Director Pupil Personnel and Student Services Report Regular Meeting August 25, 2021

Good evening Madame Chair and members of the Board of Education. Today is the first day of instruction for the 21/22 school year. As a District we have completed our six hours of district professional development in addition to completion of home visits, professional learning days, family engagement days (2), and Opening Day. There are 5 instructional days within the month of August as we are working on a variable school calendar.

New to the 21/22 school year is the development and implementation of Professional Learning Communities for School Counselors. Current work is the collaborative establishment of school counseling program mission and vision. Each school program is working toward setting data driven program goals that correlate to the domains of academics, college/career readiness, and social/emotional. Specific work of the group includes alignment of programs, multi tiered systems of support for behavior from the School Counseling lens, and implementation of trauma informed practices in each school.

Our school level front office staff have participated in professional learning related to school attendance and accuracy of data reporting. This team will receive feedback at the close of each instructional month to ensure accuracy and understanding. School level front office staff have the opportunity for on-going learning and consultation that is scheduled for the close of each of the 10 instructional months.

We are excited to begin the 2021 school year with four additional grants. Each FRC/YSC Centers have been awarded the GEER grants for \$100,000 each. We have also received a McKinney Vento Grant in the amount of \$99,673.00. Our total additional grant funds are just short of \$400,000.

### McKinney Vento Grant was awarded on July 1, 2021 for \$99,673.00 McKinney-Vento Strategic Plan

Objective 1: **Enrollment, Identification, and Attendance** By September 2024, after professional development, 75% of staff members will be able to recognize signs of homelessness and manage identification and referral of MV students through utilization of a flowchart tool, as measured by a post-training survey.

Objective 2: **Academic Success** 2a: By September 2024, 50% MV students will show improvement from Fall to Spring for reading, as shown by MAP assessment. 2b: By September 2024, 50% MV students will show improvement from Fall to Spring for math, as shown by MAP assessment. 2c: Increase participation of homeless youth in extra-curricular activities by 50%.

Objective 3: **Family connectedness, engagement, health and wellbeing** 3a. By September 2024, increase family participation in educational sessions and support groups by 10%, as measured by parent sign-in log. 3b. By September 2024, 75% of parents will report positive contact with the MV program, as measured by a family perception survey. 3c. Improved data collection and tracking of homeless students and families accessing resources.

#### **Newport Primary & Intermediate Coordinator**

The Wildcat Morning program will begin this year on Monday August 30th. The program will run Mon-Fri beginning at 6:50AM. Students will participate in physical activity, tutoring/homework help with two certified teachers and a healthy breakfast. Priority will be given to students with academic needs. Space is limited to 30 students at both NPS and NIS.

The Club Wildcat after school program is scheduled to begin the week of September 13th. A maximum of 50 students with academic needs will be targeted for participation at both school sites. The program

will run Mon-Thursday from 3-5PM daily. The program will begin with a healthy snack, homework/tutoring/intervention, and engaging enrichment activities.

21st Century staff will participate in Family Engagement Days on August 19th and 20th to begin recruiting students for both the morning and afterschool programs. Parents will also be surveyed regarding which upcoming Adult Skill Building activities they are interested in this year. The 21st Century program is required to provide a minimum of 6 adult activities per year.

21C staff is working with curriculum staff to specifically target students that perform below proficiency in reading and math for the program.

Community Partners will enter the buildings during the afterschool program to provide enrichment activities to students. Partners are being advised that they need to be vaccinated, wear a mask, and follow any additional CDC guidelines. Meetings will continue over the next several weeks to plan additional upcoming activities for students. Current activities include: Youth Leadership Development (Brighton Center), Art Club (Baker Hunt), Nature Club (Sierra Club), Girl Scouts STEM program, Labrats (CC NKU Extension Office) and NKU Dance Program.

21C staff is currently working on completing the NIS Safe Schools training and Professional Development required by KDE for the 21st Century programs. All 21C staff will also attend an upcoming CPR/First Aid training as well.

#### School Health Center Pam Pedigo, Health Center Coordinator

Drafted a Summer Newsletter with healthy summer tips for families.

Onsite nursing coverage was provided for summer school this year.

Developed "Notes from the Nurse Desk" for back to school information to be distributed among parents and staff. Posted document to school facebook accounts and will be available as a handout at Family Engagement Days.

Pam and Rebecca attended CPR class in July to maintain certification.

Automatic Electronic Defibrillators were reviewed and expiration dates on pads will be provided to Tim Grayson, Healthy At Schools Director.

Reviewed and updated internal forms, documents, and authorizations with DPP.

Evaluated and recommended Ethos Lab as a potential community partner for Covid-19 testing within our school community.

Evaluated and recommended Wild Health be utilized for onsite vaccine clinic and that is planned for 8/20.

Ongoing review of student state required vaccine needs is underway. Reaching out to guardians to

offer the School Based Health Clinic (SBHC) as an opportunity to have those vaccine needs met.

Evaluating student records for those behind on state required screenings. Contacting those in need of school physicals and offering SBHC as an opportunity to meet those needs.

Presented at the Health Aide training on August 12th: Toileting and Wheelchair Transfer.

Launched Medication Administration Training to unlicensed staff selected by principals.

Presented at the Bus Drivers meeting August 8th: Covid-19 is again a reportable disease.

Finalized the return of Big Smiles in October and November of this year. They will provide dental services to students in all 3 buildings.

Negotiated a date for the Ft. Thomas Lions Club to do vision screenings on selected grade levels on September 28, 2021.

Participation in Home Visit Day made 21 visits, had 9 no answer homes. Made contact with 11 students/family, and one family had moved.

Preparing for Family Engagement Day.

Vaccines For Children (VFC) annual site visit on 8/12/21 went well and vaccines are now in-house. No plans to administer Covid vaccine at this time.

Managing Covid questions and concerns as they occur. Assisting DPP with record-keeping aspects of the challenge. Monitoring local and state statistics. Following closely with Team Kentucky the guidance for K through 12 operations as well as developments out of the CDC. Team Kentucky's most recent guidance is dated August 10, 2021.

Meeting scheduled with Technology Director 8/18 to gain skills in using School Messenger.

Planning underway for a third nurse to be onboarded.

Liz Tanner, NP will remain as a contracted acting Medical Director. Having a licensed prescriber on board is what allows us to give Over The Counter (OTC) medications.

We will begin the year the same way we operated last year, with the nurse going to the student location to keep student movement in the hallways to a minimum.

Isolation capability remains in place in each of the 3 buildings.
