

Course Catalog 2019-2020

We offer a wide variety of classes that can be adapted to individual group's needs. Upon request, the staff can also schedule field trips to nearby nature preserves, museums and other cultural attractions. Our curriculum is aligned with Kentucky Core Content and the Next Generation Science Standards, and we work collaboratively with K-12 teachers to integrate our classes with their individual academic needs.

Animals of Pine Mountain

The anatomy, life history and ecological roles of local reptiles and amphibians are introduced to the students in a safe and engaging environment. Students are invited to interact with live animal ambassadors as they discover what makes these creatures vital to Appalachian ecosystems.

Time: 1.5 hrs

Appalachian Toys

Through hands-on demonstration and storytelling, students are introduced to traditional Appalachian toys. These handmade pieces represent various games and playthings used by early settler children. Themes of self-reliance and moral values permeate the history of these interesting items. Good option for evening programs.

Time: 1.5 hrs



Corn Shuck Crafts

This craft is inspired by art made by early settlers who found creative ways to recycle unused corn shucks. Under the guidance of patient and skilled instruction, students learn to create beautiful flowers out of dyed corn shucks. Good option for evening programs. Materials fee: \$3 per participant.

Time: 1.5 hrs

Early Settlers

Through storytelling and hands on discovery this class discusses the motivations and struggles experienced by early settlers. Starting in Europe we explore the motivations behind why settlers made the move to immigrate to North America. The daily routines of a typical household are truly brought to life and experienced through the use of real artifacts, antiques and tools. This class typically includes a tour of the cabin belonging to William Creech, the Settlement School's founding father, and a visit to the weaving room where students are able to work on our collection of large antique looms.

Time: 3 hrs

Geology

What is the geosphere and how does it impact our lives? Students will answer these questions and more as they explore the landscape of the region and learn how geologic formations have impacted

our society. Students will engage in a discussion about human use of natural resources with an emphasis on coal in Eastern Kentucky.

Time: 1.5 hrs

Folk Dance

Pine Mountain Settlement School has a long and rich tradition of folk dances stretching back to its founding over 100 years ago. This tradition is carried on today in our Folk Dancing class. Students are introduced to the history of traditional folkdances in the Appalachian Mountains and take part in dances called by instructors to traditional music. Good option for evening programs

Time: 1.5 hrs

The Nature Hike: Mixed Mesophytic Habitat of Kentucky Using our own James E. Bickford Nature Preserve as State students will make classroom, observations about the complex interactions of living and nonliving components of the forest ecosystem. As they hike the Split Rock Trail, students will collect scientific data and determine what makes the mixed mesophytic forest type so special. Time: 1.5 hrs



Grounded: Soil Science and Hydrology

Students will learn about what makes a soil and how this living system lays the groundwork for the ecosystems dependent upon it. An exploration will be made into the dynamic relationship between soils and ground water, paying attention to pollutants and watersheds. Students will be able to conduct and contribute to ongoing scientific studies to better understand the health of the soil types found at the settlement school.

Time: 1.5 hrs

Mysterious Mammals

This class introduces students to the common mammalian inhabitants of Kentucky. Students will develop comparison and analysis skills through a hands-on study of skulls. Using a dichotomous key, students will learn to identify mammals as herbivores, omnivores, carnivores, predator, prey, etc. Characteristics of mammals are taught with a focus on structure, form, and function. Time: 1.5 hrs

Medicinal Plants

This class investigates the evolution of medicinal plants for the purpose of healing. As the history of gaining medicinal plant knowledge is experienced, students will travel through time and around the globe in an effort to understand how plants as medicines have evolved from a high risk endeavor to the safer pharmaceutical use that we enjoy today.

Time: 1.5 hrs

Native Americans

This class is a close examination of the history and lifestyles of North America's original inhabitants. A focus on nomadic and sedentary cultures will give students an appreciation of the difficulties faced daily by our continent's indigenous people. Students will analyze authentic local artifacts and simulate hunting and gathering skills. This class includes a visit to a National Historic Landmark, located on campus, which was home to Kentucky's former residents.

Time: 3 hrs



On the Farm

Students will experience sustainable food production, land use and traditional farming practices through a visit to the Settlement School's working farm. They will have the opportunity to assist in some of the farm maintenance and, when available, enjoy handpicked seasonable produce. Worm care and bee keeping are additional activities offered as part this class. Time:1.5 hrs

Night Hike

Students will experience the forest from a different perspective while hiking after sunset. Using all five senses, students will learn how certain animals are specially adapted to thrive in the dark. The group will be on the lookout for deer, beavers, owls, and other nocturnal animals. This is a safe and unconventional way to interact with an ecosystem at night. Only offered as an evening program.

Time: 1.5 hrs

Orienteering

In this student-driven activity, teams learn how to use a map compass. After some instruction, students navigate an outdoor orienteering course using compass bearings and natural landmarks to travel from one point to another. Student will also practice measuring and estimating distances. Besides building on teamwork and problem solving skills, this class provides students with useful orienteering knowledge and experience.

Time: 1.5 hrs

Sand Cave Field Trip

Located just a short drive from campus, the Sand Cave offers a unique habitat for students to experience. Students will learn about cave formation as they explore each of the three rooms inside the cave, discover how specially adapted plants and animals rely on these underground habitats.

Time: 3 hrs



Stained Glass

Guided by our expert staff, participants will create their own masterpiece in this unique and beautiful art medium. Participants will learn how to cut, polish, solder and form small stained glass pieces to take home. Age limit: 9th grade and older. Materials fee: \$5 per participant.

Time: 3 hrs

Storytelling

Students will 'unplug' from modern technology-driven life and take part in a traditional Appalachian pastime suitable for all ages. Students will enjoy an evening of lively stories, performed by talented local storytellers. Only offered as an evening program.

Time: 1.5 hrs

Stream Study: Bioindicators of Stream Health

Students will collect, study, and compare biological indicators from the two stream habitats on campus. Through scientific inquiry and data collection, students will become stream scientists and discover the health of stream ecosystems.

Time: 1.5 hrs

Summit Hike

Pine Mountain is the second highest mountain in Kentucky and home to one of the most biodiverse ecosystems in the world. Students will practice teamwork as they overcome the physical challenge of hiking the trail through the forest to the top of the mountain, experiencing ecosystem dynamics unique geologic formations along the way. Age limit: 5th grade and older. Note: Trail conditions may vary. Alternate trails may be substituted at the staff's discretion.

Time: 3 hrs

Weaving

This traditional Appalachian craft allows students to create their own work of art while experiencing part of daily life for the early settlers of this region. Participants will learn the basic functions of a loom and will be able to work on floor and tabletop looms to create cloth pieces to take home. Materials fee: \$3 per participant.

Time: 1.5 hrs

Woodworking

Students will be able to carve simple products. Crafts include butter knives and letter openers. This class instructs proper carving techniques and safety. Pieces often require further work outside of class. Schools are responsible for providing their own carving knives. Good option for evening programs. Age limit: 7th grade and older. Materials fee: \$3 per participant.
