There were a total of 390 students actively identified as Primary Talent Pool (K-3) or Gifted and Talented (grades 4-12) in one or more area of identification during school year 2018-2019.

• Franklin Elementary

 Services Offered - Classroom differentiation, STLP, flexible grouping in reading and math, student contests, and classroom leadership positions

• Simpson Elementary (Primary Talent Pool)

- Number of students identified for Primary Talent Pool: 117 (18% of SES students), 185 students participate in Super Simpson enrichment opportunities (29%)
- All 3rd-grade students universally screened with CogAT screener
- Mrs. Dianne Wade and Mrs. Wanda Hale serviced high potential learners at Simpson Elementary in areas of reading and math.
- Services offered:
 - flexible grouping in reading and math
 - STLP projects (presented at state competition and district STEAM Showcase)
 - Each Super Simpson enrichment class met on a rotating schedule three times a year. Students chose two different Super Simpson classes to participate in.
