COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

MISSION STATEMENT

HOW THE PLAN WAS DEVELOPED:

How the Needs of the School or District Were Determined:

The Comprehensive School Improvement Plan for 2008-2009 was devised from committee revisions in all academic and social areas. Assessment results from Spring 2008 were reviewed and overall academic improvement needs were emphasized in the new plan.

How Goals and Strategies Were Decided Upon:

Goals were reviewed by the Core Committee, discussed, changed and presented to the faculty and committees. The faculty and committees had the opportunity to make adjustments to the recommended goals and approve the goals for the plan. The plan was presented to the SBDM council for recommendations and approval. Strategies and activities within the Areas of Need were established by members of the Core Committee.

What Implementation of the Plan is Expected to Achieve:

The SBDM Council believes that the strategies/activities developed for each goal will directly impact the students' academic achievement and will positively strengthen the overall climate of the school.

What Process was Used for Internal Review of the Plan:

All teachers in the building were given a copy of the plan after the core committee had developed a draft version. Teachers were asked to read the plan and then give input at a faculty meeting where the plan was discussed. In addition, each committee at Creekside Elementary was asked to review the plan and make suggestions.

How Public Comment was Secured and What Response was Made:

Two parents serve on the SBDM council and were given the opportunity to make suggestions and improvements to the plan. Also, parents have the opportunity to serve on each of the committees at Creekside Elementary and were able to give input when the plan was reviewed by each committee.

How Comprehensive Improvement Planning Will be Ensured in the Future:

Implementation and Impact Checks will be performed annually on each of the Area of Needs of the October 2008 plan to ensure that the Comprehensive School Improvement Plan is being implemented as designed. Component leaders will share information at faculty meetings and SBDM Council Meetings. Changes and amendments to the plan will occur as needed through the use of committees with final approval of the SBDM Council.

COMMUNICATION PLAN

How will the Comprehensive Improvement Plan and Other Important Information Be Shared with Stakeholders?

All stakeholders, i.e., parents, faculty members and community members, will be informed that copies of the plan are available in the school office or on the school and district website for their review. In addition, faculty members, PTA leadership, and SBDM Council members will be provided with a copy of the plan. Discussion of the plan and results of implementation of the plan will occur at SBDM Council Meetings and faculty meetings.

How will Input Continue to be Gathered from Stakeholders?

Information will be gathered from stakeholders through the SBDM Council Meetings, PTA Meetings, and faculty meetings. Additional input from stakeholders will occur through surveys. A review of mid-cycle assessment results will be conducted by the faculty and SBDM Council in the fall of 2008 and reviews of impact information will be conducted at SBDM Meetings each year.
