School Breakfast

The School Breakfast Program (SBP) was established in 1966. School districts receive federal reimbursement for each school breakfast served that meets the USDA nutrition guidelines.

Studies show that children who participate in the School Breakfast Program have significantly higher standardized achievement test scores than non-participants. Children with access to school breakfast also had significantly reduced absence and tardiness rates. We Started a 2nd chance Breakfast program at the High School this year. We have a least 85 more students getting the nutrition that they need.



Percentage of Items Fully Met on Current Assessments




