
Nutrition and Physical Activity Report Card for 2021



Assessment




The Assessment completion by support type charts show how many schools in your district have completed (answered all questions at least once), started (answered at least one question, but not all of them) and not started this assessment.





National School Lunch

The National School Lunch Program (NSLP) was conceived in 1946 as a "measure of national security to safeguard the health and well-being of the Nation's children." School nutrition programs receive federal reimbursement for each school lunch served that meets the United States Department of Agriculture nutrition guidelines. These guidelines promote meal quality while commodity donations assist the farmer and help schools keep down meal prices

EIS menu cycles support the USDA "MyPlate" initiative. We feature a colorful variety of fruits and vegetables, whole grain breads and pastas, portion controlled protein filled entrees and fat free milk. Our "homemade" student approved recipes include fresh, high quality ingredients.

School Breakfast

The School Breakfast Program (SBP) was established in 1966. School districts receive federal reimbursement for each school breakfast served that meets the USDA nutrition guidelines.

Studies show that children who participate in the School Breakfast Program have significantly higher standardized achievement test scores than non-participants. Children with access to school breakfast also had significantly reduced absence and tardiness rates. We Started a 2nd chance Breakfast program at the High School 4 years ago. We have a least 85 more students getting the nutrition that they need.

Summer Feeding at Morningside Elementary

Our district started summer feeding in June and July of 2016. Our response was outstanding. We served over 8,500 meals in our first summer of operation. We are committed to the continuation of our summer meal program. We think it will continue to grow and flourish in the future. Summer of 2019 we served over 19,000 lunch meals. We also started serving breakfast in the summer of 2019. We served over 9,500 breakfast meals.
