4. PRESENTATIONS

4.A. Kentucky League of Cities Executive Director/CEO J.D. Chaney presented the *2019 Friend of Kentucky Cities Award* to Senator Matt Castlen.

4.B. Mayor Watson presented the *Cap Gardner Award* to Dana Coomes, Occupational Tax & ABC Administrator, Finance Department.

4.C. Mayor Watson presented the OMU & Owensboro Neighborhood Alliance *Golden Santa Award* to Robert Kuhner of 3876 Raintree Drive. Mr. Kuhner won gift certificates from the Neighborhood Alliance and OMU.

4.D. Brittany Johnson, Economic Development Corporation Executive Director, provided an update (attached).

4.E. Mac Neel, Alexander Thompson Arnold, PLLC presented the June 30, 2019 audit report (attached). Mayor Watson made a motion to accept the audit report, second was made by Commissioner Smith-Wright and passed unanimously.

5. BUSINESS

5.A. Minutes dated December 3, 2019 were unanimously approved upon motion of Mayor Watson with a second by Mayor Pro Tem Maglinger.

5.B. The following board appointments were unanimously approved upon motion of Commissioner Sanford with a second by Commissioner Conder:

- **Property Maintenance Code Enforcement Board** – Reappoint Glenn Morrison to a three-year term expiring January 4, 2023.
- **Regional Water Resource Agency Board of Directors** – Reappoint Bob Whitmer to continue filling a term expiring June 30, 2020.
- **Senior Community Center of Owensboro-Daviess County** – Appoint J.T. Fulkerson to a three-year term expiring December 31, 2022.

5.C. The following board appointment was approved 4-1 (Commissioner Conder abstained) upon motion of Mayor Watson with a second by Commissioner Sanford:

- **Owensboro-Daviess County Drug and Alcohol Steering Committee** – Reappoint Rosemary Conder to continue filling a term expiring September 1, 2020.

5.D. The following board appointment was approved 4-1 (Mayor Pro Tem Maglinger abstained) upon motion of Mayor Watson with a second by Commissioner Smith-Wright:

- **Greater Owensboro Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors** – Reappoint Larry Maglinger to a one-year term expiring January 1, 2021.

6. ORDINANCES – 2ND READING - None

7. ORDINANCES – 1ST READING

7.A. Ordinance 36-2019 entitled AN ORDINANCE CLOSING AND ABANDONING A PORTION OF AN ALLEY RIGHT-OF-WAY AT THE REAR OF 418 AND 424 BOLIVAR STREETS IN THE CITY OF OWENSBORO, KENTUCKY, AT THE REQUEST OF STS. JOSEPH & PAUL CATHOLIC CHURCH, was introduced and publicly read on first reading.

Sts. Joseph & Paul Catholic Church has petitioned the City to close and abandon a 10 foot wide alley right-of-way at the rear of 418 and 424 Bolivar Streets. Sts. Joseph & Paul Catholic Church is the owner of the only adjoining lots. City Manager Pagan added that the church owns all adjacent property and there are no objections from city staff.

7.B. Ordinance 37-2019 entitled AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND UPDATING SECTIONS 5-127, 5-129, 5-130, 5-136, AND 5-137 OF THE PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE AS CODIFIED IN CHAPTER 5, ARTICLE IV, DIVISION 1 OF THE OWENSBORO MUNICIPAL CODE, was introduced and publicly read on first reading.

The Property Maintenance Code is codified in Chapter 5, Article IV, Division 1 of the Owensboro Municipal Code. The Code has had few amendments since its enactment in 2011 and it is necessary to amend certain sections to better serve the citizens of the City. City Manager Pagan explained the changes were presented at the December work session. Bob Clark (1533 E. 26th Street) asked questions regarding the definition of hobby vehicles. Wayne Shelton, Public Works Director, explained that each location/site will be looked at specifically. Commissioner Sanford asked if a trailer with an ATV on it counts as one or two vehicles. There was further discussion on the clarifications of the ordinance. Tracie Payne (102 E. Warwick Drive) asked for clarification on privacy fences and ordinary view. After further discussion, City Attorney Steve Lynn advised Mr. Payne he did not believe his property would be in violation, with the exception of a horse.

8. MUNICIPAL ORDERS

8.A., Municipal Order 34-2019 entitled A MUNICIPAL ORDER AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE A PARKING LEASE AGREEMENT WITH THE ENCLAVE AT RIVERFRONT LIVING, LLC. AND TO APPROVE THE EASEMENTS AS CONTAINED IN EXHIBIT “A”, was approved 4-1 on one reading upon

motion of Mayor Watson with a second by Commissioner Smith-Wright; Commissioner Conder voted Nay.

The Enclave at Riverfront Living, LLC has constructed a multi-story building located on the corner of Frederica Street and Veterans Boulevard which will be utilized for retail, commercial and/or residential purposes. The building needs to lease approximately ten (10) parking spaces. Additionally, previously approved ingress and egress easements need to be amended. City Manager Pagan explained the parking lease elements and the revised easement need for the Enclave. The original easements were approved in 2016 based on construction plans, however, amendments were warranted due to changes in the construction.

8.B. Municipal Order 35-2019 entitled A MUNICIPAL ORDER AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE A MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN THE CITY OF OWENSBORO AND DAVIESS COUNTY, KENTUCKY FOR EMERGENCY MEDICAL AMBULANCE SERVICES AND ESTABLISHING AN AMBULANCE CONTRACTING AUTHORITY, was approved 4-1 on one reading upon motion of Mayor Watson with a second by Commissioner Smith-Wright; Commissioner Conder voted Nay.

The City and County own a license to provide emergency medical ambulance service to the citizens of Owensboro and Daviess County. The City and County have determined that the best interest and welfare of their respective citizens require them to enter into a Memorandum of Agreement establishing the "Ambulance Contracting Authority" or "ACA". The MOA shall be utilized until the City and County can fully study and establish a permanent ordinance repealing and replacing Daviess County Fiscal Court Ordinance No. 860.2 and City of Owensboro Ordinance 8-98. City Manager stated the County has previously adopted the Agreement and added that the Medical Control Authority will be disbanded through a future ordinance.

8.C. Municipal Order 36-2019 entitled A MUNICIPAL ORDER AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE REAL ESTATE PURCHASE AGREEMENTS FOR PROPERTIES LOCATED AT 1013 W. 8TH STREET, 1015 W. 8TH STREET AND 1017 W. 8TH STREET; AND FURTHER DECLARING THE PROPERTIES AS SURPLUS PROPERTIES; AND FURTHER AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE DEEDS TRANSFERRING THE PROPERTIES IN ACCORDANCE WITH KRS 82.083, was unanimously approved on one reading upon motion of Mayor Watson with a second by Commissioner Conder.

Property owners of 1013 W. 8th Street, 1015 W. 8th Street and 1017 W. 8th Street have agreed to convey said properties to the City. The City seeks to acquire said properties for the purposes of housing development using HOME funds in compliance with National Housing and Urban Development objectives of removing blighted properties. The City desires to declare these properties to be surplus property, so that they can be leased, transferred, or sold in accordance with KRS 82.083. City Manager Pagan explained the City would purchase the three (3) properties with federal funds and

transfer them to Habitat for Humanity who will then construct two (2) new homes on the lots.

9. CITY MANAGER ITEMS

The closed session adjourned upon motion of Mayor Watson and a second by Commissioner Smith-Wright; motion passed unanimously.

There being no further business to discuss, the meeting unanimously adjourned at 6:30 p.m. upon motion of Mayor Watson and a second by Commissioner Conder.

Basic Audit Process and Risk Assessment

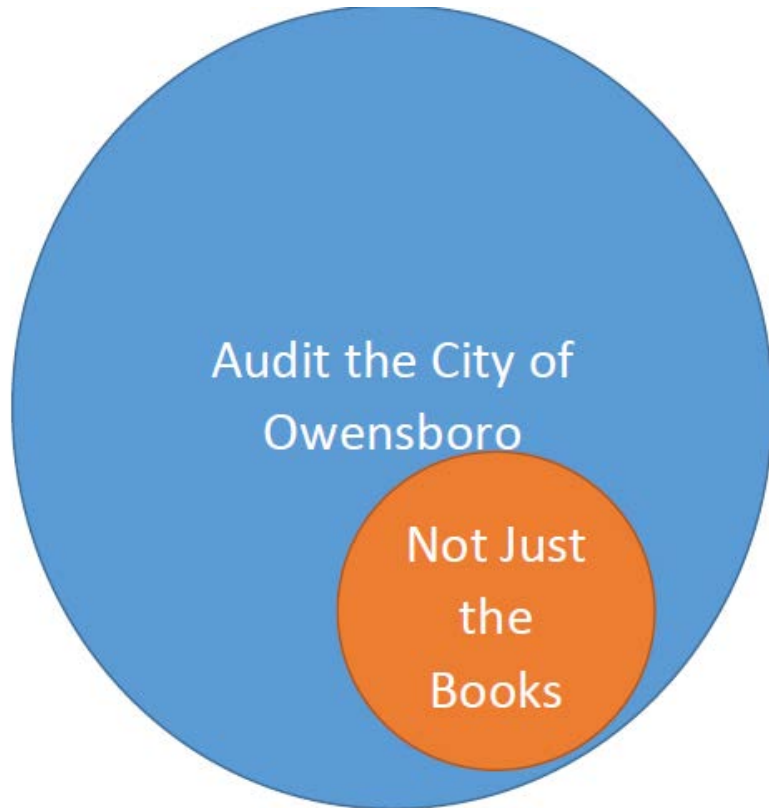


System Documentation

- Processes and controls for each key area of transactions were analyzed and documented in flowchart form.
- Key steps in the respective system were compared to our flowcharts by observation, inquiry and review of standard reports generated to ensure accuracy of our understanding of each system.
- Audit risks (inherent and control risks) were assessed and evaluated based on effectiveness of controls employed within the City as part of our preliminary testing.

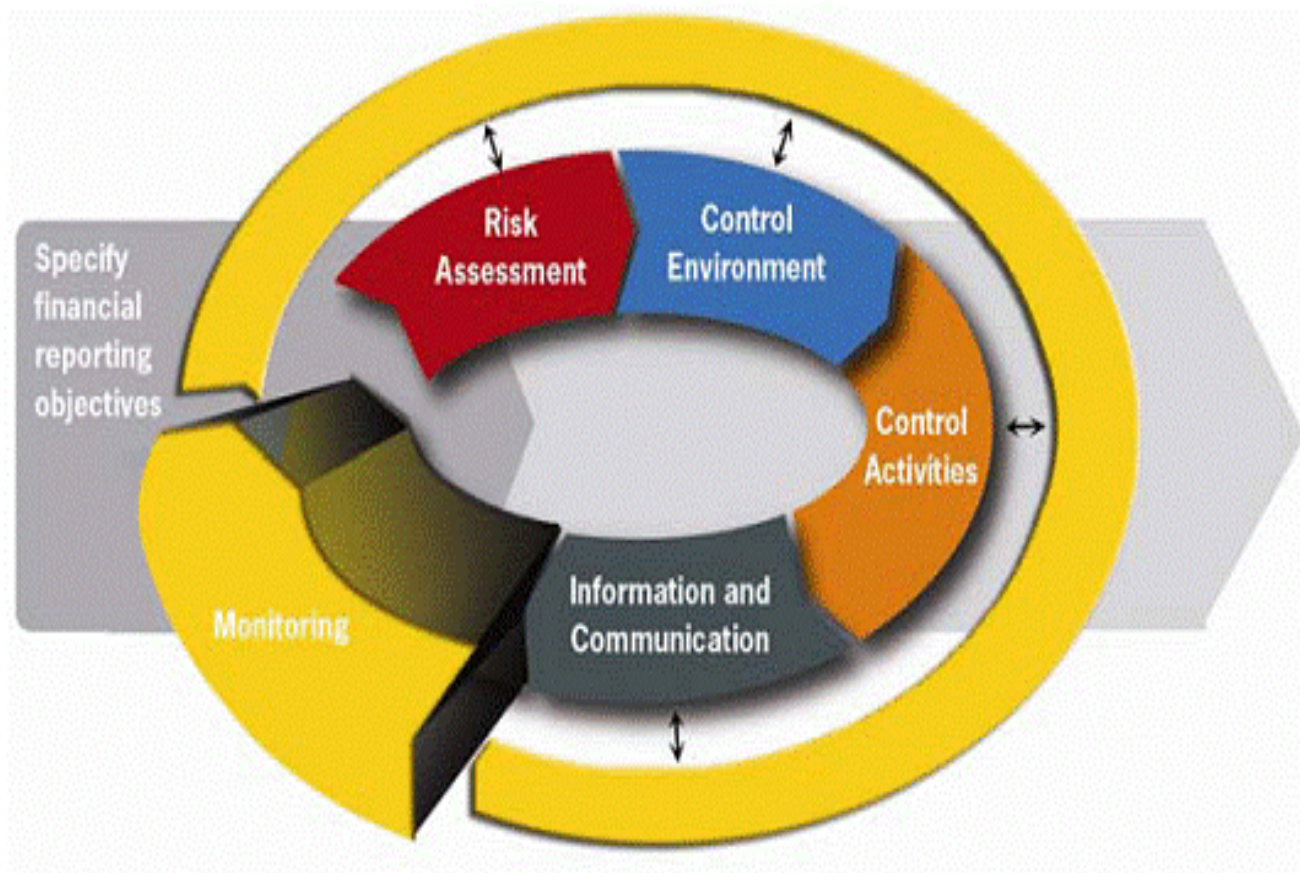


Initial Risk Assessment



- Analyzed the impact of risks identified which could impact the City:
 - Regulatory environment
 - Economic climate(locally-regionally-nationally).
 - Concentrations of tax payers.
 - Other unique factors (pension and OPEB)

- These two items will be a challenge for the City into the foreseeable future.

Financial Highlights-General Fund

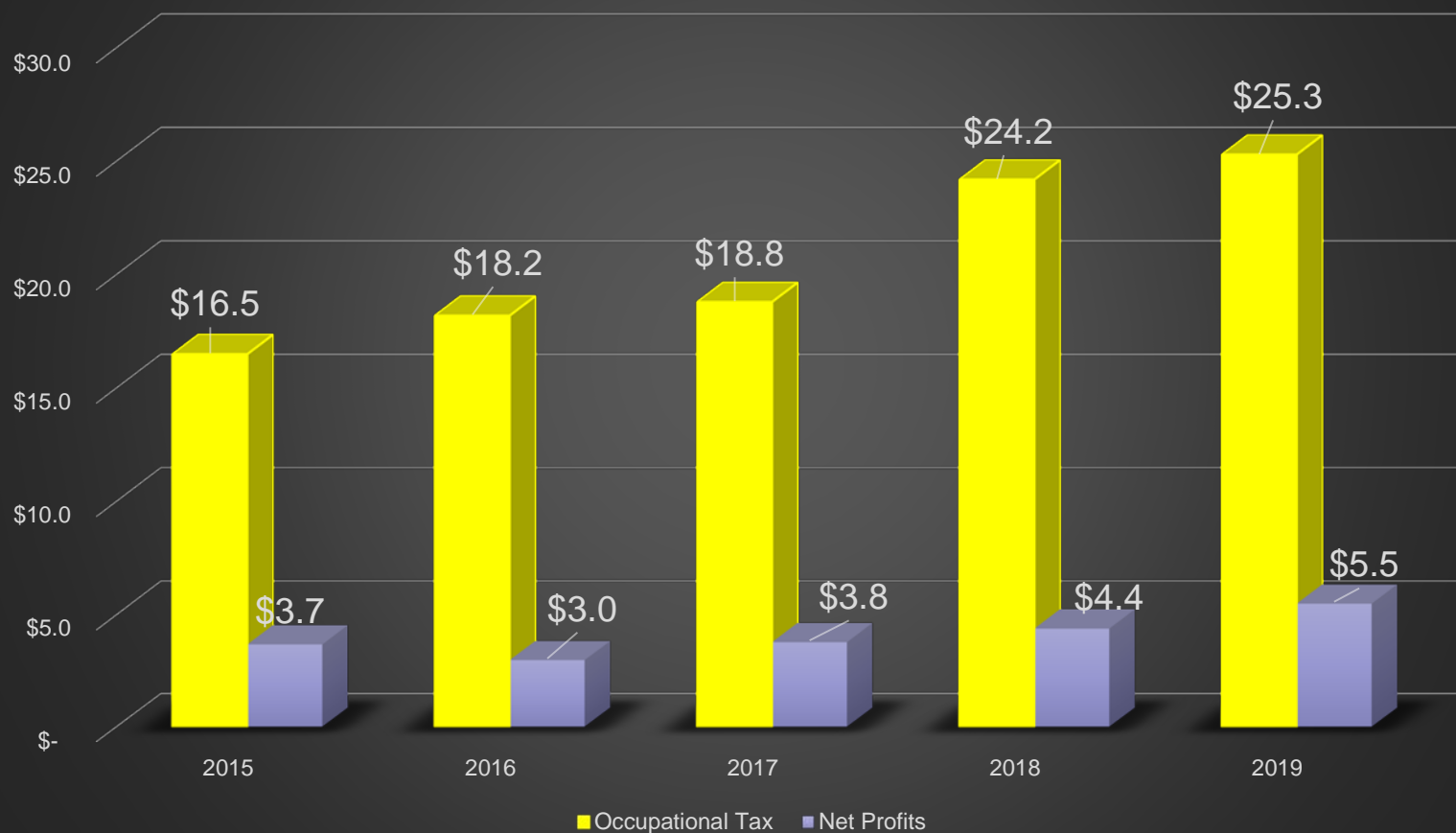
- Fund balance increased by \$5.7 million for FY 2019, and \$2.4 million for FY 2018.

Financial Highlights-General Fund

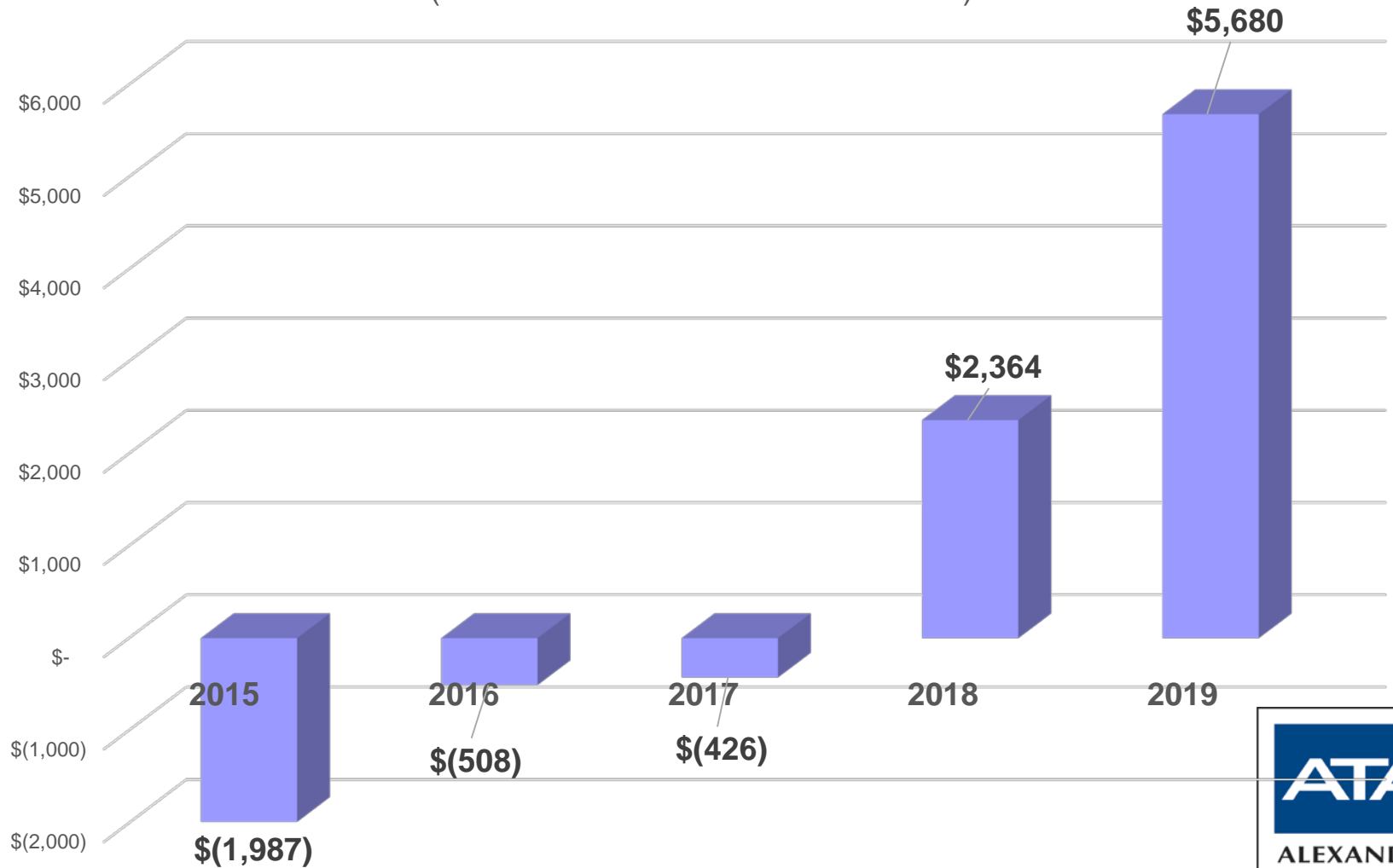
- Most recent rating is A1 upgraded from A2 in the previous year. This was primarily due to improved revenues which resulted in increases in fund balances.

(Amounts in Thousands 000's omitted)

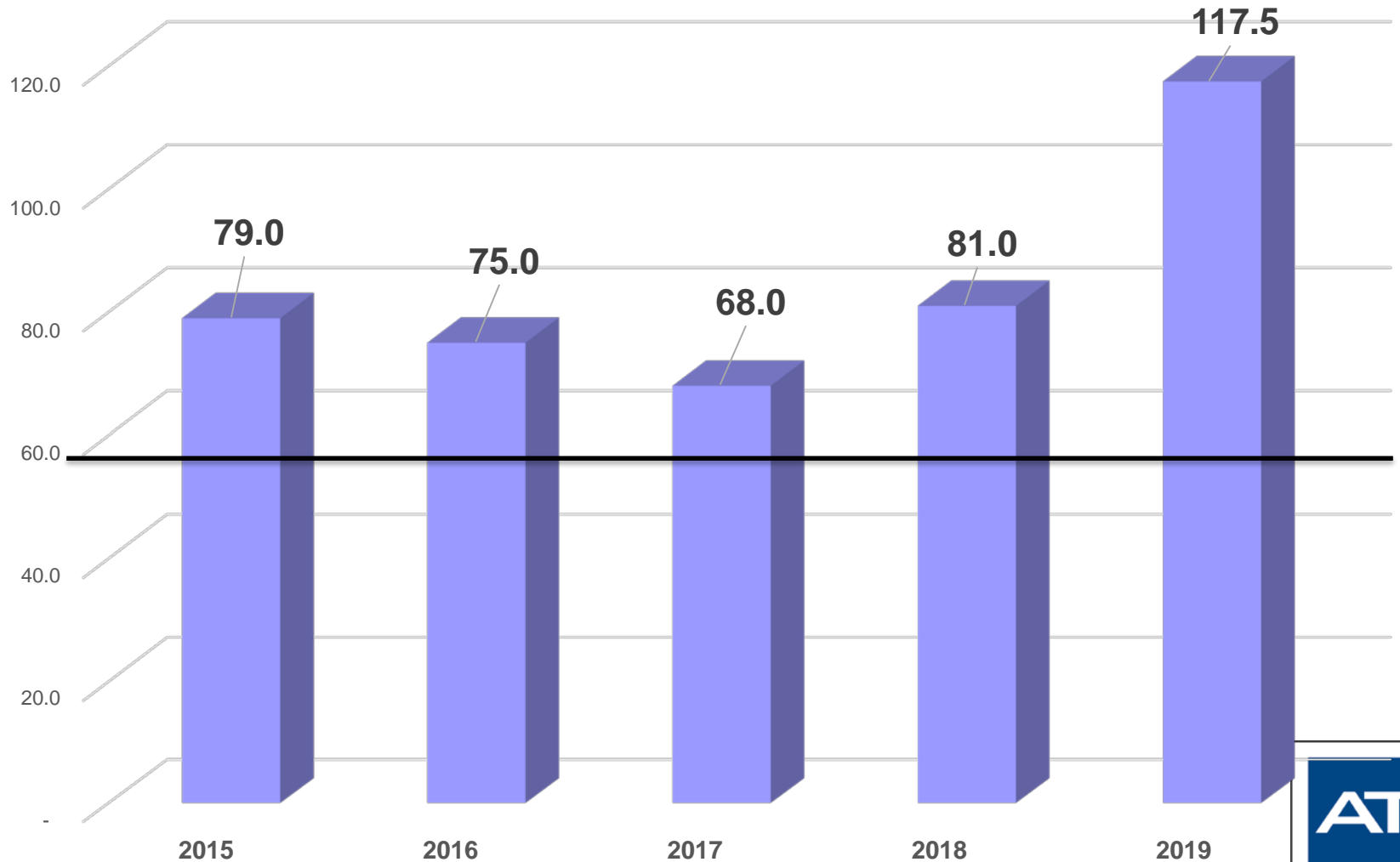


General Fund Balance Trend- 2015 to 2019

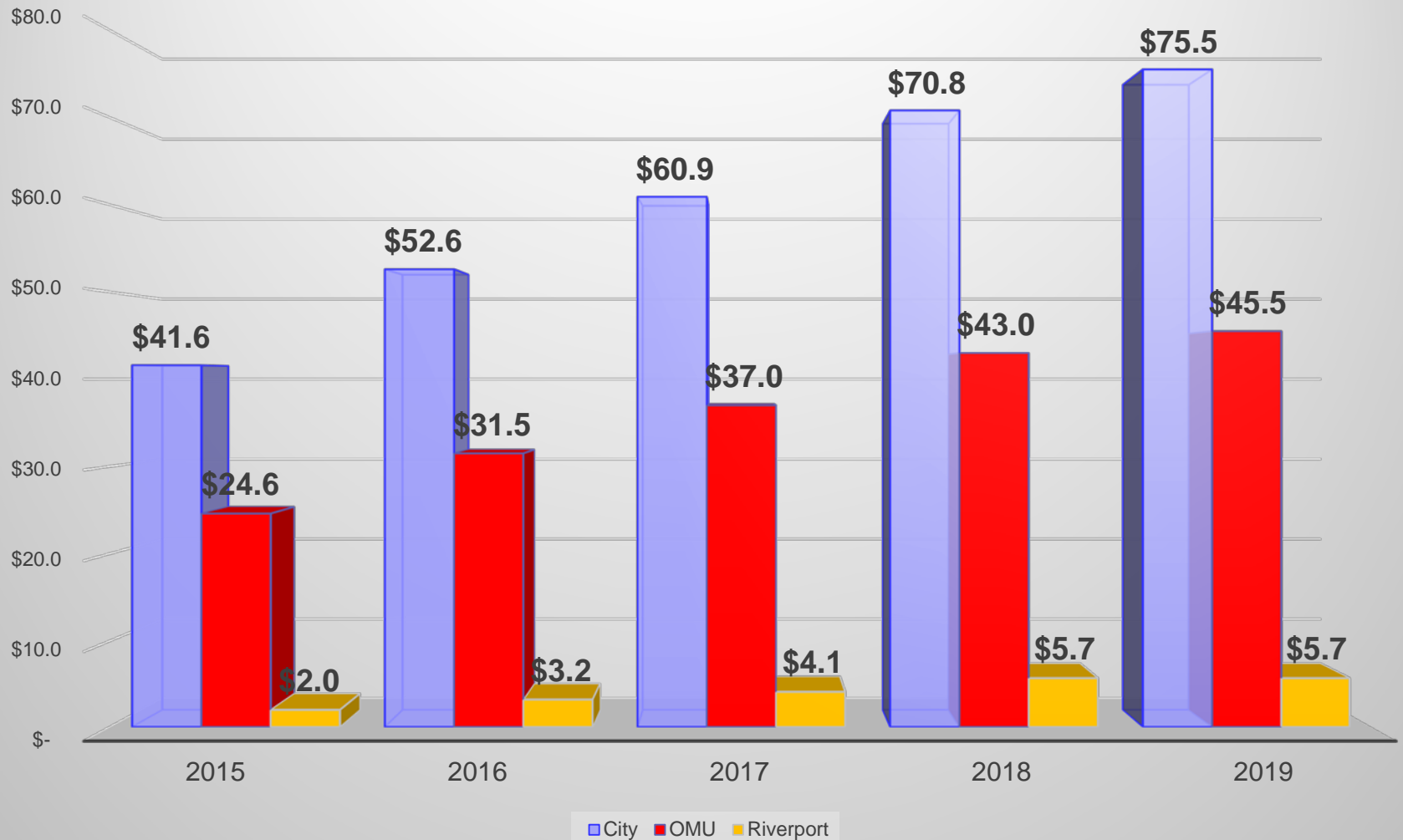
Debt Service Expenditure Trend 2015-2019
