- ✓ Newport Primary FRC Coordinator, Molly Wesley reports:
 - As of March 18, 2019, the following were distributed to students:
 - 71 items of clothing from the FRC clothing closet (many thanks to all of the individuals who donate their gently used clothing and shoes to the FRC)
 - 8 pairs of shoes
 - 8 backpacks
 - 6 children received diapers through Sweet Cheeks (either special needs NPS students, or younger siblings of NPS students, or BornLearning Academy participants)
 - 8 total home visits during this time, all for attendance/residency
 - 1 student, whose family recently came from Guatemala, was given emergency assistance for various needs (shopping was done by EL staff).
 - 1 voucher for replacement eyeglasses through Lens Crafters' Gift of Sight was distributed
 - 1 referral to the Care Closet at Newport Intermediate School
 - 85 Power Packs per week are given to NPS students on Fridays
 - Sixteen NPS classrooms are participating in partnerships through the Adopt a Class program, including Crossroads Church, Mars Chocolate, United Way, Citibank (2), Brighton Center, USI Insurance (2), Red Hot Promotions (The Think Shop), PricewaterhouseCoopers, Christ's Chapel, US Bank, Movement Church, Prysmian Group (formerly General Cable), Clerk's Office at the US Court of Appeals for the 6th Circuit, and the Cincinnati Reds. At least once a month, a different Adopt a Class partner is being featured on the school's website and Facebook page, as a way to recognize their contributions to NPS students!
 - Nineteen (19) Lunch Buddies (Big Brother Big Sister, school-based mentoring) are spending 45-minutes together at lunchtime each week, and applications have gone home with students who may be matched with a Lunch Buddy in the future.

- 15 students are walking to the Boys & Girls Club after school with B&G Club staff.
- NPS students are able to receive mental health therapy on-site through Greater Cincinnati Behavioral Health, MEBS & Associates, NorthKey, and our school counselor. Many students also see outside agencies (i.e., Holly Hill, Therapeutic Collaborative) for therapy. Molly receives calls regularly from case managers at MEBS Associates, regarding common clients.
- Students at NPS continue to be encouraged to recycle items at school, and to continue to collect plastic lids to recycle into additional "Buddy Benches" and/or other furniture for the school. MANY THANKS to Brighton Center's Youth Leadership Development Club for sorting lids for us, as a service project!! Also, <u>ReNewport has given the NPS Family Resource Center a \$500 grant to assist with the purchase of a couple of more benches at this summer's cap delivery!</u>
- Molly has supported the Girl Scout's cookie sale by arranging for a staff order form to be placed next to the staff sign-in sheet, and also for arranging for a cookie sale booth at Family Fun Night on 2/21!

 - PBIS- FRC in addition to sitting on committee is facilitating the Cat's Store every two weeks
 - Club 312 -The FRC co-hosts an after-school program on Wednesdays and approximately 20 students attend weekly
 - KY OOSA- FRC presented in Frankfort at the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce on last year's grant
 - Big Smiles- 41 students were seen in March for either annual cleanings or dental services
 - Born Learning- FRC along with Primary FRC hosted our sixth Born Learning session for parents with children birth to five years of age. There were 10 parent participants along with all of their children
 - Parent Support Group (PSG) FRC along with Primary FRC hosted our sixth PSG. We had six parent participants
 - Anthony Munoz Foundation- FRC is sponsoring 12 students to attend the weekend character building camp in April
 - Care Closet- We have continued to schedule students to come every Thursday to have their clothing needs met. Most recently, we had a student who is not average size for a 4th grader, and the Care Closet volunteers measured and hand-made clothing that fit her and was also stylist for someone her size in order to help with this student's self-esteem

 - Dreamfest- FRC chaperoned the gifted and talented students and managed three sessions at Dreamfest at NKU

 - School Dance- FRC sponsored and chaperoned the 6th grade dance in March. There were over 120 tickets sold. The students had a great time and overall were very well behaved
 - Power Packs- We are currently serving 120 students with weekend food bags through the Freestore Foodbank, Newport Professional Firefighters and Lakeside Christian Church. FRC recently presented at the Newport City Commission meeting on behalf of

the work that the Newport Professional Firefighters are doing to assist NIS

- Social Work Appreciation Month- March is social work appreciation month. As the NKY board member for the Kentucky Association of School Social Workers, FRC along with NPS FRC hosted an after-school celebration for all school based social workers in Northern Kentucky to show appreciation and network with other school districts to improve services for students. A lot of discussion was held about recent bills related to school safety which may lead to the loss of jobs for many currently employed school social workers due to non-inclusive language regarding mental health providers
- Courageous Kids- FRC is working with FRCs in NKY and the Public Library to provide a summer support group for students whose loved ones are incarcerated. Tis project is being funded through the United Way
- Reading Award- FRC has started a monthly reading award for the student that displays the most improvement and hardest work effort during that month. Student will receive a grade-appropriate book and treat. March is 4th grade
- Good News!- FRC's impact report for the 2017-2018 school year was chosen by a committee in Frankfort as a spotlight report for the state. FRC had to present the report at the last regional meeting for FRYSC's

- ✓ <u>Club of the Month- Study Table</u>
 - Starting February 4th, Study Table tutoring center has been actively running. Tutoring starts at 3:00 and runs until 4:30 every Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. We average 10 students a day. The tutoring center is staffed by, Cody Reinhard, AmerCorp Advisor. Cody has been working in Newport High School for the last three years. Services offered are, homework assistance, study tools, ACT prep, NCAA Clearing House for athletes, and FAFSA assistance. The center has an open door policy; students can come and go freely. Students can make appoints through myself or Cody Reinhard if 1:1 assistance needed. We actively recruit students that have below a 2.5 GPA or 1 or more F's. We hope to see our daily average grow and the school year comes to an end.

 - Newport Primary-currently 165 students have participated in early morning/after school programming
 - Newport Intermediate- currently 248 students have participated in early morning/ afterschool programming
 - Newport NHS- 7th/8th grade approximately 83 students have participated in afterschool programming

Coding or computer programming is writing a set of instructions that a computer understands so it will perform a task. Students invited their parents/guardians to join them for some coding fun for a family event held on March 6th. Club sponsors, Mr. Campbell and Ms. Molly, gave families a quick tutorial on coding and provided dinner. Students then got to show their coding abilities to their families as they created games together. Student volunteers from Norte Dame Academy also were on hand to participate in the fun!

 - Mrs. Kim Weaver, RN, BSN and School Health Coordinator & Ms. Pam Pedigo, RN, BSN for Newport Primary School Report:
 - 128 sick student visits. (2 days a week coverage)
 - 9 daily medication administrations.
 - 8 vision screenings.
 - Will be sending letters to pre-school parents to set up school physicals and immunization reviews in preparation for kindergarten. Considering a plan to 'field trip' Primary preschool students to the intermediate location to have health screenings completed.

 - 212 sick visits. (3 days a week coverage)
 - Working on vision screenings.
 - One daily medical procedure (urinary catheterization).
 - Attempting to get students glasses or vision exam

 - With the launch of Vaccines for Children Program; we underwent a state audit to evaluate our systems for managing in house vaccines. The audit went smoothly and no deficits were identified

- Ms. Pam Pedigo, RN, BSN (Newport High School) Reports:
 - 156 sick visits
 - 5 daily medication administrations
 - One medical procedure (urotoxy care) on as needed basis.
- Ms. Liz Tanner, Nurse Practitioner via Christ Hospital at the School Based Health Center
 - From my February report to the present date include:
 - 88 students were seen for sick visits or school physicals
 - Evaluated 15 sick staff members
 - I continue to assist our nurses in identification of students with vaccine needs
- ✓ You now have the seventh month of attendance and we are declining in a trend that I do not like. Our current rate of 93.91% is the lowest we have seen in the past four year and if it continues it will have a negative impact on our SEEK funding.
- ✓ We have received information from KDE that we may now submit the 2019 2020 calendars that you approved at last month's meeting in April and I will have the amended 2018 2019 calendar ready for your approval during the April meeting as that must be submitted in May.
