COURSE TITLE:

Sport and Special Event Risk Management (AWR-167)

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to build capabilities for multi-agency collaboration pertaining to risk management for sport events. It introduces the seven-step sport security risk management process, including the idea of risk management and setting risk management goals for sport events, identifying assets that need protecting and determining risk, implementing planning and mitigation actions, and implementing after-action review for events as well as incidents. Through activity-based training modules, intact security teams will enhance their ability for planning, risk assessment, training, and exercising practices specific to conducting sport events. The expectation is for participants to return to their respective organization and coordinate the development of a sport event security management system.

PARTICIPANT CRITERIA:

To reinforce the multi-discipline team approach, the target audience for this course will include stakeholders from: athletic departments, operators of large arenas/venues, campus public safety, campus emergency management, campus administration, campus environmental health and safety, campus physical plant / public works, student life/affairs, public affairs, and sports information.

The audience also includes stakeholders from communities that host, surround, or neighbor venues for sports/special events. These include: Fire Services, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), law enforcement at the local, state, and federal levels, non-governmental organizations, local elected officials, Public Health (PH), Public Works (PW), and other local, state, and federal agency representatives that would be involved in the planning and management of special events.

PERQUISITE:

All the following must be completed prior to registering for this course.

National Incident Management System/incident command system training (IS 700 ICS for Single Resources (IS-100 Initial Action Incidents (IS-200.b) or equivalent basic incident command system training

Attendees are encouraged, but not required, to complete Sport Event Risk Management (AWR-167) or have equivalent training/experience prior to attending this course.
