LCHS Project Pass sponsored a High School 101 session for upcoming freshmen. The weeklong session kicked off with an informative parent/student breakfast. During the breakfast, parents were given the current LCHS Curriculum Guide and they participated in discussion of various aspects of high school. During the remainder of the week, the students:

- participated in a scavenger hunt during which they learned important locations throughout the high school
- completed skills and interest assessments
- explored career opportunities matched to their personalities
- built drafts of schedules for their high school careers and began narrowing down their pathways
- read and discussed the student agenda
- learned about the clubs and extra-curricular activities offered at LCHS
- walked through a "basic day" at LCHS (tone schedule, class locations, lunches, morning procedures, afternoon dismissal, etc.)
- discussed emergency drills
- worked collaboratively with classmates
- worked on their presentation skills
- provided constructive feedback to peers
- learned various study skills
- identified their own areas for improvement to help them be successful in high school
- learned high school "survival tips"
- participated in activities that required them to review math and English skills
- participated in art activities that helped them break out of their comfort zones & find their creative sides
- constructed and painted bird houses while learning shop safety tips
- participated in a cooking contest in which students were judged based on taste and presentation High School 101 was a success. We would love to continue this program next year and watch it grow.

Many fun activities at camp kept members busy throughout the week including officer training which allowed our chapter leadership team to better understand their duties and become better leaders.
