#### Before Trip:

Read Tales of a Fourth Grade Nothing By: Judy Blume

Introduce vocabulary before each chapter. Students will determine the meaning of figurative language (idioms) throughout the story.

Students will analyze the characters in a story by identifying their traits, describing how they interact and respond to each other, and comparing them to other characters.

Students will attend Tales of a Fourth Grade Nothing at Stage One.
