Horizon Youth Service Center Advisory Council By-Laws

ARTICLE I: NAME AND CONSTITUENCY

- Section 1: The name of this organization shall be the Horizon Youth Service Center Advisory Council.
- Section 2: The Horizon Youth Service Center shall serve all regardless of race, creed, age, sex, or religion.

ARTICLE II: MISSION AND PURPOSE

- Section 1: The general purpose of the Advisory Council is to assure school, parent, student, and community involvement in planning, implementing, and maintaining the Center. This Council will provide advisement, expertise, and support to the Center and its operations and will monitor the Center's mission, purposes, goals, policies, programs, services, strengths, and needs.
- Section 2: More specifically, the Council will monitor overall program effectiveness by:
 - (a) Assisting in the development and yearly renewal of the grant proposal.
 - (b) Reviewing action plan and providing ideas and expertise for planning the Center's programming.
 - (c) Suggesting modifications to program as needs develop.
 - (d) Approving documentation and other forms of the Center.
 - (e) Assisting in obtaining community support and services for students and their families served by the Center.
 - (f) Assisting in the evaluation of program components.
 - (g) Reviewing the budget on a bi-monthly basis and approving budget amendments as needed.
 - (h) Having a shared role in the hiring of the center coordinator.

ARTICLE III: COUNCIL'S ROLE IN HIRING OF CENTER COORDINATOR

Section 1: In the event of a coordinator vacancy, an advisory council hiring committee will be activated. Hiring committee should consist of at least two advisory council members, at least one principal or guidance counselor from each school served, and the FRYSC district contact. Hiring committee will review applications, select candidates, Interview, and recommend top applicant for hire.

ARTICLE IV: COUNCIL MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1: Council membership is open to all regardless of race, creed, sex, or religion.
- Section 2: Membership of the council shall be 1/3 parents, who are not employees of the school. The membership should have no more than 1/3 school staff. The remainder of the council should include community representatives and 2 youth.
- Section 3: New advisory council members (parent, community, school, and student representatives) will be recommended by current council members, YSC Coordinator, and/or school staff.
- Section 4: School and community participants may serve on the committee as long as they desire to serve and participate in the purpose of the council. Parent representatives may serve on the council as long as they have a child who is a student at Trigg County Middle School and/or Trigg County High School and as long as they participate in the purpose of the council. Effective dates will be July 1 June 30 for the grant year.
- Section 5: Ex-officio members shall include the Youth Service Center Coordinator, the Center's Program Assistant, Principals of all schools served, and the FRYSC District Contact.
- Section 6: Council members are expected to attend regular council meetings.

 The coordinator will have the option to automatically replace any member who is absent from three consecutive meetings. Whenever a vacancy becomes available, the coordinator will solicit suggestions from council membership for filling that vacancy.

ARTICLE V: MEETINGS AND VOTING

- Section 1: Horizon Youth Service Center meetings are open to all. Members will be notified about meetings through email, phone, or postcard.
- Section 2: The Council shall meet every other month (August through May) on an odd month basis.
- Section 3: Special meetings of the Council may be called by the Coordinator and/or chairperson.
- Section 4: The meeting will be conducted by the Chairperson or Vice-Chairperson in an informal fashion. Decision of the council will follow discussion, the making of a motion, a second, and an affirmative voice vote. Decisions will be made by a majority vote (consensus) of the members present.
- Section 5: Between meetings, there may be situations that arise that require advisory council approval. If this cannot wait until the next meeting, the center coordinator has the option to seek approval through email. In such case, the coordinator must receive written approval from a majority of advisory council members before proceeding.
- Section 6: Unless otherwise provided in these by-laws, the Council shall conduct its meetings in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE VI: OFFICERS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- Section 1: Officers of the Council shall include
 - 1. Chairperson (elected) who shall:
 - a. Preside over such meetings
 - b. Appoint all necessary committees
 - c. Be a non-school person
 - 2. Vice Chairperson (elected)
 Shall perform the responsibilities of the Chairperson in the latter's absence.
 - 3. The Center Staff shall conduct the official correspondence and develop, distribute, and maintain the record of all council proceedings.
- Section 2: The Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson positions will be elected by

nomination and majority vote of the council membership present.

Section 3: The officers' term of office shall be July 1 – June 30. The term of office is one year and is renewable as long as the member serves on the council.

ARTICLE VII: AMENDING BY-LAWS

Section 1: These by-laws may be amended by passage of a motion approving the change.

Section 2: A majority vote of Council members present may approve the proposed change in by-laws.

ARTICLE VIII: RELATIONSHIP WITH BOARD OF EDUCATION & SBDM COUNCILS

Section 1: The Advisory Council will be working with the Board of Education, administrative staff, and superintendent by relaying all Horizon Youth Service Center's Advisory Council minutes to the Board of Education and each school's Site Based Decision Making Council (SBDM) for their review. Horizon Youth Service Center employees and Advisory Council members will be encouraged to serve on the SBDM committees.

ARTICLE IX: CRITERIA FOR EXPENDITURES

Section 1: Basic Needs Expenditures: This is defined as food, school supplies, clothing, medical/health/dental/vision care assistance. Grant funds are to be used on an emergency, last resort basis only. Other funding sources must have been contacted and exhausted first. Coordinator will verify student/family need and approve purchases. The center cannot spend more than \$150.00 per individual per fiscal year out of its grant monies unless there are special circumstances approved by the Horizon Youth Service Center Coordinator and Advisory Council Chairperson. No more than \$1,000 will be allocated for basic needs expenditures per year. Assistance for utitility and housing costs will be referred to community helping agencies.

- Section 2: Incentives, Awards, and Recognition Expenditures: Funds may be used to purchase student reward items for reaching goals or achievements with specific YSC program or activity. This will be done in moderation considering the size of group participation. No more than 1% of grant funds will be spent on awards, recognition, or incentives.
- Section 3: Food Expenditures: Funds may be used to purchase food and drinks for refreshments at parent or student activities and programs. Center may provide refreshment or meals for Advisory Council members. This practice should be kept to a minimum so as to keep funds available for student and family activities and programs. No more than 1% of grant funds will be spent on food.
- Section 4: Travel Expenditures for Non-FRYSC Staff: FRYSC funds can be used to provide travel expenses for the following person(s) and activities. No more than 1% of grant funds will be spent on Non-FRYSC travel.
 - A. Students FRYSC designated field trips, transport home, or doctor's appointments.
 - B. Parents As part of parent involvement efforts, i.e. transportation to/from school for academic/education purposes, parent attendance at school conferences, etc.

SCHOOL DATA:

Two years ago before the FY 19-20 CPP was written, administrators at the middle and high school had both reported an alarming increase in the number of students struggling with emotional and mental health issues, family problems, and feelings of self-harm or hard towards others. In the first half of the school year, there had been an unprecedented number of suicide attempts at the high school. In response, administration has taken aggressive action in the past two years, and the YSC played an active role in implementing Sources of Strength, a research based suicide prevention program. By October of 2019, the high school showed reports of harm to self and others were down by 83%, mental health counseling referrals were down 78%, days of ALC down 42%, days of suspension down 43%, and suspension events were down 66%. In addition the 2019 Gallup Poll for TCHS shows a score of 3.95 (compared to 3.8 nationally) for students who feel that adults at school care about them, and a score of 4.1 (compared to 3.47 nationally) for students who say they have a mentor who encourages their development.

The High School reports that 33 students received discipline for having e-cigarettes or vape pens on the school campus during the 2018-2019 school year, and 26 have been caught so far this school year. The Middle School reports 15 students were caught with e-cigarettes or vape pens during the 2018-2019 school year, and there have been 5 students caught so far this school year. Administration from both schools agree that students using vape type products is a problem and that there probably are a lot going undetected.

COUNTY/DISTRICT DATA:

According to the in-school therapist from Pennyroyal Mental Health, counselors are seeing an increased number of students who are struggling with anxiety and depression, as well as, the lack of coping skills. It is her belief that many of these issues come from children watching their parents ineffectively cope with their own stressors.

When comparing KIP data from 2016 and 2018, it is evident that feelings of depression among students continue to rise. Also, the numbers of students with suicidal ideations, having a suicide plan, and reporting self-harm increased between 2016 and 2018, although that was not the case for every age group. When comparing KIP data from 2016 and 2018, it is evident that there has been a dramatic increase in students using tobacco products, 21.7% in 2016 compared to 29.9% in 2018. The number of students using electronic cigarettes or vape pens has increased dramatically, from 7.8% in 2016 to 19.6% in 2018, with 40.7% of 12th graders reporting they had used e-cigarettes or vape pens within the last 30 days prior to taking the survey. KiP data from 2018 also showed that only 31.4% of the 12th graders felt that vape use or e-cigarettes are harmful to a person's health.

Trigg County has received certification as a Work Ready Community by the Kentucky Education and Workforce Development Cabinet. This is an indication that workforce skills are a priority for the community; however, conversations with local industries reveal that they continue to experience issues with the 18-30 age group demonstrating good work ethic and soft skills needed for employment.

FRYSC DATA:

According to the YSC Staff Survey, they feel the top three most pressing needs of our students include basic needs (clothing, food, etc.), mental health counseling services, and social skills/behavior issues.

According to the YSC Student Survey, the top three school or community programs in which students are the most interested include after school activities, career exploration and/or job development, and volunteer opportunities.

According to the YSC Parent Survey, 56.8% of high school students and 49% of middle school students spend more than two hours per day playing video games or surfing the internet.

Currently, 139 middle and high school students are receiving in-school mental health counseling services. Fourteen more students have been referred and are in the intake process. There have been a total of 64 students referred for counseling so far during the 2019-2020 school year, and 20 students have been discharged for meeting treatment plans, moving to different schools, or by parent choice to discontinue counseling services at school.
