PBIS for 2018/2019

Monthly PBIS meetings, with the goal of analyzing student academic and behavior data, were held. Classroom, hallway, and bus expectations continued to be implemented, and monitored. The PBIS team members included: Patterson (KSI/Facilitator/Coach), Frazier (1st), Finel (2nd), Sweet (PE), Sheroan (Classifed), Honaker (AP), Johnson (4th), Kimble (Sped), Radford (CE), Brown(Counselor), and Hurt (P).

<u>Student Achievement, Accomplishments & School Improvement Efforts Reported</u> for 2018/2019

 KPREPPER assessments were administered every month to students in grades third, fourth, and fifth. Data reports were given to the teachers and analyzed in

- the grade level PLC meetings to determine next steps with instruction. Administration reported the results to the faculty/staff and SBDM.
- The Admin Team continued with Goal Setting with 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders.
- Trojan Traits Tickets, as a part of our school wide PBIS initiative, were distributed to all employees to give to students who were caught being "positive, prepared and/or productive. The tickets' color changed each month. Monthly, themed, Trojan Traits tickets celebrations took place.
- MAP scores in the Winter showed gains in first through fourth grades. Fourth grade reading had the highest growth in the Hardin County Schools District. Fifth grade math was our weakest area. The Fall to Spring MAP scores also showed gains in first through fourth, with fifth grade math still being an area of concern. MAP awards celebrations took place in the classrooms this year and accomplishments were advertised via Meadow View's social media accounts (Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter). The Enrichment program continued schoolwide and is included in our CSIP. Thirty to forty minutes of purposeful, individualized instruction is our focus.
- Whole-school tutoring every Tuesday afternoon continued this year (ESS funded) Students were hand-selected from each grade to participate on a month by month basis. Those students chosen did not receive any other academic services. Designated teachers were paid through ESS funding.
- All grades received the Scholastic Weekly Readers to enable them to have current events for Social Studies, Math, and Reading instruction.
- Meadow View's Reflex Math facts learned were the greatest in the Hardin County Schools District. iRead, Front Row, IXL, and Pathblazer (formerly COMPASS) have been used for our students to supplement the regular instruction and curriculum.
- Meadow View reached (actually surpassed) our goal of one to one technology this year.
- Meadow View had the basketball team again this school year. They went to the finals. They won the first game in the finals.
- Clubs and club days were continued. Every student joined a club and meetings were held on the first Wednesday of each month. Community volunteers participated as sponsors and co-sponsors.
- Meadow View continued the Accelerated Reader Program for the 2018/2019 school year
- Meadow View's Beta Club students attended the state convention. The Fort Knox Alumni Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. sponsored a Father/Daughter Dance in March and a Mother/Son Dance in April to completely fund the Beta Club students and sponsors going to the National Convention.

- The Delta Academy hosted a girls' camp at Meadow View once a month on Saturdays. Delta Gems met quarterly to mentor young girls in the Radcliff area. Subjects included teaching the young ladies about college and careers, hygiene, and community service.
- The Fort Knox Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. sponsored
 The Science Machine who presented two shows of "The Greatest Science Show
 Ever" showcasing experiments and STEM activities for all of the students of
 Meadow View.
- Grade Level family nights continued this year, with all held in the Fall.
- D.A.R.E education for 5th grade was facilitated by Officer Antonio Stephens from the Radcliff Police Department. The D.A.R.E graduation included a brief speech from Councilwoman Tanya Seabrooks, Police Chief Jeff Cross, and Radcliff Mayor JJ Duvall.
- Field Trips included the first grade going to the Louisville Zoo, our fourth graders visiting Bernheim Forest, and our 5th graders visiting the Kentucky Derby Museum.
- Our 5th graders made transition visits to North Middle School and James T. Alton Middle School.
- Meadow View held a Health Fair, sponsored by the MVE FRC.
- Meadow View continued the Care-A-Van initiative this year. With the help of Budget Car Sales and surrounding restaurants, teachers and administration visited students at their homes to recognize and celebrate them for being positive, prepared, and productive Trojans.
- The continuation of the Character Education room and program helped to alleviate behavior concerns and barriers to classroom instruction.
- Meadow View communicated this year to all stakeholders through newsletters, our school website, flyers, social media (Facebook, & Twitter, Instagram), One Calls, and Remind101.

The SBDM Council took the following actions in the 2018/2019 School Year:

- Reviewed policies and/or revised the Meadow View SBDM policies and bylaws as needed, throughout the school year.
- Reviewed and approved the Emergency Management Plan.
- Analyzed and discussed KPREP, KPREPPER assessment, and MAP results by grade level.
- Reviewed School Report Card and oversaw the revisions and assisted with the development of the new Comprehensive School Improvement Plan (CSIP).
- Reviewed and approved plans for Title I, ESS, Per Pupil Allotment, School Activities fund, Use of School Space, and Staffing Assignments.

- Election of two new SBDM teacher representatives and two SBDM parent representatives.
- Served on interview teams and in consultation for hiring for the school year.
- Principal Selection Training will take place with the newly elected Council and Superintendent Morgan in late June due to Principal Hurt accepting a promotion with the Bullitt County Schools System.

Measurement of Success

- Improving community and parental involvement through various activities, events, and Tutoring Tuesdays, Grade Level Family Nights, Title 1 Nights, & Dances.
- Common planning and regular PLC meetings (including twice per week special ed PLC meetings), and KSI PLC Meetings, Committees, and Team meetings.
- PBIS data and data reported by the Character Education teacher and Assistant
 Principal showed behavior concerns continue to be a major challenge at Meadow
 View, thus the need for a Character Education teacher and program. Also, PBIS
 trainings and refreshers for teachers and assistants should be included
 throughout the year.
- Student celebrations, including monthly KPREPPER awards ceremonies, Trojan Traits Tickets parties, Writing Wall of Fame celebrations, end of the year Awards Days for 1st through 4th, and a Promotion Ceremony for 5th grade. Also, the D.A.R.E. graduation for those 5th grade participants was a measure of success.
- Continued successful implementation of the ESS Daytime Waiver program to address third, fourth, and fifth grade student learning.
- Focused on a welcoming school environment for all of our families and community members and volunteers. Fifth grade teachers continued the Safety Patrol program, consisting of students who patrolled the hallways and helped to keep our students and staff members safe. The student welcoming committee continued, welcoming new students to Meadow View and giving tours to new students and families.
- Thousands of reading minutes were recorded for our Accelerated Reading program.
- MAP growth was celebrated!

Meadow View Elementary will continue to strive to increase our parent and community involvement for the upcoming school year. We believe that the involvement and support of our parents and community will greatly contribute to our success.
