- The following ongoing activities are occurring, and involving FRC staff/volunteers:
  - Fourteen NPS classrooms are participating in partnerships through the Adopt a Class program, including Crossroads Church, Mars Chocolate, United Way, Citibank, Brighton Center, USI Insurance (2), Red Hot Promotions (The Think Shop), PricewaterhouseCoopers, US Bank (2), Movement Church, Clerk's Office at the US Court of Appeals for the 6<sup>th</sup> Circuit, and the Cincinnati Reds. At least once a month, a different Adopt a Class partner is being featured on the school's website and Facebook page, as a way to recognize their contributions to NPS students!
  - Fourteen (14) Lunch Buddies (Big Brother Big Sister, schoolbased mentoring) are spending 45-minutes together at lunchtime each week, and applications have gone home with students who may be matched with a Lunch Buddy in the future.
  - 16 students are walking to the Boys & Girls Club after school with B&G Club staff.
  - NPS students are able to receive mental health therapy on-site through Greater Cincinnati Behavioral Health, MEBS & Associates, NorthKey, and our school counselor. Many students also see outside agencies (i.e., Holly Hill, Therapeutic Collaborative) for therapy. Molly receives calls regularly from case managers at MEB's Associates, regarding common clients.
  - Students at NPS continue to be encouraged to recycle items at school, and to continue to collect plastic lids to recycle into additional "Buddy Benches" and/or other furniture for the school.
  - Molly serves on the NPS attendance committee, with Brian Zepf, Angelika Huff, Mr. Atkins, Debbie Roaden, and Kristy

McNally – this group meets regularly to discuss interventions, etc. Recently, students who had perfect attendance in January received a "brag tag" to attach to their backpack; February perfect attendance students will receive an additional brag tag soon.

- To date, Molly has worked with Debbie Mollette (and the organization through which her dog was certified as a therapy dog) for a variety of dogs to come to visit the special needs students in Ms. Zimmerman's, and Ms. Turner's, classrooms, twice during most weeks!
- Molly, Kristy McNally, and Amber Onkst have a Masters level Social Work student interning during the 2019-2020 school year.

   graders as pen pals. Two sets of letters from NCC to the NPS
   2<sup>nd</sup> graders have been delivered, and responses from the 2<sup>nd</sup>
   graders have also been delivered. In addition, NCC students
   gave their 2<sup>nd</sup> grade buddies a hat/gloves set before the Holiday
   Break.
- Molly is distributing and collecting applications for children birth-age 5 to participate in Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, in order to receive free books each month.
- Molly continues to work with St. Elizabeth to make available their Employee Assistance Program, at which staff and their household members can receive up to 8 free mental health visits.

- ✓ Heather Anderson, NHS Program Coordinator Heather reports:

- To date, over 144 different participants have participated in a CLC activity, with a daily average of 15 students.
- A morning intramural program will begin on February 27<sup>th</sup> for high school students. Activities will rotate every 4 weeks. The first session will be corn hole.
- We are also starting an intramural boys' soccer program after school on Tuesdays. Participants will do 45 minutes of academic activity prior to playing.
- This month's Adventure Crew trip was to the Countryside YMCA in Lebanon, OH. Students were able to swim, use the rock-climbing wall, play basketball and participate in other recreational activities.
- The Center for Policy, Evaluation and Research (CEPR) out of Indiana University were at Newport High School on February 19<sup>th</sup> to conduct a site visit. They will provide feedback on program quality and improvement based on their evaluations and interviews.
- A local craft group made a large donation of yarn and supplies to the Knitting Club. Members made thank you cards to send to them for their generous gift.
- Summer planning is underway. The high school program is required to provide a minimum of 32 hours of programming over the summer months.
- The high school 21st CCLC is currently in the process of writing their Continuation Progress Report to secure funding for years 4 and 5 of the grant cycle.

  - Newport Primary -217 students have participated this year. 21<sup>st</sup> Century's Club Wildcat is currently serving 45 students daily, Mon Thursday. Students participate in homework help, tutoring, and daily enrichment activities. Current activities include Lego Club, Math Ninjas, Nature Club, Makerspace Club, Muttigrees, Choral Cats, Fit Kids, STEAM Club, Spanish Club, Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts STEM Program and Fun with Music with Skoolaid.
  - Newport Intermediate- 302 students have participated in activities year. The following are a list of the currently activities at NIS. Youth Leadership Development, Diversity Wildcats, Monthly Art Club (for special needs students), Sports Mania, Minecraft Education, Club 312, FINtastic Aquarium Club, Friends and Readers, STEAM Punks, The Treblemakers Choir Club, Pre-Teen Cuisine Cooking Club,

- Martial Arts with Master Fry, Girl Scouts Agents of Change Program and Explore More Art Club.
- Newport Middle (7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup>) 64 students have participated this year. The following are a list of the current activities for 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> students. Breakfast Club, Homework Help/Study Table, Art Club, Youth Leadership Development, Knitting Club, Hip Hop Dance, Adventure Crew, Minecraft Education Club and 3D Printing Club.
- 21st Century will partner with the Brighton Center to host a Community Health Fair on Thursday April 2nd in the Newport Intermediate School gymnasium. Community partners will be on hand to discuss making healthy choices, provide resources, hands-on activities and screenings for both parents and students. More details to come.
- 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC Summer Programming is currently in the planning stage.
   Camp Wildcat, designed for incoming K-6<sup>th</sup> grade students, will run from June 1<sup>st</sup> June 26<sup>th</sup> at Newport Intermediate School.
- Activity highlight: Pre-Teen Cuisine is a twice monthly cooking club ran by Melissa Pilcher from the U of K Cooperative Extension Office. Students meet to learn how to read food labels, kitchen safety, and portion control. Each meeting, students focus on making a healthy and nutritious recipe from scratch. Last week, students prepared One Pot Cheesy Spaghetti. Not only do students learn how to cook and eat better, but we hope they will influence their family's eating habits as well.



- ✓ Newport Independent School District Health Services Ms. Pam Pedigo, RN, BSN, Coordinating Nurse and Ms. Rebecca Bova, RN, BSN, District School Nurses report as follows:

- Reviewing records of all students for valid immunization certificates and screening (physical, vision, dental) requirements.
   Focus is on preschoolers; assisting them to meet regulations for next school year.
- Newport Intermediate School Based Health Center
  - 804 sick visits.
  - 18 daily medication administrations.
  - 1 daily medical procedure (catheterization)
  - 7 vision screenings
  - Identification of those with immunization deficits as well as those that need school physicals; and getting arrangements made for Liz Tanner, NP to meet these needs. Focus is now on 6<sup>th</sup> grade requirements.
- Newport High School Nursing Office
  - 249 sick student visits
  - 7 daily medication administrations, 1 diabetes management
  - 7 vision screenings
  - 1 medical procedure as needed.
- Ms. Elizabeth Tanner, NP via Christ Hospital at School Based Health Center
  - Has evaluated 69 students in the past month. This includes sick visits, immunization needs, and school or sports physicals
  - Has evaluated 20 sick personnel.
  - In addition, she assists with identification of students eligible for school based vaccines.
- O Dental clinic was held in January at NPS. Big Smiles came in and evaluated the students for dental needs. Big Smiles spent 10 days on the premises meeting these needs. 101 students received dental care. 83 sealants were placed and 144 received restorative procedures. Big Smiles estimates that the care they delivered saved approximately 302 school attendance days. Dental clinic also held at NHS, with much lower participation. Only 9 signed up for the Big Smiles clinic at NHS. Big Smiles estimates their work at NHS saved approximately 18 days of school attendance.
- Aware that some area schools have had attendance issues due to influenza; we are monitoring our attendance with that in mind.
- Site visit planned for March 20<sup>th</sup> with VFC (Vaccines for Children).
   Because we house vaccines on our premises, we undergo an annual site visit/inspection.
- Our 21st Century personnel are planning a Health Fair at NIS on Thursday, April 2nd. We will be participating in that event.
- Making plans for more widespread laser vision screenings to be done by community partner Lions Club next school year.

## ✓ Mike Wills, DPP & Director of Student Services

- You now have our sixth month attendance report attached. It remains the best trend we have had in the past three years. All school leaders are doing a great job in monitoring their attendance rates. I am hopeful that with warmer weather coming we can keep this trend going.
- Last month you adopted the 2020 2021 District School Calendar. Tonight I am simply presenting the Newport Regional School Calendar (see the attached calendar) as it must also be approved by you, but since it follows our school calendar, it does not require two readings as you have already adopted the district calendar. This calendar does not require KDE approval, but it is monitored by KDE, the Kentucky Department of Juvenile Justice and the Kentucky Educational Collaborative for State Agency Children (KECSAC) as it must mirror the approved district calendar, except that it must provide for 220 contract days and 210 instructional days (177 full and 33 partial days). Before I can submit the district calendar to the Kentucky Department of Education, I must have a copy of the minutes reflecting your decision to adopt this calendar as well. Accordingly, I respectfully request the following board action be recorded in the minutes that the board has approved the 2020 – 2021 Newport Regional School Calendar.
