## 2019-20 Council Major Points of Action

Consulted on the hiring of a Family Resource Coordinator, an instructional assistant II, an instructional assistant, and two ESS daytime-waiver instructional assistants for the 2019-20 school year. During the winter, the Council also consulted on the hiring of a part-time preschool instructional assistant. The council also consulted on the hiring of a full-time preschool instructional assistant for the upcoming 2020-21 school year.

Revised SBDM Writing Policy and the Parent Engagement Policy.
Approved Master Schedule for the 2019-20 School Year that allowed for maximized usage of instructional assistants during primary small groups and additional support in primary co-teach classrooms.

Approved revisions to the 19-20 ESS budgets, as well as approval for the 2019-20 PPA and the Principal's Combining Budget.

Approved use of Title I District Set-Aside Funding for literacy materials, professional development initiatives, and Parent-Engagement resources

Approved allocations and a grade level staffing plan for the upcoming year to maximize staff impact on student achievement.

Revised and approved 2019-20 Emergency Crisis Management Plan based on feedback from local emergency personnel.

## Success Stories

The following are just a few of the successes of the Creekside Elementary community from the 2019-20 school year:

- Held a Jumpstart program to introduce incoming Kindergartners and their parents to our school and their teachers.
- Partnered with our Military Partners in Education for activities on the first day of school, Read Across America week, and through Holiday Assistance.
- Continued implementation of the Raptor System in the front office to provide increased safety and security when signing guests in to the building.
- Received a Safe Schools Assessment from the Kentucky Center for Safe Schools to address perceptions of and actual safety on campus.
- The Academic Team placed $3^{\text {rd }}$ overall at the District Governor's Cup Competition. At the District Competition, the team had six individual students place across the various academic events. The Future Problem Solving Team finished in $3^{\text {rd }}$ place and the Quick Recall Team finished in $4^{\text {th }}$ place.
- At the Regional Governor's Cup Competition, two students placed in academic events. Cameron Hill was $1^{\text {st }}$ in Language Arts and Allison Lambert was $3^{\text {rd }}$ in Composition.
- Hosted a VEX IQ Robotics elementary competition
- Sent a group to the Beta Club State Convention. Two students placed at the convention. Alex Meredith finished 4th in social studies and Ava Walker finished 2nd in language arts.
- Successful seasons were had by our $4^{\text {th }} / 5^{\text {th }}$ grade boys' basketball team and our girls' volleyball team.
- Held a Veterans' Appreciation Breakfast in November to recognize and celebrate the military families and stakeholders within our community. All families and veterans were further celebrated during a school-wide parade.
- Honored the military community and our Partner in Education, the Human Resources Command-Officer Personnel Management Directorate, during a Veterans Day event.
- $4^{\text {th }}$ grader Trevon Smith won the school $4^{\text {th }}$ and $5^{\text {th }}$ grade spelling bee and went on to compete in the Hardin County Spelling Bee.
- Hosted two Wellness Nights and partnered with outside agencies, to promote healthy living.
- Held scrimmage KPREP tests in the spring for all students in grades 3-5.
- Club Day, a part of the school's PBIS initiative, provided K-5 students with an opportunity to explore a variety of interests while being recognized for their exceptional behavior. These club days were held the final Friday of each calendar month.
- Over the course of the school year, gains were made in the percentage of students "on grade level" as indicated by the reading and math MAP scores.
- Served approximately 80 students through the school's ESS program through the daytime waiver program
- Celebrated student successes at quarterly awards ceremonies.
- The Upton Masonic Lodge donated seven bicycles to award students with perfect attendance during the third and fourth quarters.
- -Students traveled to learning opportunities across the area. Our preschoolers visited the post office and first grade students visited the Mink and Walters Farm. Third grade students visited Bernheim Forest and Fourth Grade students participated in trips to Hardin County Safety Day at the fairgrounds and visited Abraham Lincoln's Birthplace.
