Special Education Update:

The Regional Director of Special Education, Becky Nixon, has started. She is very excited to be at NKCES. She is looking forward to her first meeting with the DoSE Advisory Board Meeting on August 19th.

Becky attended the 2019 Special Education Legislative Summit in Washington, DC. She, along with other KYCEC and KYCASE members, met with Senator McConnell and Senator Rand Paul office, along with Representatives, John Yarmuth, Brett Guthrie, Thomas Massie, Hal Rogers, James Comer, and Andy Barr’s

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office to discuss issues currently challenging the field of special education and early childhood education. She advocated for full funding for special education, keeping public funds for public education, address the shortage of special education teachers and early intervention providers, build positive climate for learning by investing in mental health and investing in IDEA early childhood programs.

Special Education New Staff: We are pleased to welcome two Professional Learning Coaches to our team. Their names are Merissa Waddey and Misti Carr. We are excited to begin the 2019-2020 school year with a full staff.

State Consultant Work: This work for the 2019-2020 school year will kick off on August 27th in Louisville. NKCES consultants will collaborative work in the areas of literacy, mathematics, behavior and low incidence.

KDE 2019-2020 IDEA Proposal: The proposal was approved for the 2019-2020 school year. In addition, each co-op received additional funding for the 2018-2019 school year. This additional funding has to be encumbered by September 30th.

OVR Program Summer Update:

June 3 – June 7, Agri-Career Summer Camp

Seven students from Campbell County, Boone County, Scott, Conner, and Walton Verona high schools participated in this week-long, work based learning experience at Intrepid Farm in Walton, KY. Students were responsible for daily horse and stable care. Other hands-on activities included construction of a fire pit, transplanting trees, fence repair, and harvesting.

June 18 – 21, Transformation Nation Summer Camp

Fourteen students from Dixie, Lloyd, Scott, Simon Kenton, Boone County, and Conner high schools participated this year in four days of fun, hands-on activities that emphasized empowerment, self-discovery, and teamwork. Rounding out the week's activities, students took on team and individual challenges practicing principles of good sportsmanship--winning with honor, losing with grace, showing respect to teammates, and congratulating the opponents.

Professional Learning (PL) Update

June and July Professional Learning: NKCES supported a total of 31 professional learning opportunities focused on academics, culture and climate and special education during the month of June and July serving 530 educators.

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PL Consortium: The PL Consortium meets monthly on the third Friday of each month. We will kick off the school year with our first meeting on August 16 from 10:00 to noon.

2019 NKY Instructional Assistants Summer Conference: Across four days this summer, paraprofessionals from fourteen northern Kentucky districts gathered at NKCES to grow in their confidence and ability to support students. Topics covered included trauma-informed practices, student engagement, strategies to strengthen executive functioning challenges, thinking strategies, and behavior supports.

The #NoLimitsEDU podcast launch: On June 3rd, we launched the #NoLimitsEDU podcast. The goal of this podcast is to tap into the expertise and strengths of the educators in our region to cover a variety of topics for professional learning. The podcast is a way to reach more educators in Northern Kentucky in a way that does not depend on finances, time constraints, or geography. The Foundations for Learning to Read: On July 17th, twenty educators from 7 districts came together to learn strategies focused on the structure of language that will support primary students learning to read and older students with gaps in their reading abilities. In this day-long training, educators dove deep to answer the question, *What are phonological awareness, phonemic awareness, and phonics?* They also learned and practiced hands-on strategies to support each. Every participant left with resources to help them implement the strategies in their classroom this school year.

Professional Learning Communities (PLCs): Our PLC's will begin once again in September and will include: School Counselors, Instructional Coaches, Physical Education, Autism Spectrum Disorder/Low Incidence, Homeless Coordinators, Arts and Humanities, English Learners, Special Education and Media Specialists. PLCs provide opportunities for educators to grow professionally in a collaborative environment focused on collective learning.

Regional School Programs (RSP) Update:

Kroger Community project came to RSP June 4th and donated an incredible amount of time, completing several projects throughout our building for improvement. These include things like new gym mats hung, a mural in the gym, new flooring in the front office, painting all classrooms, organizing our donations and food pantry, cleaning out our memorial garden, redoing our staff lounge, and putting together a sensory room.

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Several RSP staff attended the Behavior Institute, and the administrative team, along with Officer Lucas, presented during the conference. Some staff also attended the Persistence to Graduation Summit.

RSP is hosting a Back to School Open House on August 6th.

RSP's first day back for students is August 8th, 2019.

English Learners (EL) Program Update:

We are currently in the interview process for a new EL Consultant as Elizabeth Winkler recently resigned. The position is posted and we are accepting applications.

Daniele attended the Title III Coordinators Training on Friday, July 26. She will be scheduling a meeting with the Title III Directors to review the information with them and to plan student services and professional development opportunities for the 2019-20 school year.

NKY Institute for Arts Education (NKIAE):

One hundred educators from 17 schools and 9 school districts across our region came together for our Arts Integration Workshop July 22 - 25. Focused on integrating the arts with math, teachers collaborated to design instruction that helps students grapple with and express understanding of math concepts through the arts.

Additionally, ELA teachers from last year's program interested in continuing their professional learning attended 6 hours of the workshop.

Participants will continue their collaboration at a September training / work session, and complete 10 additional hours of professional learning. With support from NKIAE Manager Joe Bertucci, teachers will implement their new integrated units during the 2019-20 school year.
