast- Monthly the administrative team, including counselors and the Youth Service Coordinator, meet with newly enrolled students to address questions and concerns they may have. They are given a list of resources available as well as points of contact in the building and clubs and organizations they can become involved in. Our goal is to ensure new students have an increased comfort level and resources available to have a positive school experience.
  - Total amount receiving assistance- 42/642- 6.5%- This is provided for our 7-12 population
- <u>Student Support Team</u>- Counselors, Youth Service Coordinator, District Homeless Coordinator, and Asst. Principal, meet bi-weekly to discuss students and address concerns. Plans are developed to assist students with needs and the appropriate resources are contacted and made aware of interventions needed.
  - Total amount receiving assistance- 64/642- 9.9%- This is provided for our 7-12 population
- Young Life- A Young Life Leader meets with students after school twice a week
  to provide fun, adventurous, group activities that build relationships with peers.
  The leader helps students develop the skills, assets and attitudes to reach their
  full potential.
  - Total amount receiving assistance- 10/642- 1.5%- This is provided for our 7-12 population
- Youth Leadership Development (YLD)- Youth Leadership Development (YLD) is an after school program for at-risk youth ages 11-15 to build leadership skills and conduct community service projects. Youth who are not already involved in positive after school activities and therefore most at-risk are recruited to join YLD through their schools. YLD meets twice a week, once at school and once in the community and is sponsored by the Brighton Center.
  - Total amount receiving assistance- 8/642- 1.2%- This is provided for our 7-12 population
