LEVEL 1 Minor misbehavior on the part of the student which impedes orderly classroom procedures or interferes with the orderly operation of the school. Misbehavior whose frequency or seriousness tends to disrupt the learning climate of the school.  These infractions, which usually result from the continuation of LFVEL 1 misbehaviors, require the intervention of personnel on the administrative level because the execution of LFVEL 1 disciplinary options has failed to correct the situation. LEVEL 3  Acts directed against persons or property but whose consequences do not seriously endanger the health or safety of others in the school.  These infractions, which usually result from the continuation of LEVEL 2 misbehaviors, require the intervention of personnel on the administrative level because the execution of LEVEL II disciplinary options has failed to correct the situation.  These acts might be considered criminal but most frequently can be handled by the disciplinary mechanism in the school.  Corrective measures, which the school should undertake, however, depend on the extent of the school's resources for remediating the situation in the best interests of all students. ## **LEVEL 4**

Acts which result in violence to another's person or property or which pose a direct threat to the safety of others in the school.

These infractions, which usually result from the continuation of <u>LEVEL 3</u> misbehaviors, require the intervention of personnel on the administrative level because the execution of <u>LEVEL 3</u> disciplinary options has failed to correct the situation.

These acts are clearly criminal and are so serious that they always require administrative actions which result in the immediate removal of the student from school, the intervention of law enforcement authorities and action by the board of education.

- Continuation of LEVEL III misbehavior
- Extortion
- Bomb threat
- Possession or use or transfer of dangerous weapons
- Assault or battery
- Vandalism
- Theft or possession or sale of stolen property
- Arson
- Furnishing or selling or possessing or using unauthorized substances
- Sexual Harassment
- Inappropriate Sexual Behavior

The administrator verifies the offense, confers with the staff person(s) involved and meets with student.

The student is immediately removed from the school environment. Parents are notified.

School officials contact law enforcement agency and assist in prosecuting the offender. Prior to student suspension, the principal or assistant principal will administer due process procedures.

A complete and accurate report is submitted to the superintendent for possible board action.

The student is given a full due process hearing before the board, if expulsion is recommended.
