





## Challenges: Middle & High School Choices

- No choice for West Louisville Middle and High School students
- Small, disconnected zones
- 50 different feeder patterns
- Barriers to family engagement, after-school activities, and athletics
- Attendance challenges when students miss the bus

## Recommendation: Dual Resides Option

- Additional Choice for West Louisville Students
- School close to home or farther away
  - New West Louisville Middle School
  - Renovated Academy @ Shawnee
- Guaranteed choice at either school
- Phased-in approach: 6th and 9th grades
- Intentional connection to the Support Plan



## Benefits: Dual Resides Option Recommendation

- Students would have two school options
- Opportunities to stay with peers from middle to high school
- Increased opportunity to participate in after-school activities & athletics
- Opportunities for improved attendance and sense of belonging
- Opportunities for increased family engagement
- Ease of understanding for families to engage in choice

## Impact: Dual Resides Option Recommendation

- New Boundaries for Middle and High Schools to support proposal
- Two Choices for Students Living in West Louisville Study Area at Middle and High School

## Challenges: Magnet/Optional Choices

- Limited access for students of color
- Limited seats for engaging programs
- Inconsistent quality across magnet schools and programs
- Difficult to navigate admissions processes
- Lack of centralized lottery
- Removal of students by schools through school-initiated exits created equity issues due to bias

## Recommendation: Magnet/Optional Choices

- Establish Centralized Lottery
- End School-Initiated Student Exits
- Set Diversity Targets and Goals
- Replicate Popular Magnets and New Interest-Based Magnets
- Shift Open Enrollment to Transfer Process

### Benefits: Magnet/Optional Choices Recommendation

- Increase transparency and ease of understanding
- Decision making about leaving a school stays with families
- Use school diversity data to create goals and action plans to ensure magnet schools and programs are representative of the District's diversity

## Impact: Centralized Lottery

- Lottery facilitated by Central Office Office of School Choice
- Schools having one list that will be provided by the District
- Office of School Choice maintaining waitlists for lottery schools

## Impact: End School Initiated Exits

- Magnet schools, programs and optional programs will not be able to exit students from the program.
- Families still being able to choose to leave a Magnet school, program and optional program
- Office of School Choice monitoring family initiated exits

## Impact: Set Diversity Targets and Goals

- Office of School Choice working with magnet schools, programs and optional programs to set school-unique diversity goals so that schools better represent the full diversity of JCPS
- Office of School Choice assisting schools and providing supports in working towards their diversity goals
- Schools making progress towards their diversity goals

## Impact: Replicate Popular Magnets and Introduce New Interest-Based Magnets

- The Office of School Choice pursuing the replication of popular magnets to increase opportunity and access (i.e. Magnet School Assistance Program grant)
  - Should the District receive the 2020 grant, the Board will be brought a plan for next steps
- The Office of School Choice creating a multi-year plan for the introduction and implementation of replicated Magnets and new Interest-Based Magnets

## Impact: New Elementary Music School Magnet

#### Recommendation will result in:

The Office of School Choice pursuing a Music Immersion Magnet
 Theme, resulting in additional recommendations for facilities,
 programming, and other resourcing in subsequent Board Meetings to
 fully implement for School Year 2022-2023

## Impact: Shift Open Enrollment to Transfer Process

- Eliminating Open Enrollment as an option on the magnet application and refer families to the transfer process to facilitate similar choice.
- Streamlining the Choice process at the High School level to improve Ease of Understanding

## Continuous Improvement

#### **Formative Process**

 Reflection of what has worked well, challenges encountered, and adjustments that need to be made to maximize student outcomes.

#### **Summative process**

- Formal evaluation to ensure that the plan is implemented with fidelity
- Both external and internal reviews conducted to provide added level of accountability

#### **Board Actions**

- Approve two amended board policies
- Approve new middle and high school boundaries to support dual resides proposal and the construction of a middle school in West Louisville
- Review six new procedures aligned with policies
- Direct staff to organize the implementation of the West Louisville Support Plan
