Director Pupil Personnel and Student Services Report Regular Meeting October 27, 2021

Good evening Madam Chair and members of the Board of Education. As of 10/27/21 we have completed thirty-eight (38) instructional days. Calendar month two (2) ended as of October 6, 2021. Instructional Quarter 1 ended October 22, 2021.

With the passage of Senate Bill 1 all Kentucky school districts are able to once again use prior year attendance data for the Support Education Excellence in Kentucky (SEEK) funds. Current year data will be used for property assessment, exceptional child counts and limited English proficiency child counts. Newport Independent will continue to utilize 2018-2019. Like other school districts, Newport Independent will continue to report student attendance in Infinite Campus and enforce compulsory attendance. Decisions related to attendance growth over prior school years will be determined in the next General Assembly.

Each school leadership team has created a school wide attendance team. School Wide teams focus on universal data including Chronic Absenteeism, attendance percentages, attendance events, attendance rewards, awareness, and improvement. It was suggested that this team serve in an ad hoc role to the advisory council or as an independent committee within the school and include no less than 1 classified team member. Each leadership team also identified an attendance team focused on improvement planning for individual students under an MTSS structure through the DPP office with review and feedback from the district RTI team.

Each school team has been provided with guidance from the DPP office through our Student Support Services Attendance & Engagement Guidance document for School Teams and Support Staff. This guidance outlines the responsibilities of our members, support requirements for each instructional day with an attendance event, and student intervention improvement plans.

Mrs. Stewart has been appointed to serve a two-year team on KASA's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Task Force. This committee actively works to expand KASA's definition of inclusion, diversity and equity and recommends changes in association practices that may act as barriers to members of non-dominant groups in the profession.

McKinney Vento Grant Initiative

Objective 5: Attendance/Family Connectedness/Engagement

5a. By September 2024, decrease the number of MV students who are identified as chronically absent by 25%.

5b. By September 2024, Increase transportations options by one provider yearly.

Activity- Increase transportation options impacting up to 300 students daily during the school year October 2021- September 2024 as measured through student rosters and funded through \$12,000.0 Title I and \$10,000.00 McKinney Vento Grant. The MV student population stands at 15% of our total student

population. 20% of this population are currently relying on taxi and Uber which are unreliable services as to timing and consistency for cross-district transportation.

Prior Expense- \$31, 847.00

Estimated Expense- \$16,920.00 - \$17,402.00

Time- 4 hours per day- Review of current employees' work schedules reveals an inability to address additional hours outside of overtime pay.

We are asking for the approval of the McKinney Vento Driver position with a salary schedule reflective of the bus driver schedule. This position is limited to continuation of grant funding.

21st Century Cassandra Patterson Newport Primary & Intermediate Director

We began after school programming for both the primary and intermediate schools on October 4th, 2021. We have already reached capacity at the primary school and now have a waiting list. A large portion of our clubs at the intermediate school are also at capacity. We have begun working closely with ESS at both schools to offer great academic support. By combining efforts we are able to secure more certified teachers to help with our after school programming. We have also received our RFA for the Cycle 19 Grant. We have brought on Amber Onkst to help us write this grant as it is due November 16th, 2021 and both program directors are brand new to the program. We will be hand delivering the grant application to Frankfort on November 15th. We held an advisory committee meeting with both NIS(9/29) and NPS (9/28) FRC Coordinators. We also had CPR training for our staff on October 6th

School Health Center Pam Pedigo, Health Center Coordinator

On September 28th, we completed vision screenings on the 7th grade at the high school as well as most of the primary students. Waiting on partner, The Lions Club, to get back with us on possible dates to finish up the primary and move on to the intermediate grades.

October 4th through the 7th we held a Big Smiles dental clinic at NIS.

The Covid related consumption of time has eased a bit. We do have specimen collection available in our buildings now and our process is pretty tight. We also have the Test to Stay capability we have employed a few times with at-school exposures.

Continue with follow-up on vaccine compliance, checking databases, making requests from medical offices, and asking parents to schedule visits to bring them into compliance.
