- ✓ Newport Primary FRC Coordinator, Molly Wesley reports:
  - As of November 7, 2019, the following were distributed to students since the last monthly report:
    - Six (6) home visits regarding Household Income Forms (4), attendance, and student sleeping at school
    - 62 items of clothing and/or shoes from the FRC clothing closet (many thanks to all of the individuals who donate their gently used clothing and shoes to the FRC)
    - 4 additional students have been able to shop at the Care Closet since the last report. MANY thanks to volunteer, Amy Silverton, for keeping the Care Closet so well stocked and organized, and for treating our students with such care and dignity! Also, MANY thanks to California Closets for donating two walls' worth of display and storage for clothing! It looks GREAT!!!
    - 4 backpacks
    - 5 NPS families with infant/toddler/special needs children received Sweet Cheeks diapers this month (through partnership with the Care Closet)
    - 85 Power Packs per week are given to NPS students on Fridays
    - A referral for assistance hygiene due to turned off utilities
    - 20 NPS families will be receiving Thanksgiving food from 7 Hills Church; additionally, as of today, 85 NPS/NIS children are being matched with local donors to receive Christmas gifts.

    - October 29 Newport Optimist lunch presentation about potential partnership regarding a donation of a coat fund
    - October 31 met with NKU student teacher about the FRC
    - October 31 NPS House Event
    - November 1 Visited a NPS employee who had recently had surgery, and also visited a recent Newport High School graduate who just delivered a baby
  - The following ongoing activities are occurring, and involving FRC staff/volunteers:

- Fourteen NPS classrooms are participating in partnerships through the Adopt a Class program, including Crossroads Church, Mars Chocolate, United Way, Citibank, Brighton Center, USI Insurance (2), Red Hot Promotions (The Think Shop), Pricewaterhouse Coopers, US Bank (2), Movement Church, Clerk's Office at the US Court of Appeals for the 6<sup>th</sup> Circuit, and the Cincinnati Reds. At least once a month, a different Adopt a Class partner is being featured on the school's website and Facebook page, as a way to recognize their contributions to NPS students!
- Twelve Lunch Buddies (Big Brother Big Sister, school-based mentoring) are spending 45-minutes together at lunchtime each week, and applications have gone home with students who may be matched with a Lunch Buddy in the future.
- 16 students are walking to the Boys & Girls Club after school with B&G Club staff.
- NPS students are able to receive mental health therapy on-site through Greater Cincinnati Behavioral Health, MEBS & Associates, NorthKey, and our school counselor. Many students also see outside agencies (i.e., Holly Hill, Therapeutic Collaborative) for therapy. Molly receives calls regularly from case managers at MEBs Associates, regarding common clients.
- Students at NPS continue to be encouraged to recycle items at school, and to continue to collect plastic lids to recycle into additional "Buddy Benches" and/or other furniture for the school.
- Molly serves on the NPS attendance committee, with Brian Zepf, Angelika Huff, Mr. Atkins, Debbie Roaden, and Kristy McNally – this group meets regularly to discuss interventions, etc. Recently, students who had perfect attendance in September received a "brag tag" to attach to their backpack; October perfect attendance students will receive an additional brag tag soon.
- Molly re-stocks the Little Library almost daily, with donations of used books
- To date, Molly has worked with Debbie Mollette (and the organization through which her dog was certified as a therapy dog) for a variety of dogs to come to visit the special needs students in Ms. Zimmerman's, and Ms. Turner's, classrooms, twice during most weeks!
- Molly, Kristy McNally, and Amber Onkst have two Masters level Social Work students interning for the school year.
- Molly is working with Sister Claire Therese at Newport Central Catholic to match their sophomores with NPS 2<sup>nd</sup> graders as pen pals. Letters from NCC to the NPS 2<sup>nd</sup> graders

- have been delivered! Responses from the 2<sup>nd</sup> graders should be getting delivered to NCC today!
- Molly is distributing and collecting applications for children birth-age 5 to participate in Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, in order to receive free books each month.
- Molly continues to work with St. Elizabeth to make available their Employee Assistance Program, at which staff and their household members can receive up to 8 free mental health visits.
- The following activities are currently happening in the FRC:
  - Newport FRYSC Coordinators continue to be busy collecting outstanding FRAM (HIF) forms from all enrolled students.
  - Molly submitted a proposal to a Philanthropy class at NKU, to receive funds from Scripps Howard Foundation, to assist with expenses for the BornLearning Academy.
  - The NIS and NPS FRC's are currently distributing and collecting needs assessments to assist with program planning for the FRCs.
  - Molly nominated a NPS teacher for the Teacher of the Year award through the VFW

## ✓ Newport Intermediate School FRC Coordinator, Amber Onkst reports:

October 28<sup>th</sup> through November 1<sup>st</sup>. We had two dental teams here that were able to see 128 students for cleanings, extractions and cavity fillings. Due to the high level of need, the clinic will be back for two

- more days in November to finish with cavities. Additionally, 35 students were seen that had NEVER been to a dentist per school records.
- KDE- FRC in partnership with NPS FRC hosted a representative from KDE for the day. She followed FRCs around and observed all the services that FRC's provide at school.
- PBIS- FRC continues to assist in securing donations for the CATS Store.
- Club 312 -The FRC co-hosts an after-school program on Wednesdays.
   Currently, we have about 15-20 girls that attend.
- O KY OSA- The FRC hosted our Healthy Trick or Treat on October 24 here at NIS. We had 444 people in attendance. Students and their families trick or treated throughout the building stopping at health stations, Reading stations, Math stations and some fun Candy stations as well!
- Big Brothers Big Sisters- This program continues to provide approximately 70 students with weekly mentoring.
- Alumni Project- Our mentors continue to come regularly and meet with students as a part of this mentoring program. We currently have 7 students in this program. We are looking to expand; hopefully in the New Year with more mentors.
- Care Closet- Two volunteers continue to serve students on a weekly basis who do not have access to appropriate clothing. Students all shop and receive a full bag of clothes to keep!
- Adopt A Class- FRC has established 11 Adopt-A-Class partners, with three more in the process of becoming active!
- Home visits- FRC continues to attend home visits, as needed by the Principal, Asst. Principal, Special Ed. Classrooms or homeroom classrooms. FRC is still working on completing FRAM forms for the remaining 7 students at NIS who have not yet completed their forms.
- Power Packs- FRC had our site visit from FreeStore Foodbank for our Power Pack program. We had no issues during this visits and are approved to continue providing this service here at NIS.
- Lakeside Christian Church hosted their second power pack packing for weekend food bags for students for this school year. FRC is providing 89 students with weekend food bags. The third packing is scheduled for November 7<sup>th</sup>.
- Attendance Team- FRC is now serving on this team, which meets weekly to identify students with re-occurring absences and tardy events and schedule specific interventions to address these absent events. FRC is responsible for assigned students and completes follow up contact with the students' families to address concerns related to attendance.
- Student Support Team- FRC is working with school counselor to develop a student support team to address students' need that interferes with classroom instruction.

- One to One-FRC is coordinating the One to One program here. We currently have three coaches tutoring 3<sup>rd</sup> graders in reading.
- Anthony Munoz Character Development Camp- FRC is gearing up for our next camp with AMF. This camp is target for just Hispanic students. We have four students registered so far.
- Needs Assessment- This is a grant-writing year for the Family Resource Centers. FRC has completed the needs assessment and has sent it home with all students and out to all staff in order to begin gathering the data necessary to write the FRYSC grant for the 2020-2021 through 2021-2022 school years.
- Born Learning- In October, FRCs hosted the first of 6 BL Academies.
   We had six participants and 28 children present.
- Parent Support Group- In October, we hosted the first of 6 PSG meetings. We had 10 participants.
- CCC Regional Meeting- FRC attended the Community Collaboration for Children regional meeting and received training on the Baby Steps program, HIV/AIDs prevention and Narcan training.

- ✓ NISD 21<sup>st</sup> Century Heather Anderson, NHS and Kim Ward, (K-8 Kimberly Mullins Ward- Program Coordinator, Hannah Martin NPS Site Coordinator and Sara Collini NIS Site Coordinator) Heather reports:
  - To date, 95 different high school students have attended the 21st Century Programs this academic year.
  - The Newport High School program currently averages 13 students a day.
  - On October 29th the 21st Century Program hosted a QPR Suicide Awareness training. Larry McNabb, a certified trainer graciously provided this training at no costs. It was attended by parents, staff, guests and students. Professional Development hours were awarded to teachers.
  - The NHS 21st Century Community Learning Center will host a College 101 event on Tuesday, November 19th from 4:30-6:30 pm in the cafeteria. Families are invited to attend and spend time speaking with local colleges, work on their FAFSA, and learn about scholarship opportunities. Kim reports:
  - 21st Century staff: Kimberly Mullins-Ward- Program Coordinator, Hannah Martin – NPS Site Coordinator and Sara Collini – NIS Site Coordinator
  - Newport Primary –125 students have participated this year. Camp Wildcat is up and running at NPS. 21<sup>st</sup> Century is currently serving 50 students daily, Mon – Thursday. We currently have a wait list for this program. Students participate in homework help, tutoring, and daily enrichment activities.
    - On Saturday November 2<sup>nd</sup>, NPS Nature Club students enjoyed a funfilled field trip to Sunrock Farm with their entire families. Students had the opportunity to feed farm animals, milk a goat and hold baby chickens. The NPS Nature Club will continue to plan monthly outings for participating students' and their families.
  - Newport Intermediate- 254 students have participated this year. The

  - Newport Middle (7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup>) 55 students have participated this year. The following are a list of the current activities for 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> students. Breakfast Club, Homework Help/Study Table, Art Club, Youth Leadership Development, Newport Strong, Science Club, Dungeons & Dragons, Hip Hop Dance and Adventure Crew.

- Kim Ward spoke to the Newport City Commissioners Meeting on October 21<sup>st</sup> regarding the ongoing partnership between Newport Schools 21<sup>st</sup> Century program and the Newport Penguins. The Penguins have provided free swim lessons to selected Camp Wildcat students for the past three years. We hope to increase funding so that more students can attend the swim lessons this summer and for a longer time period.
- 21<sup>st</sup> Century partnered with the Brighton Center to provide Suicide Prevention training to families and staff on Tuesday October 29<sup>th</sup> at NHS. Certified QPR (Question, Persuade, Refer) trainer, Larry McNabe, spoke about emergency responses to someone in crisis.
- O Activity highlight: Each month, both NPS and NIS pick a monthly "Spotlight Student". This is a monthly student recognition program that recognizes students based on their character and leadership skills during after school programming. Our goal is to shine a light on these students and honor them for being such great citizens!

  - In addition, she assists with identification of students eligible for school based vaccines
  - Vision screenings by the Lions Club were held at Newport Intermediate on October 17, 2019. 78 students underwent laser vision evaluation. 20 were referred to eye care specialists; 11 of those were already under the care of a doctor.
  - Big Smiles with be at NHS in December and at NPS in January.
- ✓ Mike Wills, DPP & Director of Student Services
  - Kelly's Kids and the district leaders will again take part in supporting the annual East Row Historic Foundation (ERHF) Victorian Christmas Tour on December 7 and 8, 2019.
  - O You now have our third month attendance report attached. It remains the best trend we have had in the past three years, but it is still early. I can tell you that all schools are working hard on improving student attendance and it is important to remember that excused absence like unexcused absence hurt student learning and both the U. S. Department of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education are now tracking chronic absenteeism. That is all children missing 10% of the current school year are now coded a chronic absentee student in the Kentucky Student Information System (KSIS).
  - The District Calendar Committee survey for the three calendar options for the 2020-2021 Academic Year closed on Friday, October 25. The results are as follows:
    - Option # 2 Received 38.18%
    - Option #1 Received 37.63 %
    - Option #3 Received 24.19%

I will have all three on the January agenda for your scheduled first reading and the normal adoption during the regular February meeting.
