Consuelo Kickbusch

Born and raised along the border in a small barrio in Laredo, Tex., Consuelo Kickbusch overcame poverty, discrimination, and illiteracy to become the successful community leader she is today. Although she grew up



without material wealth, Kickbusch learned from her immigrant parents that she was rich in culture, tradition, values, and faith. These values were reinforced during her two decades of service in the U.S. Army, where she broke barriers and set records to become the highest-ranking Hispanic woman in the Combat Support Field. 
