

Total cases


There have been **4,588 cases** of COVID-19 in Jefferson County. The population of this region is 767,154. That's 598 cases per 100,000 people.


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Newly reported cases


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Total deaths

Calendar Change

This proposal:

- Makes 10/6, 11/2, 1/4, and 3/26 instructional days.
- Makes the first day for 187 instructional staff 8/10 and students 8/25.
- Maintains 187 days for instructional/school staff.
- Allows for 11 days preparation/training before students return to school on August 25, 2020, two of which would be flexible professional development (PD) days, as required.
- Makes the last day for students May 27, 2021, with the last day for instructional/school staff May 28, 2021.

NTI 2.0 (Non-Traditional Instruction)

We are recommending to start the year with NTI.

We are using the lessons we have learned to design NTI 2.0. Our goal is to build upon the successful components of our first implementation of NTI while creating a more equitable, robust plan to be consistently implemented across schools, Pre-K through grade twelve.

NTI 2.0

We are designing NTI 2.0 while being mindful of the following:

Building upon the successful components of NTI 1.0

Creating a more equitable, robust plan to be consistently implemented across schools, PreK through grade twelve

Providing daily synchronous opportunities for instruction as well as for interactions with peers and teachers

Ensuring that the expectations for the learning experience are congruent with what we expect inside the physical school building; the NTI 2.0 experience should be equally as personalized, rich, and engaging to the maximum extent possible.

Designing while thinking about how we can use what we create to improve the student experience, whether in a virtual or physical environment

Everyone:1—Continue to strive for an instructional device for every student.

Device distribution for virtual learning will be coordinated at the school level with support systems in place.

Hotspots will be provided to students who need internet access at home for virtual learning.

JCPS is collaborating with community partners for a sustainable, long-range WiFi plan for families.

NTI 2.0

Teachers will engage students through a variety of instructional strategies because we do not recommend that any student spend all day on a computer. In fact, we strongly recommend that teachers use this as an opportunity to engage students through connected, project-based experiences, providing opportunities for students to problem-solve, design, and create, rather than lots of short-term assignments that may not be as connected or meaningful to students.

That said, having online access is essential today for many reasons, one of the most important being access to important learning supports and resources like Exact Path, Edgenuity, Gale databases, and the KHAN Academy, all of which are used daily in our classrooms.
