As normal, I want to applaud all of our service providers for the remarkable labor they continue to do for our students and families. - ✓ Newport Primary FRC Coordinator, Molly Wesley reports:
 - As of April 17, 2019, the following were distributed to students since the last monthly report:
 - 120 items of clothing and/or shoes from the FRC clothing closet (many thanks to all of the individuals who donate their gently used clothing and shoes to the FRC)
 - 1 student and 1 parent received assistance from the Care Closet
 - 3 backpacks
 - 1 Gift of Sight voucher was given for a student to replace eyeglasses
 - 3 students were assisted with hygiene
 - 18 total home visits during this time (9 for attendance, 7 to deliver Wildcat Honoree yard signs, and 2 for parent meetings)
 - 1 voucher for replacement eyeglasses through LensCrafters' Gift of Sight was distributed
 - Emergency financial assistance was given to a family who had a water shut off notice, and also to a second family (collaborated due to McKinney-Vento status)
 - Connected with a parent about an upcoming ARC meeting
 - 85 PowerPacks per week are given to NPS students on Fridays
 - Sixteen NPS classrooms are participating in partnerships through the Adopt a Class program, including Crossroads Church, Mars Chocolate, United Way, Citibank (2), Brighton Center, USI Insurance (2), Red Hot Promotions (The Think Shop), PricewaterhouseCoopers, Christ's Chapel, US Bank, Movement Church, Prysmian Group (formerly General Cable), Clerk's Office at the US Court of Appeals for the 6th Circuit, and the Cincinnati Reds. At least once a month, a different Adopt a Class partner is being featured on the school's website and Facebook page, as a way to recognize their contributions to NPS students!

- Nineteen (19) Lunch Buddies (Big Brother Big Sister, school-based mentoring) are spending 45-minutes together at lunchtime each week, and applications have gone home with students who may be matched with a Lunch Buddy in the future.
- 15 students are walking to the Boys & Girls Club after school with B&G Club staff.
- NPS students are able to receive mental health therapy on-site through Greater Cincinnati Behavioral Health, MEBS & Associates, NorthKey, and our school counselor. Many students also see outside agencies (i.e., Holly Hill, Therapeutic Collaborative) for therapy. Molly receives calls regularly from case managers at MEBs Associates, regarding common clients.
- Students at NPS continue to be encouraged to recycle items at school, and to continue to collect plastic lids to recycle into additional "Buddy Benches" and/or other furniture for the school. MANY THANKS to Brighton Center's Youth Leadership Development Club for sorting lids for us, as a service project!! Also, <u>ReNewport has given the NPS Family Resource Center a \$500 grant to assist with the purchase of a couple of more benches at this summer's cap delivery</u>!
- Molly serves on the NPS attendance committee, with Brian Zepf, Brenda Elgin, Mr. Atkins, Debbie Roaden, and Kristy McNally – this group meets every other week to discuss interventions, etc.
- To date, Molly has worked with Debbie Mollette (and the organization through which her dog was certified as a therapy dog) for a variety of dogs to come to visit the special needs students in Ms. Zimmerman's classroom, twice during most weeks!

- ✓ Newport Intermediate School FRC Coordinator, Amber Onkst reports:
 - PBIS- FRC continues to serve on the Implementation committee, which meets monthly. FRC also runs the Cat's Store twice monthly for students to purchase pries with the cat's cash they have earned for their positive behaviors.
 - Club 312 -The FRC co-hosts an after-school program on Wednesdays. Currently, we have about 15-20 girls that attend consistently. Most recently, we have been working on gratefulness. The girls participated in activity to make serving platters for all of the local business/ individuals who sponsor NIS throughout the school year.
 - Candy Run Running Club- FRC is paying for two staff to facilitate this after-school running club. The club meets twice a week and has fifteen girls registered to attend. FRC also runs with the girls as an extra adult when running off campus.
 - HEARTS tutoring- We have added another student to this program bringing the total to 8 students receiving targeted tutoring after school.
 - KY OOSA- NIS hosted the first family night of the new grant period titled "Opening Day". Families were provided all baseball themed fun. There was a family dinner with questions at all of the tables to encourage student literacy and encourage families to get to know one another. Families rotated throughout the building for dinner, literacy activity and baseball bingo. The Reds and the Florence Freedom

donated free tickets to give away as prizes. We had approximately 150 people in attendance at this event.

- Big Brothers Big Sisters- This program continues to provide approximately 60 students with weekly mentoring.
- Kentucky Association of School Social Workers- FRC attended the board meeting and represented the role FRYSC's play in schools at the March 22nd meeting in Frankfort.
- Anthony Munoz Foundation- FRC has secured 14 spots for NIS/NHS students to attend the AMF Spring Camp the weekend after Easter.
- Alumni Project- FRC and YSC are meeting regularly with Newport Alumni to develop a long-term mentorship program for students grades 6-12th, pairing students with a Newport Alum to encourage academic performance and college/or career readiness. Tentative start date is fall 2019.
- Courageous Kids- FRC has been a part of the planning committee to start a support group over the summer for students who have an incarcerated parent. This group will meet twice a month beginning May 7th.
- Kindergarten and Preschool Open House- FRC assisted the primary school in greeting and directly families for the open house. We had approximately 26 families in attendance.
- Care Closet- The Care Closet continues to serve students on a weekly basis who have a need at home that is affecting their education.
- Teacher Appreciation Week-FRC has worked with the Masonic Lodge to arrange for NIS staff to receive lunch on Wednesday, May 8th.
- Greenlight for Girls- FRC is sponsoring and chaperoning fifteen 6th grade girls to attend this STEM conference at the University of Cincinnati.
- School Beautification- 7 Hills will be here on May 13th to help paint motivational quotes and inspirations in the school bathrooms.
- Dude Be Nice Week- In March, we hosted our Dude Be Nice Week where students were encouraged to wear themed clothing to go with a "nice" idea. Our students had so much fun being nice, and there were some great conversations across all grades about spreading kindness. As a part of this week, our gifted and talented students hosted a supply drive for the Women's Crisis Center, which serves victims of domestic violence. We had 541 individual items donated, which I dropped off at the WCC on Monday.

- Most after school programming will run through Thursday May 23rd. Morning programming will continue through the last day of school. KDE will visit Newport Independent Schools sometime in May to review the new 21CCLC grant awarded beginning 2019-2020. A date has not yet been confirmed.
- Club Highlight: Girl Scout of Kentucky staff led an 8-week afterschool program at Newport Intermediate focusing on Financial Literacy. Fifteen girls, grades 3rd- 5th grade met weekly to learn about vital life skills that set them up for success in school and in their future careers. Students sold Girl Scout Cookies and choose to donate their profit from their sales to a local animal rescue. Students donated more than \$100 to the Tristate Noah Project which will help supply food and veterinarian costs for neglected and abused animals.

- ✓ You now have the eighth month of attendance and we are about the same as last month. I am hoping now that spring weather is here we will improve to close out the year.
- ✓ As I have repeated before, under the Kentucky Revised Statutes (KRS) there are only two calendars that a Board of Education approves. The original school calendar which this board always approves in February for the coming year and the amended calendar which shows what actually happened during a school year due to emergencies, weather or other events. By law the superintendent makes those changes to the original calendar on your behalf. Since I must submit the Amended Calendar on behalf of the district it is essential that you approve this calendar tonight and record in the Board of Education Minutes as it will be submitted in May. You will note there are never make-up days on the amended calendar, which is because we did not use a make-up day.
