For the current year our district has eight (8) remaining Non-Traditional Instruction days.

School Based Health Center and each school nursing location PCR Covid- 19 non-invasive testing to students and staff when there is no known exposure, but have symptoms. Test to Stay option has been added to the COVID-19 plan for those students and staff with an exposure occurring at school. Logistics and staffing are being coordinated with our lab partner with full implementation of this rapid assessment expected within the week.

Students Services has assisted 410 different students with Covid-19 quarantine guidance from 07/17/2021 to 09/19/2021. 19 families have been assisted with household needs outside of currently provided community services.

According to the results from the Family Resource Center 2021-2022 Needs Survey36% of caregivers reported they would like to attend Parenting Education Workshops to support their child's learning. In conclusion 53% of caregivers surveyed would like extra support to help their child education. Our morning program is up and running at both the primary and intermediate schools. We are in the process of using intentional targeting for our students that need additional academic support to fill out those programs. Our afterschool programs will begin on October 4th. We are in the process of lining up daily schedules. We are working closely with the schools to make our program a true extension of the school day. We have a wide variety of clubs—from fitness to chess, Dungeons and Dragons, art, music, and more.

The new cycle 19 grant for 21C was released on September 13th, and we have immediately begun work on completing the application process. We were also granted an extension on our cycle 13 grant funds that were not distributed due to COVID, and now have until the end of June 2022 to use those.

We also have a new Program Director for the Primary and Intermediate schools. Cassandra Patterson is joining us. She lives in Taylor Mill, KY and is not new to our district. She has been a sub as well as a site coordinator for 21C. She is excited to partner with the schools and the community to offer an amazing student morning and after school program. We also have a new site coordinator at the Intermediate school. Her name is Lisa Beckett, and you might have seen her working with Kristy McNally in Stock the Kitchen. We are excited to welcome her into the 21C family.
