- KYOTE Testing for Seniors took place during the week of September 7th.
- CAP Program:
  - The Conduit Apprenticeship Program (CAP) is a program designed by Justin Wolfenberg and Jerry Beerman, who are local small business owners. They collaborated with a variety of individuals in the area that all have a vested interest in teaching our youth the importance of knowing how to do minor household tasks such as drilling, hammering, and changing out faucets and electrical outlets safely. These important skills will assist these participants in helping around their house and also, hopefully, find some students who may not have known they wanted to have a career in the trades. There are three phases all of which build upon the lessons taught in order to progress them to be independent in completing these tasks.
  - Phase 1 - once a week, 2 hour class, for 5 weeks that instructs students in learning how to use a tape measure, drilling and hammering into a variety of materials correctly, cutting copper piping, finding studs, minor electrical and plumbing repairs, and using a variety of electrical tools.
  - Phase 2 – 3 months of students going to work sites and getting co-op and on the job experience with a licensed professional. Students who move onto Phase 2 will be selected upon successful completion of Phase 1.
  - Phase 3 – 6 months and another step of an apprenticeship. Upon completion of Phase 3 – students will be equipped to be hired full-time after high school. We have a mix of juniors and seniors in the program. We currently have a total of 8 students participating in the program (2 seniors and 6 juniors).



- CAP was offered to any junior/senior not already involved in another career pathway program.
- On Wednesday, September 8<sup>th</sup> we had STAR Assessment Training for Staff.
- We have taken STAR Testing twice (Reading and Math); Second Round was 9/13 and 9/14. We continue to look at this data to drive instruction. Results will be shared with parents for their student.
- Homecoming took place on Friday, September 10<sup>th</sup>.
- We have concluded our first PLC cycle as of Wednesday, September 15<sup>th</sup>.

- After our first round of both KYOTE and the ASK exams, as well as a bit of fluctuation with our enrollment, here are our updated CCR numbers:
  - 16/54 (29.6%) of students are fully college and/or career ready.
  - 11 (20.3%) students who are not currently college and/or career ready are at the ATC and should gain career readiness there.



- 5 (9.2%) students who aren't CCR are attending Skilled Trades and should gain career readiness there.
- 4 (7.4%) students who aren't CCR are attending Gateway and should attain college readiness there.
- 1 (1.8%) student who isn't CCR is in the Logistics pathway and should have career readiness there.
- 37/54 (68.5%) are on track to gain college career readiness through these paths.
- The other 17 students are working through a combination of the administrative support pathway (must pass the ASK exam) to gain career readiness or are working towards gaining college readiness through the KYOTE assessment/ACT.
- As always these numbers are subject to fluctuation based upon transients and graduation rate.
