- Used technology to receive feedback from students














# Dixie Heights High School

#### Scott High School


- We received feedback from feeder school students (Taylor Mill, Ft Wright, Ryland, and Woodland) via google forms, on how to improve the inclusivity around their school
- Many issues expressed by these students were about making school a happier and safer place to be at, especially during these tough times
- Students thought of a couple ways to implement solutions to these issues.
  Solutions mentioned were to have and spread a positive attitude, help out around school, build friendships, and find fun ways to make everyone smile



### Simon Kenton High School

- We reached out to SVA and met with 3rd-5th graders.
- During our Google Meet, we taught students how to brainstorm ways to improve their school (just like we do as Superintendent Advisory Council members). The elementary schoolers resoundingly had feedback about feeling rushed during lunch, feeling lonely during the pandemic, and wanting to bring the fun back into the school day. They miss normalcy.
- In response to this feedback, we helped the elementary school students set a goal of a "passes" rewards system where they could get a homework pass, an "eat lunch with a friend pass," etc. for good behavior during the school day.







#### Conclusion

#### Next steps:

- Teachers can set a good example by encouraging a safe, comfortable school environment rooted in open-mindedness and acceptance so students feel like they can voice their opinions/feedback
- Arrange for high school student leaders to continue checking up on elementary/middle school student leadership groups in the future. Additionally, it would be beneficial for students to have a counselor/teacher/administrator at their school to sponsor the leadership group so their impact can extend beyond what the high school leaders can facilitate.
- Continue meeting with students from younger age groups and consider their feedback equally important as feedback from high school advisors.
