The Village FRYSC Coordinator serves on the School Climate committee at Boston School, Administrators attend Advisory Council meetings to discuss the current workplans with goals and objectives directed to meet the needs of students, and the FRYSC Coordinator meets in Leadership Team meetings with Administrators and staff on a weekly basis at New Haven to discuss the current student needs and devise a plan of action to help meet those needs.
- 2. One of the Goals for Boston's current Goal Builder Plan for May 2018 is the Elementary GAP for reading and math will increase from 52.2 to 62% as measured by the 2018 KPREP assessment.

  The FRYSC will collaborate with Title 1, teachers and librarian to host interactive literacy events and assist with math related initiatives. Books will be purchased for events through the United Way grant monies and other resources to ensure children have a collection of literature accessible in their homes.

New Haven's Goal Builder Plan for May 2018 consisits of increasing the number of students who are College and Career Ready. The FRYS will conduct Junior Achievement programs in the classroom to ensure hands-on activities that use high level questions and problems in the area of math, reading and writing. Junior Achievement encourages students to think about the world around them and how it relates to them. New careers are introduced and discussed at length in the various lessons.

FRYSC staff will coordinate an interactive college field trip for 5th and 8th graders to a University in Kentucky during the Spring semester.

FRYSC will collaborate with fellow FRYSC Directors and guidance counselors across the district along with community partners to host an Operation Exposure event for 8<sup>th</sup> grade students. Students will have the opportunity to interact with community members in a career field that is of an interest to the student.

Nelson County Early Learning Center's current Goal Builder does not include FRYSC.

Local law enforcement report that criminal activity among youth ages 12-15 during after-school hours has increased by 22% since January, 2014.

The local ADD office (Department of Aging) reports that the number of grandparents in this county having custody of grandchildren increased by 20% within the last two years.

According to 2017 Kids Count Data Book, Kentucky Youth Advocates, 18.6% of children in Nelson County are living in food insecure households. Also, 49.1% of Nelson Counties 4<sup>th</sup> graders are proficient in reading and 36.2% of 8<sup>th</sup> graders were proficient in math.

2017 Kids Count County Data Book Kentucky Youth Advocates indicated 16.9(2014-16) youth incarcerated in the juvenile justice system.

2017 Kids Count County Data Book Ky Youth Advocates indicated 4.5% Nelson County Unemployment rate in 2016. Also, Child Poverty Rate(single-year estimates) Rate in 2015 was 18.8.

According to 2017 TownCharts report, 10.1% of Nelson County population showed less than high school education.

#### FRYSC DATA:

Examples:

The 2015 Student Survey indicated that 11.11% of students in the 8th grade have experimented with alcohol.

According to the 2014 YSC needs assessment, 23 students indicated needing assistance with clothing, 22 with food at home, and 28 with holiday assistance. These numbers reflect an increase of approximately 5-7 students for clothing, food and holiday assistance.

The 2015 Parent Survey indicated that 55% of parents responding do not feel welcome in the school.

The 2017 FRYSC Parent Survey indicated that 21.88% of parents who took the survey expressed a concern about social media use.

#### OTHER DATA:

2017 Kids Count Data indicated Kentucky as rating number 24 in Education out of all 50 states. (1 being highest, and 50 being lowest) Source: Population Reference Bureau, analysis of data gathered for the 2017 Kids Count Data Book.

A New Kids Count report by the Annie E. Casey Foundation, Stepping Up For Kids: What Government and Communities Should Do to Support Kinship Families, shows Kentucky has the second highest rate in the nation of children living with such "kin" caregivers.

2016 Kids Count Data Center indicated that teens ages 16-19 not in school and not high school graduates in Kentucky is 5% or 13,000.

2017: The Health Rank for Kentucky is 22. (highest/best 1 to lowest/worst 50)

Over 51 million school hours are lost each year due to poor dental health. One in 7 children (6-12) are suffering from tooth pain right now. Over 50% of children on Medicaid don't regularly see a dentist.
