- ✓ Newport Primary FRC Coordinator, Molly Wesley reports:
 - o As of November 30, 2018, the following were distributed to students:
 - 91 items of clothing from the FRC clothing closet (many thanks to all of the individuals who donate their gently used clothing and shoes to the FRC, including the Hosea Project Movers, who donated 20 BOXES of girls underwear – of various sizes – to the FRC)
 - 4 backpacks
 - 16 total home visits during this time: 4 home visits for attendance/residency, 5 home visits to deliver Thanksgiving food, and 7 home visits to make contact with parents/guardians for "other" reasons
 - 1 \$30 voucher to Burlington in Latonia was distributed for clothing
 - 2 vouchers for replacement eyeglasses were distributed
 - 2 referrals to BornLearning
 - 1 assistance with residential water shut off
 - 84 Power Packs per week are given to NPS students on Fridays
 - O Sixteen NPS classrooms are participating in partnerships through the Adopt a Class program, including Crossroads Church, Mars Chocolate, United Way, Citibank (2), Brighton Center, USI Insurance (2), Red Hot Promotions (The Think Shop), PricewaterhouseCoopers, Christ's Chapel, US Bank, Movement Church, Prysmian Group (formerly General Cable), Clerk's Office at the US Court of Appeals for the 6th Circuit, and the Cincinnati Reds. At least once a month, a different Adopt a Class partner is being featured on the school's website and Facebook page, as a way to recognize their contributions to NPS students!
 - Thirteen (13) Lunch Buddies (Big Brother Big Sister, school-based mentoring) are spending 45-minutes together at lunchtime each week, and applications have gone home with students who may be matched with a Lunch Buddy in the future.
 - 15 students are walking to the Boys & Girls Club after school with B&G Club staff.

- NPS students are able to receive mental health therapy on-site through Greater Cincinnati Behavioral Health, MEBS & Associates, NorthKey, and our school counselor. Many students also see outside agencies (i.e., Holly Hill, Therapeutic Collaborative) for therapy. Molly received calls regularly from case managers at MEBS, regarding common clients.
- Students at NPS continue to be encouraged to recycle items at school, and to continue to collect plastic lids to recycle into additional "Buddy Benches" and/or other furniture for the school.
- Molly and Amber are changing ways to the Holiday Assistance program to better encourage parental involvement at school prior to receiving Holiday Assistance. To date, 204 children are being matched with organizations and/or individuals for Holiday food and/or gifts
- o Molly serves on the NPS attendance committee, with Brian Zepf, Brenda Elgin, Mr. Atkins, Debbie Roaden, and Kristy McNally
- The Campbell County Public Library's annual "Drop Your Drawers" campaign has begun collecting underwear to distribute amongst the Campbell County Family Resource Centers.
- The Newport Police Department are participating in "No Shave November" for a fee, and donating money raised to the FRYSCs in Newport, to be housed at NPS/FRC but to support all district families.
- To date, Molly has worked with Debbie Mollette (and the organization through which her dog was certified as a therapy dog) for a variety of dogs to come to visit the special needs students in Ms. Zimmerman's classroom, on 8 separate days!! More dates will be scheduled after the New Year!
- The Newport central Catholic sophomores have written their first pen pal; letters to the NPS 2nd graders! These "buddies" will be coming to visit for a morning in February!
- November 12 Veterans Day event at NPS Molly hosted the reception for Veterans and their families in the cafeteria after the ceremony
- November 13 BornLearning Academy workshop #2 Eighty-one (81) people were in attendance at the second BornLearning Academy! Two (2) Brighton Center youth participating in Youth Leadership development, 1 Brighton Center YLD staff, 7 Christ's Chapel volunteers to prepare and serve food, 5 child care workers, 1 Spanish translator, 1 workshop facilitator (Kate), 2 Skool Aid staff to facilitate activities for school-aged children, 2 Cooperative Extension staff (1 to discuss nutrition information, and 1 to facilitate activities for children finished eating dinner before going to their activities), 2 BornLearning Coordinators (Molly and Amber), 1 Administrator (Mrs. Hayden), 8 adults participating in the Parent Support Group, 16 adults participating in the BornLearning workshop, and 33 children 5th grade and younger.

✓ Newport Intermediate School FRC Coordinator, Amber Onkst reports:

- 21st Century: FRC completed and submitted the \$490,000 grant for grades K-6th to Frankfort on November 19, 2018
- PBIS: FRC will be sitting on the committee for NIS's implementation of Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports.
- Club 312: The FRC co-hosts an after-school program on Wednesdays and approximately 20 students attend weekly.
- HEARTS tutoring: We have added another student to this program bringing the total to 8 students receiving targeted tutoring after school.
- Cyclones STEM Day: FRC sponsored 5th grade students attending the STEM day and game at the Cyclones.
- Christmas Assistance: FRC's at both Primary and Intermediate have developed a program to hold parents accountable to participating in student's academics in order to receive assistance for Christmas. Currently, we have 168 children between the two school's receiving assistance.

- Thanksgiving Assistance: FRC provided 45 students with Thanksgiving Food Boxes. The remaining boxes will be provided at Christmas through Stock the Kitchen.
- KY OOSA: The grant that has funded our parent night ends in December. However, we are eligible to apply again. FRC is working to partner the Primary School and the Intermediate School to improve upon these events in the new grant.
- O Coat Distribution: NIS and NPS FRC are partnering with St. Vincent De Paul for the coat distribution on Saturday, December 1st from 9-12pm. FRC has recruited the Fire Dept.'s assistance. They have challenged the community to donate coats, and they will match the donations with purchasing new coats for the distribution. Currently, the have collected 175 coats for the coat distribution.
- o Big Brothers Big Sisters: The room has now been updated and painted thanks to volunteers from Lakeside Christian Church.
- Kentucky Association of School Social Workers: FRC is now the Northern Kentucky Board Member for KASSW.
- Student Ambassadors-Our student leaders are beginning their community service project where they are educating their peers and providing support to the American Lymphoma society.
- Big Smiles: FRC is currently accepting applications for the free dental clinic that will be held in January.
- o BornLearning: FRC along with Primary FRC hosted our second Born Learning session for parents with children birth to five years of age. There were 14 parent participants along with all of their children.

- 120 + NHS students participating, average 25 a day in an after school club, 8^{th-} 12th grade
- Club of the Month- Photography
 - Photography club is held twice a week and is run by myself, Erin Comfort, from 2:45-5:00pm. I meet with 8 students on Mondays and Tuesdays each week. Weekly we discus different styles of photography and key terms you must know in order to master the art.
 - So far we have taken three field trips to the levee to capture the Christmas decor; we have walked the streets of Newport to capture fall foliage. We have also gone to a horse farm in Melbourne, Ky. Before the year is over we will go to the aquarium and ice skating down town to take pictures
 - After taking photos, we upload them to the computers and each student gets to critique their work, and print of their favorite photo from the day. This club will continue into the new year with the same group of 9-12th graders
- ✓ NISD 21st Century Kim Ward, K-8 Coordinator reports:
 - o Programming will run through Thursday December 20, 2018 and resume on January 7, 2019
 - Newport Primary- currently 151 students have participated in early morning/after school programming
 - Newport Intermediate- currently 221 students have participated in early morning/ afterschool programming
 - Newport NHS- 7th/8th grade approximately 75 students have participated in afterschool programming
 - New After School Activities: Beginning in January 2019, Chess Club, Sprouts Cooking, Minecraft Education Club, Mighty Milers Running Club, Mommy and Me Cooking.
 - O Club Highlight: Sports Mania is an after school activity for 3rd-6th grade students ran by Skoolaid. Each week, Paralympian Jake Counts, gets our students blood pumping with this fast-paced class. Each session inspires movement, creativity and imagination, as well as fun with fitness and physical activity. It also encourages friendly competition- involving elimination activities and point-system based games to teach good sportsmanship while winning or losing. Mr. Jake dispels the myths about persons who live with disabilities and that anything is possible!
